2-Hour Parking Limit Ordinance Is Effective

A traffic ordinance has been adopted by the City Commission limiting parking to two hours from 9 a. m. to 9 p. m. on Hutchings Avenue between Ninth and Seventh streets, and Eighth Street between Railroad and Strong Avenues, to take effect immediately. The ordinance was passed in view of the fact that there is a congestion of traffic in the city which is not properly regulated in the business district. A new traffic code supersedes former traffic ordinances.

The ordinance provides that the driver of any vehicle shall proceed to the right curb line of the street at the approach of a fire engine answering a call for fire, and shall remain at a dead stop until the fire machine has passed. No person shall be permitted to drive a vehicle closer than 300 feet to the location of any fire within the city.

Double parking is expressly forbidden, and it is required that all vehicles parked on the streets be left at an angle of 45 degrees with, and the right front wheel within 12 inches of the curb or property line. Parking within 10 feet of a fire plug shall be unlawful, as will stopping a vehicle within any intersection of streets, except to prevent a collision. In turning any corner from streets into an alley or from an alley into a street, only right hand turns shall be allowed, and crossing a street at an alley intersection shall be unlawful.

Other provisions of the ordinance prohibit racing on public streets, negligent collisions, the driving of a motor vehicle by any person while intoxicated or otherwise incapable of operating same, and designate penalties for violations.

An ordinance regulating the use of the streets, sidewalks, and curbing in the city has been adopted by the city commission, and, due to the fact that there is now no ordinance protecting pedestrians on the sidewalks and streets in the business district where construction work is being done, the ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Under the ordinance, a contractor shall be allowed the use of a third of the width of the street for the storage of his building material for a reasonable time during actual use in the construction or alteration of a building. Tools shall be removed from the street as soon as the actual period of their use is finished, and material shall not be assembled more than ten days before the time of contemplated use.

The ordinance provides that all dirt or other material excavated from the building site shall not be placed on the street at any time, but shall be removed as excavated. This provision shall also apply to debris from a building to be removed, including brick plaster, old lumber, or any other material out of the building which will not be used again.

The contractor shall, when notified by the building inspector, make provision for leaving a passageway for pedestrian traffic, at or near, the sidewalk line, by a covered runway, tunnel, or other safe method. This passageway shall be kept open to the public at all times, and shall have a clear width of at least five feet and head room of at least seven and a half feet.

The gutter shall be kept open at all times for drainage. The contractor shall properly guard his work for safety to the public and use whatever lights are necessary at night.

Mayfield Speaks Here Wednesday

Senator Earl B. Mayfield, candidate for re-election to a second term in the United States Senate and high man in the first primary by a plurality of more than 20,000 votes over Congressman Tom Connolly who will be in the runoff with him, will speak here at 2:30 o'clock Wednesday Aug. 8th in the final stage of his campaign.

"I enter the last stage of my campaign for re-election to a second term in the United States Senate confident that I shall emerge victorious by the grace of the good Democrats of Texas, whose suffrage has so often led me to victory in the cause of the people of this state," Senator Mayfield declared.

AMNESIA PARSON IN RALEIGH PRISON WILL TURN EVANGELIST

(By International News Service) RALEIGH, N. C., Aug. 4.—A Methodist minister who flitted across the front pages last year because of his too many marital unions, and who is now serving a sentence in State Prison here for bigamy, expects to turn evangelist when he is released.

The clergyman is the self-styled "amnesia parson" Rev. Willis T. Jordan, of Columbus, Ga., who was arrested in Grand Rapids, Mich., after he disappeared from his Georgia charge.

He was alleged to have had three wives at the same time, although it was proved he was only married twice when he was tried and convicted for bigamy at Charlotte, N. C., in the fall of last year.

The "amnesia parson," who works in the prison chair factory here, has from one and one half

to two years to serve. Governor McLean of North Carolina recently declined to grant him a parole when a Charlotte Methodist minister made an appeal on the convict's behalf.

Failing in an attempt to be named prison chaplain, the evangelistic idea formed in the parson-convict's mind, and he announced his plans to begin on a tour of the country just as soon as prison gates open for him.

Obituary

D. N. McWilliams

D. N. McWilliams was born in Lafayette County, Missouri, June 14, 1836 near Lexington. He moved to Washington county, Arkansas, with his parents when three years old.

He left Washington County in March or April 1852 with his parents, emigrants to California. His father and one sister died with cholera and were buried on the plains on the way. He went with his mother, and settled in Oregon for nearly two years near the town of Salem. Then later moved with the family down near Sacramento, California, living there for nearly two years.

In 1856 he shipped from San Francisco, with his mother and two sisters. They landed and crossed the Isthmus of Panama through Nicaragua. He shipped from there to New Orleans across the Gulf of Mexico on a steam boat up the Mississippi River to the mouth of the Arkansas River, and up the Arkansas River to Van Buren, Arkansas. He landed at Van Buren, and moved up into Missouri. There he married Malinda Fauster. By this union three boys were born. Two died in infancy. His wife died when the third son was born. T. I. McWilliams, who is still living.

He moved from Arkansas to Ellis County, in 1877, moving from Ellis County to Coleman in 1878. He ranched some in Sterling County. He remained in Coleman and Rannels County the rest of his life.

He joined Rector's Regiment at the beginning of the war between

the states in 1861 and served the entire siege in behalf of the Confederate cause. In 1866 he met and married Mary G. Garrett. To this union nine children were born, seven survive: Mrs. Eva Williams, Mrs. Hettie Hering, Mrs. Erin Pentecost, the girls, Feb McWilliams, O. O. McWilliams, R. E. McWilliams and E. S. McWilliams, the boys. There are now living forty-seven grandchildren and over thirty great grandchildren.

He died at the age of 92 years, 1 month and 17 days.

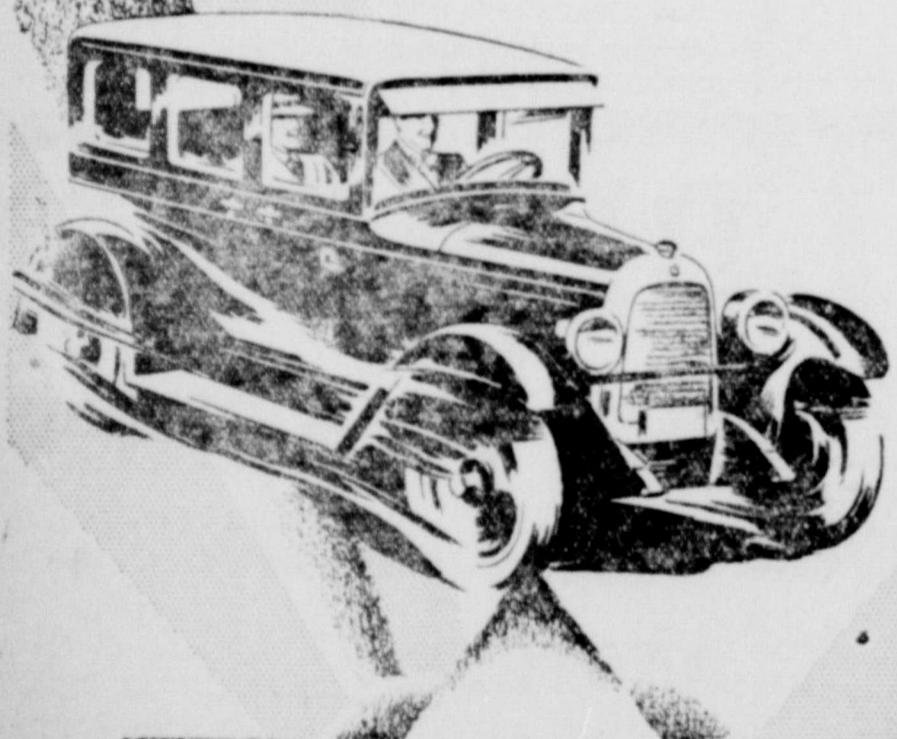

An ordinance regulating the use of the streets, sidewalks and curbing in the City of Ballinger, Texas, providing a penalty thereon and carrying an emergency.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the city of Ballinger, Texas.

Section No. 1: That from and after the passage and taking effect of this ordinance, in the construction of buildings or altering the same within the city of Ballinger, the following regulations on storage of materials and tools and the use of the streets, sidewalks and curbing shall be observed.

(a) The contractor shall be allowed the use of one-third of the width of the driveway measured from the curb for the storage of his tools and material, for a reasonable time during the actual use of same in the construction or alteration of the building; provided that same shall be immediately removed from the street as soon as the actual period of their use is finished, and provided that materials shall not be assembled more than ten days before the time of contemplated use.

(b) All dirt or other material excavated from the site shall not be placed on the street at any time, but shall be removed from the site as excavated. This provision shall also apply to debris from a building to be removed including brick plaster, old lumber, or any other material out of the building, which will not be re-used.

(c) Whenever notified by the Building Inspector, the contractor shall make provision for leaving a passageway for pedestrian traffic, at, or near the sidewalk line, by a covered runway, tunnel or other approved and safe method. This passageway shall be kept open to the public at all times, and shall have a clear width of at least five feet, and headroom of at least seven and one-half feet. Provided this provision shall only apply to business district as now defined or may be hereafter defined by the ordinance of the City of Ballinger.

(d) The gutter shall be kept open at all times for drainage. In case the contractor desires to build tool sheds over the gutter or to pipe material, same may be done by bridging in any manner which will leave free outlet for water.

(e) The provision of these regulations shall not operate to relieve the contractor of his liabilities for damage caused to property but he shall properly guard his work, using whatever lights are necessary at night.

Section No. 2: Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined any sum not exceeding \$50.00 and each time any materials are so placed as to constitute a violation hereof shall be deemed a separate offense.

Section No. 3: The fact that there is now no ordinance protecting pedestrians on the sidewalks and streets in the business district of the City of Ballinger where construction work is being done adjacent thereto with the resulting danger to life and limb, creates an emergency for the immediate passage of this ordinance and all rules requiring reading more than one time are hereby expressly suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval and publication.

An ordinance regulating the construction, alteration, maintenance, removal and repair of buildings within the City of Ballinger, Texas, and prescribing penalties for violations thereof and repealing all ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith and prescribing penalties for violation thereof and repealing all ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith and carrying an emergency.

Passed by the Board of Commissioners on the 2nd day of August 1928.

Be it ordained by the Board of

Commissioners of the City of Ballinger, Texas.

Section 1. The Building Inspector, for every permit issued by him under building ordinance of the City of Ballinger, shall collect in cash from the person, firm or corporation to whom the same is issued at the time of its delivery, the following fees:

For any building, structure, repairs or alterations of the estimated cost of less than \$100, no fee will be charged; \$100 to \$500, a fee of \$2.50; \$500 to \$1,000, a fee of \$3.50; \$1,000 to \$5,000 a fee of \$5.00; \$5,000 to \$10,000, a fee of \$7.50; \$10,000 to \$25,000, a fee of \$10.00; \$25,000 to \$50,000, a fee of \$15.00; \$50,000 to \$100,000, a fee of \$25.00; over \$100,000, a fee of \$50.00. The fee for permits shall be paid to the Building Inspector who shall not issue any permit until such fees have been paid.

Section 2. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to intentionally misrepresent in the application for a building permit, the cost of the structure, repairs or alterations.

Section 3. No permit shall be issued for excavation under sidewalks or streets or for the erection, construction, repairing or alteration over the sidewalks, parkways or streets without a special permit issued by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Ballinger, and any such permit granted without the consent of the Board of Commissioners shall be null and void.

Section 4. If upon examination of the plans and specifications as provided for in section 1 of the Building ordinance passed on the 26th day of June, 1928, the Building Inspector is of the opinion that said building or structure, when completed will be in accordance with the building code, adopted by the Board of Commissioners and the ordinances of the City of Ballinger, he shall issue a written permit authorizing the work to be done in accordance with said plans and specifications. Said permit shall be dated, shall show the character of the structure authorized, describing the location of the premises where the work is to be done, and a record shall be kept by said building inspector, properly indexed by street, lot and block numbers.

Section 5. It shall be unlawful for any owner or contractor to leave off or remove any cap on any unused gas outlet, when building, which is being built, repaired or altered, is finished. No building shall be erected over gas service lines.

Section 6. Any person, firm or corporation hereafter erecting a building or structure, shall make provisions for sheltering

gas meter or meters as provided by the gas ordinance, passed by the Board of Commissioners on the 11th day of August, A. D. 1927.

Section 7. The rules and regulations of the National Board of Fire Underwriters embodied in its "Building Code" published in 1920 and such subsequent codes amended and supplements of said National Board of Fire Underwriters which may hereafter be adopted, are hereby adopted as the rules and regulations to govern and to be observed and followed in all constructions, repairs and alterations of buildings and structures except as otherwise specially provided in building ordinances of the City of Ballinger, and the same are hereby made a part of this ordinance as fully and to the same extent as if copied herein in full, and the interpretation of such code by the building inspector shall be final and conclusive.

Section 8. Every person, firm or corporation violating any provision of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction therefore in the Corporation Court of the City of Ballinger shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00.

Section 9. This ordinance shall be construed as affecting and repealing ordinances heretofore passed by the City of Ballinger, only in so far as the provisions of such ordinances with the provisions of this ordinance shall be in conflict, and the provisions of this ordinance shall be held to be cumulative of any ordinances heretofore passed by the City of Ballinger regulating the construction, alteration, maintenance, removal and repair of buildings within the city of Ballinger, Texas.

Section 10. The fact that there is now no ordinance in effect in the City of Ballinger regulating excavation under side walks or streets or over sidewalks, parkways, or streets, and the further fact that there is now no ordinance regulating the apportionment of fees for services of the Building Inspector, or regulating the building of any structure over a gas service main, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity that this ordinance be passed without delay and it is therefore ordered that all rules requiring the reading of an ordinance more than once be and the same are hereby expressly suspended and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its first reading, approval and publication.

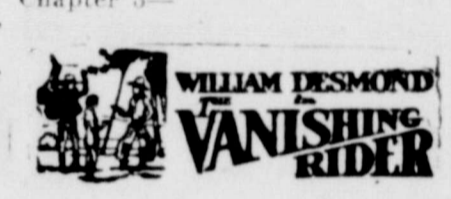

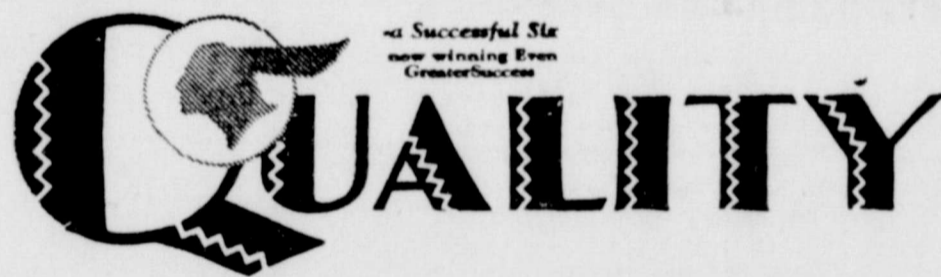

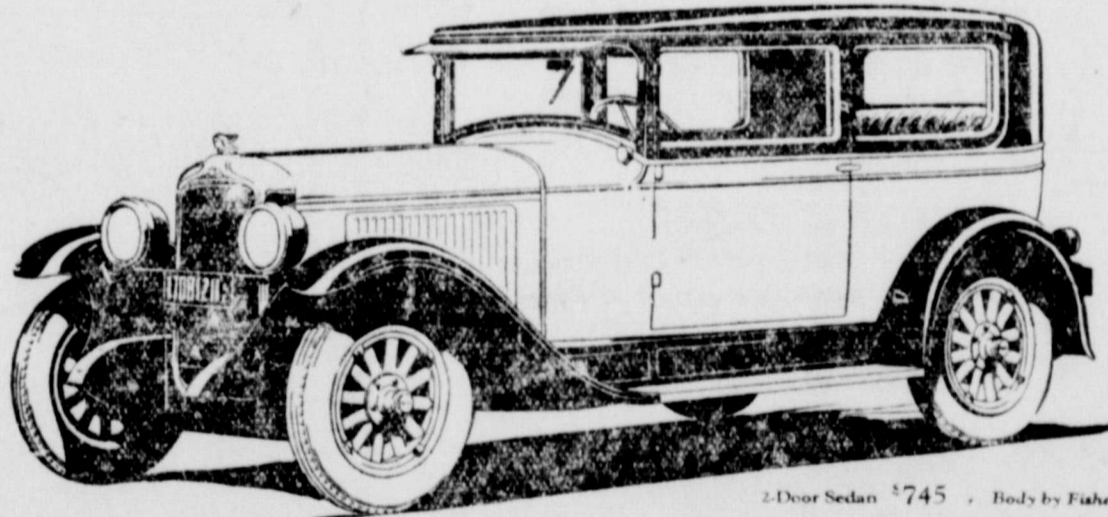
