Robinson To Be Cisco Visitor

Special to The Ledger: CISCO, Sept. 1.—An Arkansas reunion will be held in Cisco Tuesday, September 4th, when Senator Joe Robinson, the most famous "Arkansas Traveler" brings the message of an united Democracy to this city located in the heart of West Texas. Dr. Chas. Hale and Col. R. L. Poe, both former citizens of Arkansas who are now naturalized West Texans, will be hosts to all former Arkansians who are now inhabitants of West Texas at a watermelon feast on the evening of September 4th at Lake Cisco. These gentlemen constitute the committee appointed to entertain the former Arkansians who come to Cisco to hear the first candidate for the office of Vice-President of the United States since the Civil War to honor the West by placing a West Texas town upon his itinerary for a national speaking campaign. Incidentally, Cisco is the smallest town in the United States to be so honored. This statement is upon the authority of the National Democratic Committee. Like the citizens of the "Free State of Van Zandt," the Arkansians are noted for the characteristic of standing together. Judge Eugene E. Lanford, present citizen of Cisco, who was a former state senator from Duvall's Bluff, Arkansas, extended an invitation to the Arkansas Senator, now candidate for the second highest office within the gift of the people of the United States, to visit the Big Dam City and explain to the people of West Texas just why they should support the national ticket in November. Judge Lanford assured the distinguished senator that in addition to being the home of the biggest hollow-concrete dam in the world and the home of the largest concrete bathing beach in existence, that Cisco is at the cross-roads of two important state highways and two important railroads serving West Texas, and that the people of West Texas could be counted upon to attend his speaking in Cisco at least fifteen to twenty thousand strong. Senator Robinson immediately accepted Lanford's statement at face value and placed Cisco upon his itinerary, and will make one of the two speeches he will deliver in Texas, within the shadow of the big dam upon the football field of the Big Dam Lobos. Seating capacity exists at this stadium for fifteen thousand people, and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce has made arrangements to expand this capacity to care for twenty thousand visitors who are expected to hear the message of Democracy which Senator Joe Robinson will deliver.

(By International News Service) NEW YORK, Sept. 1.—Rabbi Leon Harrison, a retired St. Louis rabbi, committed suicide here this morning by jumping under the wheels of a north-bound subway train. The Jewish divine had just returned from Europe where he suffered a nervous breakdown.

Blind Institute Field Agent Here

W. C. Tenney, field agent of the Texas School for Blind, Austin, was in the city on official business Saturday. Mr. Tenney reported that only one student from Runnels county was enrolled in the school, as far as he had learned. He came here in response to another application, but found that the family seeking accommodations at the school had moved from the county recently. The average cost per pupil is \$500 per year, Mr. Tenney said. The school is open to any blind or near-blind person, with age limits extending from 6 to 21 for the regular 9-months session, and from 6 to 50 for the summer term. A total of 240 pupils were enrolled last year. The school maintains intensive field work, said Mr. Tenney, and there is always room for any pupil, the enrollment being considerably lower than the number which the institution is equipped to care for. Accommodations provided by the state include room and board, tuition, books and instruments, laundry, and medical attention. Anyone interested in the school should communicate with Superintendent A. C. Ellis, State School for Blind, Austin, Mr. Tenney advised.

Chicken Thief Gets Full Pardon

Dan Moody today issued one of a few pardons since he assumed office, to Earl Martin, Kaufman county negro, who was sentenced to one year for chicken theft. The negro's conviction was illegal under the constitution, the governor's statement said.

Young People To Support Al Smith

Y., Sept. 1.—Governor Al Smith is counting on the votes of the young folks in the coming general election, friends of the Democratic presidential nominee said today. There will be thousands of young men and women in the densely populated Eastern states to cast their first ballot, and Smith is claimed to have caught the popular fancy of the younger group of voters.

Big Oil Operators Of Southwest Take Lead In Airplane Building

(By International News Service) WICHITA, Kas., Sept. 1.—Fully a score of oil operators throughout the oil fields of the Southwest are engaging in the manufacture of airplanes.
Perhaps it is because the industry suggests adventure and promises big profits that the operators have been attracted into some of the leading posts in the airplane manufacturing business. For the average oil man is progressive and as a sportsman, the love for adventure presented by one of the country's newest industries is undoubtedly attractive to them.

Nevertheless, regardless of the reasons why, the airplane manufacturing industry is a strong magnet for the oil producers. Most every oil operator and producer is interested in it, either directly as an executive in one of the companies or indirectly as it will form a new market for their products.

One of the most prominent men in the industry is W. M. Moore, Wichita, Kas. He is president of the Swallow Airplane Company, the oldest manufacturer of commercial planes in the United States. Moore is reputed to be one of the biggest owners of airplane securities in the United States. He is known to be a heavy holder of stock in the Travel Air Company.

Then there is W. R. Ritchey, Moore's partner in the oil business in the firm of Ritchey & Moore. Although an associate of Moore's in the oil business office, he is his competitor in the airplane industry as president of the Swift Aircraft Corporation.

Deering J. Marshall, who was a shoe clerk in 1916, traded a Ford car for an oil lease and made a million dollars, is vice-president of the Red Bird Aircraft Company. Marshall, however, like the others is still actively engaged in the oil business.

One of Kansas' best known oil producers, Harry H. Patton, president of the Cassoday Oil Corporation, is engaged in the manufacture of airplane motors. His factory is in Wichita, where he manufactures the Quick, a 9-cylinder air-cooled radial motor.
G. A. Stearns of the Stearns-Streeter Company, a concern that has done more to develop west-

ern Kansas oil resources than any other operator, is a director of the Travel Air Manufacturing Company, one of the three largest manufacturers of commercial airplanes in the world.

W. G. Skelly of the Skelly Oil Company, Tulsa, Okla., is building the Spartan. He is said to have a fine plant there.

The Phillips Petroleum Company at Bartlesville, Okla., contributes regularly to competitions calculated to advance commercial aviation, and is reported to be considering engagement in the manufacture of aircraft.

This long list of prominent oil producers, each of them already millionaires from their oil developments stabilizes the belief that oil men are perhaps more vitally interested in the development of the commercial aviation than any other business group in the United States.

Only recently the Tide-Water Oil Company donated all of the oil for Commander Richard E. Byrd's flight into the Antarctic waste lands. Perhaps this was for an advertising medium usage. Nevertheless, there are indications from it that oil companies are not ignoring this future market for their products.

Besides that more and more of their executives are entering this manufacturing field. It may be but a short time until consolidations in the industry can be effected. For example, take the interests of W. M. Moore in the Swallow Airplane Company as its president, and those of his oil partner W. R. Ritchey as president of the Swift Aircraft Company as a point where consolidation might begin.

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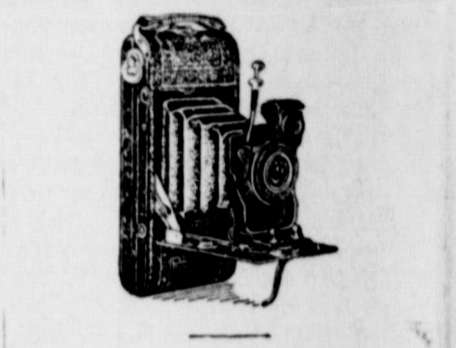

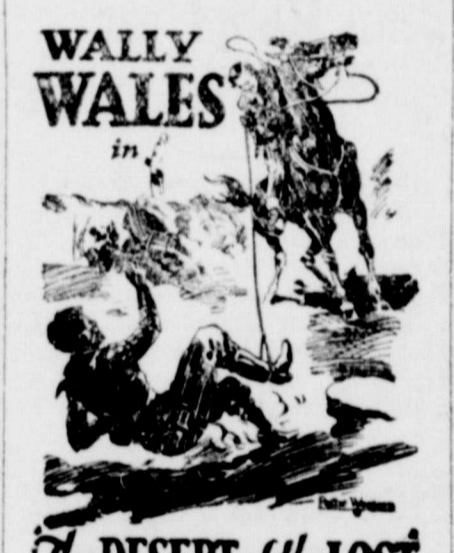
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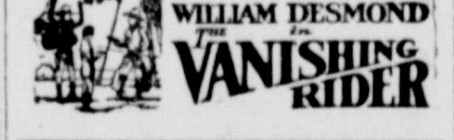

Radio Light Is Now Predicted With New Bulb

(By International News Service)
SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—House light by wireless. Radio illumination tuned to the knife and fork frequency of the dining table. Pretty little neons chasing themselves up and down the glass tubes while papapreads the comics.

Also low frequency saffrons while sister necks in the alcove. Such is the engaging vista of the future switched on today by Dr. Karl T. Compton, professor of physics at Princeton University and at present sojourning in Berkeley as a member of the University of California summer session faculty.

"House lighting of the future may be done with bulbs containing no filament and not directly connected with an electrical circuit, but operated by radio waves," Dr. Compton remarks.

He is himself doing research work in this field and is a consultant of the General Electric Company and of the Fixed Nitrogen Research Laboratory in Washington, D. C.

His prediction of high powered gloom chasers for the humble home is not an unfounded dream. Dr. Compton asserts, but a logical prophecy based on the apparent success of neon and other gases in the now commonly seen street display lights, and experiments with lights of this type at airplane landing fields and on the increasing amount of research being done with regard to radiation and atomic structure in gases.

"The wireless or radio light has already been used successfully for special purposes," Dr. Compton points out. "In Scheenectady, N. Y., a large light of

this variety was mounted on the tower of WGY radio station. It illuminated the entire city and made it possible to read newspapers at a distance of two miles from the source.

"A landing light of this kind also is in use at the New York terminal airplane landing field."

According to Dr. Compton the radio light is of great value because of its efficiency and because the bulbs are practically everlasting when once installed, unless actually smashed.

One problem is a proper mixture of the gases to make a light suitable to the human eye.

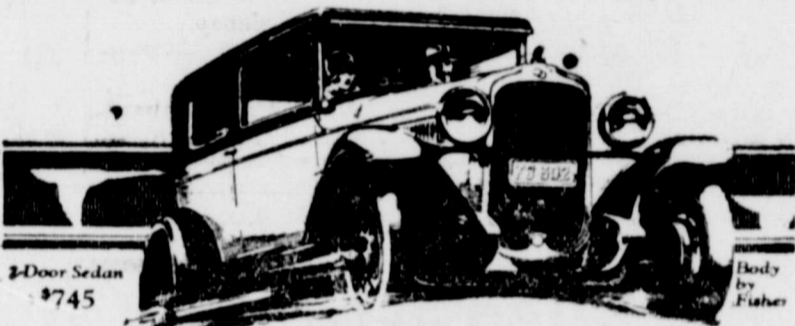
