Runnels Delegates To Short Course Return

More than 60 Runnels County delegates to the A. & M. College short course returned from College Station Saturday afternoon following five days of intensive study on agricultural topics. The delegation this year, under the supervision of C. W. Lehmburg, County Agent, and Mrs. Lura Hollingsworth, Home Demonstration agent, established a record for the county.

Most of the delegates were housed in dormitories especially arranged for the course, while a few went prepared to camp. Meals were provided in the college mess hall.

Lessons, lectures, and demonstrations were held daily. The schedule of the day was divided into two chief sections, with sessions each morning and afternoon. Students were classified on the first day of the short course according to their preferences.

Specialists on every phase of agriculture were at the short course for instructional purposes. Recreational diversions were planned in advance, and the entire local delegation declared that the short course was highly successful from every standpoint.

Bakery Move Takes Effect

A second meeting of local merchants was held Monday morning with reference to the move in which a pledge to retail only Ballinger-made bread was adopted, and the agreement became effective at the meeting. This move of the merchants is not to be interpreted as a discrimination against outside competition, it was again pointed out, but is to be construed as part of a policy of enterprising business men to encourage and support home industries.

The agreement and its indorsements follow:
"For the purpose of protecting local industry, as well as to encourage more and better business for Ballinger, we, the undersigned retailers of bread agree to support only local bakeries, so long as their prices are in line and the quality of their bread up to the present standard; it being understood that this proposition is to go into effect Monday, August 6th, 1928."

\$32,000,000 in Bonuses Paid to Osage Indians in Last 10 Years

BARTLESVILLE, Okla., Aug. 6.—Nearly \$32,000,000 in bonuses royalties and taxes have been paid to the Osage Indians and to Osage county in the ten years ending in 1927, according to statistics given out by the Phillips Petroleum company and other operators in the Barbank field in that county.

Figuring the total of 2,229 headrights on the tribal roll, the Phillips company alone has paid in nearly \$14,000 per headright.

The Phillips company is paying nearly \$2,500 daily as royalties in Osage county, despite the fact that little new production work has been done for some time.

ROWENA GROUP VISITS HERE IN INTEREST OF GOOD ROAD MOVEMENT

E. J. Cervenka, cashier of the First National Bank of Rowena accompanied by William Lehr, B. L. Wilberg and Clem Hoelscher, farmers of that place, were here Monday to confer with County Judge Paul Trimmer with reference to the \$225,000 road bond issue to be voted on September 1. The group was seeking official information, in order to clarify hundreds of voters in that section of the county who are not familiar with the proposed program.

Mr. Cervenka expressed his belief that the issue would carry in that district. The citizens of Rowena prefer to have the highway constructed parallel with the railroad, rather than through the business district, provided the bond issue carries, he said. At one time there was agitation to have the highway designation changed so as to include the principal street, but after a study of traffic problems it was decided that it would be more practical to retain the present designation.

Mr. Cervenka procured a county map on which the road district recently created was bounded as an accommodation to Rowena voters who do not clearly understand the proposition.

3 Kinds of Methodist May United, In England After 15 Year Battle

LONDON, Aug. 6.—After fifteen years negotiation and argument that at one time threatened to split the three branches of the Methodist church irrevocably, union of the three segments is now regarded as a certainty.

The annual conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church has accepted the proposals for union on behalf of the 500,000 members of the church in Great Britain, and as the Primitive Methodist and the United Methodists have already agreed on the same proposals, all that remains is that an Enabling Bill should be passed through parliament.

Fliers Plan Return Trip

OPORTO, Aug. 6.—The Polish fliers Louis Idzkowski and Casimir Kubala rested here today preparatory to returning to Paris. The fliers were forced down by a break in the fuel tank of their biplane eighty miles south of Cape Finisterre, Spain, Sunday morning.

At one time the fliers, on the proposed Leborget to New York hop were more than half way across the Atlantic, it is believed, before returning back. The plane was badly damaged in landing, and both fliers were slightly injured.

WANTS TEXAS UNIVERSITY TO SUPPORT ITS SELF

SAN ANGELO, Aug. 6.—Although not a member of the next legislature, J. Herschel Boggs, member of the 40th legislature, is to renew his fight to compel the University of Texas to either sell or pay taxes on 2,000,000 acres of land owned by that institution in West Texas.

Boggs has already addressed a memorial to the members of the 41st Legislature which convenes next January urging the members to join him "in mapping out a program whereby the University of Texas can be made an endowed university rather than a state supported institution."

"I believe the Legislature," Boggs said, "has the constitutional authority to appropriate \$10,000,000 every two years to go into a permanent or endowment fund until a sufficient endowment fund is created, and by selling the 2,000,000 acres of University lands in West Texas (which the constitution says shall be sold) and placing this fifty or seventy five million dollars derived from the sale of these lands, in the endowment or permanent fund, we soon would have a sufficient fund to provide for a university of the first class, as our forefathers evidently intended."

"As soon as this fund reaches \$100,000,000, the interest would make the university self-supporting, and the tax-payers would then be saved the four to six million dollars that we now appropriate from the state treasury to support the university."

MOUNDS ILL., Aug. 6.—Eight bodies have been recovered from the wreckage to two Illinois Central trains near here this morning. One more passenger is believed dead, and approximately seventy-five others are injured, some seriously.

Railway officials declare that a castiron water pipe, twenty feet long and two feet wide, rolled off of a loaded freight car and caused the wreck by striking a southward track and spreading it as a New Orleans limited was passing, derailing the engine and ten cars.

The derailed cars crashed into the side of a Chicawpa limited, standing on the track at the time, knocking seven of its cars off the track.

Thirty of the injured passengers were taken to a hospital at Cairo. Details are lacking because the wreck knocked down telegraph and telephone wires.

Railway officials declared that the wreck occurred at 3:10 o'clock this morning. The New Orleans train was the most damaged, and the death list was almost exclusively confined to it. The injured were removed to hospitals in Cairo, Memphis and St. Louis.

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1928 AUGUST 1928

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Ordinance providing a system of parking for all motor driven vehicles within the city of Ballinger, Texas; prohibiting racing on public streets by motor driven vehicles; regulating action of all vehicles on the public streets when fire alarm is sounded; prohibiting negligent collisions; prohibiting the driving of a motor vehicle by any person while intoxicated, or otherwise incapable of operating same; prohibiting parking within ten feet of a fire plug; and otherwise regulating the use of the streets of the City of Ballinger by traffic; repealing certain ordinances in conflict, fixing a penalty and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ballinger:

Section No. 1. At the approach of any fire engine, hook and ladder or other apparatus belonging to the fire department of the City of Ballinger, when the same is answering an alarm of fire, all railroad trains and engines which may be standing upon or across any public street in said city shall immediately, on the approach of any fire apparatus and upon the sounding of the fire alarm, be removed by the crew in charge of the same from across any such public street, likewise all motor driven vehicles or horse drawn vehicles shall immediately upon the sounding of an alarm for fire or at the approach of any fire engine or other apparatus answering a call for fire without the sounding of the general alarm, proceed to the right and curb line of any said street, alley or driveway of said city or as near thereto as possible and come to a full stop and there remain until such fire apparatus shall have passed.

Section No. 2. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons to drive or propel a motor driven or horse drawn vehicle closer than three hundred feet to the location of any fire in the City of Ballinger, while the fire is burning and while the fire department shall be in attendance on said fire.

Section No. 3. No person or persons in charge of or operating an automobile or any other motor driven vehicle or horse drawn vehicle, shall race the same with any other vehicle, person or animal upon any of the public streets, alleys or driveways of the City of Ballinger.

Section No. 4. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons or the agent, servant or employees of any corporation to allow any locomotive engine or motor driven vehicle of any kind to negligently or carelessly cause any such engine or railroad train or motor driven vehicle to come into collision with or strike any person, automobile or other vehicle or to inflict any damage on any property whatsoever.

Section No. 5. No person or persons shall operate or attempt to operate any motor driven vehicle upon any of the public streets, alleys or driveways in the City of Ballinger while such person is in a state of intoxication, or in any other respect incapable of properly and safely operating or driving such automobile or other vehicle.

Section No. 6. All motor driven or horse drawn vehicles and ridden horses, while on the streets, alleys and driveways of the City of Ballinger, shall be ridden or driven upon the right hand side of such street, alley or drive-

way and as near the right hand curb line as possible or practicable.

Section No. 7. Whenever any driver or person in charge of any motor driven vehicle or other vehicle or ridden animal attempts to pass any other vehicle of any character or any ridden animal upon any street, alley or driveway within the limits of the City of Ballinger, going in the same direction such motor driven vehicle or horsedrawn vehicle or ridden animal shall be driven and shall pass to the left of any other vehicle or ridden animal being passed.

Section No. 8. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons in charge of a operating any motor driven vehicle, buggy, wagon, saddle animal or other kind of vehicle or conveyance to stop or park the same on any of the public streets or alleys of the City of Ballinger within ten feet of any fire plug or hydrant now or which shall hereafter be installed in or upon such street or alley.

Section No. 9. In turning any corner from a street into an alley or from an alley into a street only right hand turns shall be allowed. Crossing a street at an alley intersection is expressly prohibited. This provision shall apply to all motor and horse drawn vehicles and ridden animals.

Section No. 10. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person or persons in charge of or driving any motor driven vehicle of any character or any horse drawn vehicle or any ridden saddle animal, to change direction and turn same at any other place than at an intersection of streets, except in case of alley turns as provided in the preceding section, and any such turns shall be made only by passing around the righthand side of the center of such intersection of street, if same is to be left turn from one street into another street or alley or driveway such vehicle shall be kept as close to the right hand curb of any such street, alley or driveway as possible; provided that this article shall apply to all motor driven vehicles, horse drawn vehicles, bicycles and ridden animals.

Section No. 11. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any owner or operators of any motor driven vehicles or horsedrawn vehicles, bicycles or rider of a saddle animal to stop the same within any intersection of streets, alley or driveways, except to avoid a collision or to prevent danger to persons or property; and further provided on the event any driver or person in charge of an automobile or other motor driven vehicle intends to stop said vehicle at any place except to park same in accordance with this ordinance he shall signify his intention of so stopping by extending his hand out from the left hand side of such vehicle.

Section No. 12. It shall hereafter be unlawful for any owner or persons operating or in charge of the operation of any motor driven vehicle of any character to stop same upon any public street within the limits of the City of Ballinger, except by parking same at an angle of 45 degrees with the sidewalk or curb or property line of said street, and with the right front wheel of any such vehicle within 12 inches of the curb or property line, the practice known as double parking, that is, stopping a vehicle of any character upon any such public street behind a row of parked cars thereon or otherwise than as above provided is hereby expressly forbidden and prohibited, but any such vehicle shall be headed into the curb or sidewalk as above provided.

Section No. 13. That part of Hutchins Avenue between Ninth street and Seventh Street, and that part of Eighth street between Railroad Avenue and Strong Avenue are hereby designated and fixed as a limited parking area, and between the hours of nine a. m. and nine p. m. it shall be unlawful for any person or persons in charge of or operating any motor driven vehicle of any kind or character to park any such vehicle for a longer period than two hours in any one given place; provided that moving any such vehicle out of such parking space in which it is located and putting such vehicle back into the same space or within ten feet thereof shall not be construed as interrupting the running of the two hour period.

Section No. 14. Any person or persons riding in any such motor driven vehicles or horse drawn vehicles or horse drawn vehicles as are affected by the preceding provisions of this ordinance, and who at the time are exercising

authority over the action and movements of the actual driver or operator of any such vehicle, such person or persons being the owner or owners of any such vehicles or legally entitled to the use and possession thereof shall be equally liable and subject to the penalties of the law for violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance in the same manner as the actual driver or operator of such vehicle would be.

Section No. 15. If any part or portion of this ordinance is held to be unconstitutional or void for any reason, the invalidity of any such part or parts of same shall not affect the validity of the remaining parts or portions thereof.

Section No. 16. The provisions of an ordinance of the City of Ballinger passed and approved on the first day of June, 1915, providing for numbers, lights and horns, fixing driver's rules and regulations for motor driven vehicles, regulating traffic, as recorded in Book 1, page 699 of the Minutes of the City Commission of the City of Ballinger are hereby expressly repealed; the provisions of an ordinance of the City of Ballinger passed and approved on the 6th day June, 1916, regulating speed of motor driven vehicles within the said city and regulating parking of such vehicles are hereby expressly repealed; section six and section seven of an ordinance passed and approved by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Ballinger on the 13th day of September, 1926, regulating traffic on the public streets within the City of Ballinger are hereby expressly repealed; all other ordinances, or parts of ordinances in conflict with the provisions of this ordinance shall be and the same are hereby expressly repealed, but nothing herein contained shall be construed as changing or

repealing any other ordinances now in force in the City of Ballinger not in conflict with the provisions hereof, but as to such other ordinances or parts thereof, this ordinance shall be deemed and held to be cumulative only.

Section No. 17. In all arrests and convictions of offenders against the provisions of this ordinance, no cost shall be taxed against any such offender or violator of the provisions of any of the said sections of this ordinance, but any such person who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by a fine only of not less than one dollar and not more than fifty dollars.

The fact that there is now a great congestion of traffic within the City of Ballinger, which is not properly regulated and with the resulting danger to life and property, especially in the business portion of said city, creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity for the immediate passage of this ordinance, and all rules requiring more than one reading before final passage are hereby expressly suspended and this ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and publication.

Notice of Road Bond Election

 TO THE RESIDENT PROPERTY TAXPAYING VOTERS OF ROAD DISTRICT NO. 3 OF RUMMELS COUNTY, TEXAS:
 TAKE NOTICE: That an election shall be held on the 1st day of September, 1928, within Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, to determine if said road district shall issue bonds, and if a tax shall be levied in payment thereof in obedience to an election order entered by the Commissioners' Court on the 30th day of July, 1928; which is as follows: THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF RUMMELS.

On this the 30th day of July, A. D. 1928, the Commissioners' Court of Rummels County, Texas, convened in special session in the usual meeting place at the County Courthouse at Ballinger, Texas, all members of the court, to-wit:

Paul Trimmer, County Judge;
 R. J. Deens, Commissioner Precinct No. 1;
 D. W. Yeager, Commissioner, Precinct No. 2;

H. B. Poe, Commissioner Precinct No. 3;
 R. A. Perry, Commissioner, Precinct No. 4;

being present, came on to be considered the petition of W. C. McCarver and 121 other persons, praying that bonds be issued by Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, in the sum of \$525,000.00, serially or otherwise, not to exceed thirty (30) years from date thereof, for the purpose of the purchase and construction of district roads, and the further construction, maintaining and operation macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, in said district, and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon all property of Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity; and

IT APPEARING to the court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property-taxpaying voters of said Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING that the amount of bonds to be issued will not exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of said Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING that said Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, has been duly established by an order of the Commissioners' Court of Rummels County, Texas, dated the 9th day of July, 1928, of record in Book No. 7, pages 200-201 of the Minutes of said court, and the boundaries thereof are herein described as described and defined in the order of the Commissioners' Court establishing such district as follows, to-wit:

BEGINNING at the southeast corner of said Rummels County; THENCE west, with the south boundary line of said county, to the southwest corner of said Rummels County;

THENCE north, with the west boundary line of said County, to the Colorado River;

THENCE down said river, with its meanders, to a point south of the southeast corner of William owell Survey No. 821;

THENCE in a northeasterly direction to the southwest corner of the Carter Anderson Survey No. 523;

THENCE east to the east boundary line of said Rummels County;

THENCE south, with the east boundary line of said Rummels County, to the place of beginning.

AND IT FURTHER APPEARING that the following road district in Rummels County, Texas, has heretofore issued road bonds under provisions of Chapter 2, Title 18, R. S. 1911, which district is now included in Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, to-wit, Road District No. 1, date of bonds July 10th, 1918, numbered consecutively from 1 to 75, inclusive, for the sum of \$1,000.00 each, aggregating the sum of \$75,000.00, payable at Hanover National Bank, New York City, New York, due and payable serially 1 to 40 years from date, with interest at the rate of 5 1/2% per annum, payable annually, and of which bonds there are now outstanding and unpaid Bonds Nos. 29 to 75 in the sum of 47,000.00.

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the court that said district does not embrace any part of a road district that heretofore been established and that has issued

bonds and is now outstanding and unpaid, except as stated herein; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the court that said petition was presented to the Commissioners' Court of Rummels County, Texas, on the 10th day of July, 1928, and that the said Commissioners' Court did on the 10th day of July, 1928, set such petition down for hearing on the 30th day of July, 1928, said date being not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of said order fixing the time and place of such hearing; and

IT FURTHER APPEARING to the court that due notice of such hearing has been given, and the court having heard all arguments and discussion in favor of, and there being none against, the issuance of said bonds, the court is of the opinion and so finds that said petition is signed by fifty or a majority of the resident property-taxpaying voters of such road district, and that due notice has been given and that the proposed improvements would be for the benefit of all taxable property situated in such road district;

IT IS, THEREFORE, CONSIDERED, AND ORDERED by the court that an election be held in said Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, on the 1st day of September, A. D. 1928, which is not less than thirty days from the date of this order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"Whether or not the bonds of Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, shall be issued by the Commissioners' Court in the sum of \$525,000.00, for the purpose of the purchase and construction of road district roads and the further construction, maintaining and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads, and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, throughout said district as follows:

1. Bonds aggregating \$47,000.00 to be issued for the purpose of the purchase and construction of district roads in said Road District No. 1 of Rummels County, Texas, having the same dates of maturity, bearing the same rates of interest, and with similar options of payment as the bonds heretofore issued and now outstanding against said district No. 1, now a part of said Roads District No. 3, Rummels County, Texas; and

2. Bonds aggregating \$478,000.00 to be issued for the purpose of the further construction, main-

tenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, throughout the district, and maturing at such times as may be fixed by the Commissioners' Court, serially or otherwise, not exceeding thirty years from date thereof, and bearing interest at the rate of not exceeding 5 1/2% per annum; and

Whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said Road District No. 3, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof at maturity.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 16, General Laws of the State of Texas, passed at the First Called Session of the 39th Legislature. All persons who are legally qualified voters of this State and of this county, and who are resident property taxpayers in Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, shall be entitled to vote at said election, and all voters desiring to support the proposition to issue the bonds shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF" and those opposed shall have written or printed on their ballots the words "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF A TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

The voting places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

At the Court House in the town of Ballinger, with E. F. Krebs, as presiding officer, with A. J. Thorp as associate officer; and with Drury P. Hathaway and Harry Lynn, as clerks; where all persons may vote who are entitled to vote at said election and who reside in either of the following regular voting precincts, viz: Ballinger No. 1, Hatchel No. 2, Benoit No. 3, Hagan No. 18, Bethel No. 24 and Ballinger No. 24.

At the Hancock Building in the town of Miles, with C. L. West as Presiding Officer, with B. A. Lott as Associate Officer; and with C. S. Coleman and A. H. Lewin as Clerks; where all persons may vote who are entitled to vote at said election and who reside in either of the following regular voting precincts, viz: Brookshire No. 19, and Miles No. 20.

At the Public School Building in the town of Rowena, with W. A. Halameek as Presiding Officer, with W. A. Eggemeyer as Associate Officer; and with Henry Teplock and O. M. Droll as Clerks; where all persons may

vote who are entitled to vote at said election and who reside in either of the following regular voting precincts, viz: Rowena Rowena No. 21 and Olin No. 22.

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the General Laws of the State of Texas as regulating general elections when not in conflict with the provisions of the statutes herein above referred to.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order in The Daily Ledger, a newspaper published in the County of Rummels, for three successive weeks before the date of said election, and, in addition thereto, there shall be posted four copies of this order, three of which shall be posted at public places within said Road District No. 3 of Rummels County, Texas, and one of which shall be at the courthouse door of Rummels County, Texas, for three successive weeks prior to said election.

The County Judge is hereby directed to cause said notices to be published and posted, as hereinabove directed, and further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officers and received by this court.

Waste of By-Products Blamed by Lake Erie Rum Runners
Experts for Many Farm Troubles

(By International News Service)
CHICAGO, Aug. 6.—Pointing out that immense sums are lost yearly through waste of farm by-products, Dr. H. G. Knight, Chemical Bureau chief of the Department of Agriculture declared that chemical research has practically solved this phase of the agricultural problem.

In his address before the opening session of the American Chemical Society Institute at Northwestern University, Dr. Knight told the society that "the disposal of corn stalks, straw, and other agricultural residue to manufacturers should be carefully considered by farmers." While an offer of cash may tempt the farmer to sell the agriculture head said "the product is of greater value in the end when utilized on the farm."

Dr. Knight further declared that "substantial additions to the nation's wealth will result when experiments are completed."

They held orgies in secret caves under the pretext of "rain-making feasts," and it is believed the relics just discovered are the remains of one of their "feasts."
