## School Enrollment Here Extra Large

The Ballinger high school is getting underway with from 35 to 40 more students than were in school at this time last year, according to information furnished by Supt. H. C. Lyon. The primary department was overrun the first day of school when 45 students between the ages of 6 and 7 years reported and only 18 could be accepted, the remainder being sent home until some arrangement could be made to handle them. The board of trustees is now considering engaging another primary teacher so that all these children can be taken care of and it is probable that the teacher will be added immediately.

Other grades are full and very little room remains to accommodate students who are expected to enroll later. The board wishes to be understood plainly on the question of paying the two avenues on each side of the school buildings. The trustees went on record some time ago as being willing to pave either of the avenues connecting Eighth Street and Broadway, or they are willing to pave both. A rumor has circulated that the school board was holding up the paving of these two streets, but according to Mr. Lyon's statement Thursday this is not true, and the board is willing to cooperate on one or both.

Drive slow signs will be placed on the streets leading past the school campus and every motorist will be asked to observe these signs or expect prosecution. The law states that 12 miles is the limit in the vicinity of a school, and for the protection of the children this law will be enforced by the city and county officials.

Mayonnaise dressing is the clean, round, emulsified product composed of edible vegetable oil, egg yolk or whole egg, vinegar or lemon juice, with or without one or more of the following: Salt, other condiments, sugar, edible stabilizing material.

Science Fails In Reproducing Scent of Rose

WASHINGTON, Sept. 6—The laboratories of America have become the home of many a rare perfume and flavor which formerly could be obtained only in far, exotic places, but even science cannot exactly reproduce the treasure of the rose.

The National Geographic Society, in a report which lauds the accomplishments of modern chemistry in "freeing the world from economic bondage" to the distant places, admits that the wonders produced by nature in some of these places can be neither reproduced or explained by science.

The report gives science the decision in the battle between nature and man, for economic reasons, but does not grant superior excellence to the chemists' products.

"Independence (of nature) has not been achieved entirely, but if all flowers lost their perfumes and colors, all spices their pungence and most fruits their fragrance, chemists could closely imitate most of these factors synthetically," the report says.

"But were synthetics banished from our lives, all the fields, forests and oceans could not support us in the luxury to which we have become accustomed," it continues.

Declaring that we can "do without" the products of such places as Reunion Island, the Guianas, Bulgaria's Valley of Roses, Tibet, Formosa, Malaya, and others, the Society cites the number of these products which are manufactured synthetically in the United States.

"The indigo blue of India comes today from Wilmington, Delaware; the precious musk of Tibetan mountain deer is imitated in Delawanna, New Jersey; the equal of tannin from Argentina quebracho from a Rensselaer, New York chemical vat. Balsam of Peru might logically be called "Balsam of Pennsylvania," the Society asserts.

Most of these products and many others are extracted from coal tar, discovered accidentally by William Perkin, a London chemist, in 1856. Synthetics from cotton, corn, wood and air-

nitrogen range from rayon underwear to synthetic pearls.

Thousands of Levant farmers have had to look for something else to cultivate because coal tar red has eliminated madder red which came from madder plants they formerly grew. Synthetic resins have taken the place of the kauri gum of New Zealand. Synthetic nitrates have taken a share of the world market from Chilean nitrates. Malaya and Sumatra live in fear that a synthetic rubber will be perfected.

Even the royal camphor monopoly enjoyed by the Japanese emperor in Formosa is less valuable since the perfection of synthetic camphor.

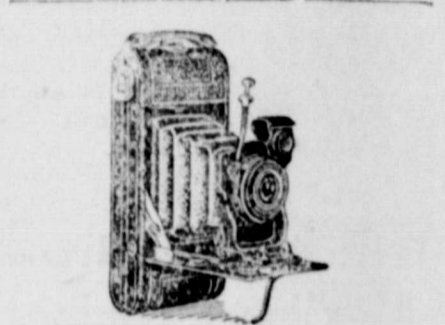
But, the Society finally admits, the Riviera sunshine can still perform an office for flowers which test tubes cannot perform for synthetic perfumes, and American synthetic attar of roses is only "almost equal to that distilled from thousands of buds gathered in the dew of the morning in Bulgaria's Valley of Roses."

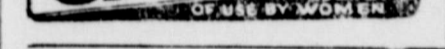

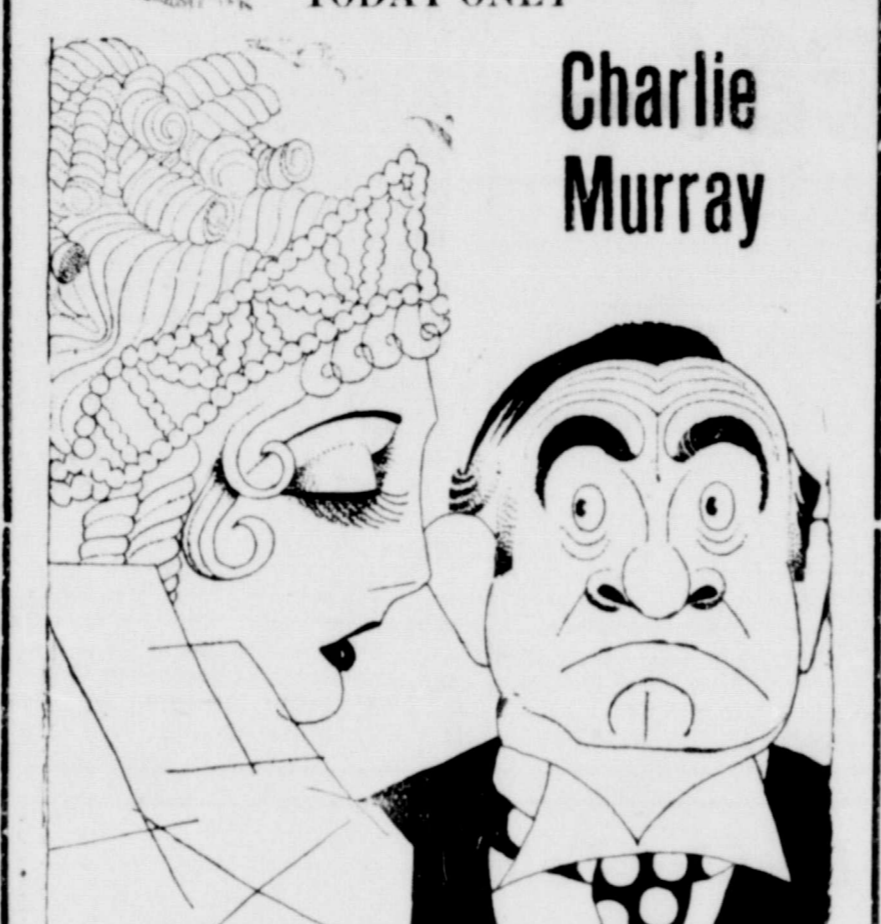

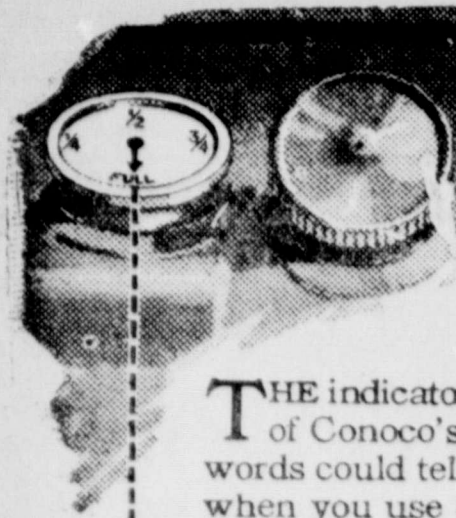

STUDENT ETHER FROLICS LED TO DISCOVERY OF MODERN ANESTHETIC

(By International News Service) BERKELEY, Calif., Sept. 6.—"Ether frolics," indulged in by medical students was responsible for its ultimate use as an anesthetic. This was revealed today by Dr. Mary F. Kavanagh, assistant clinical professor of anesthesia in the University of California hospital in an article published by the Journal of California and Western Medicine. Before the discovery of the usefulness of ether in painless surgery, the article discloses, medical students, unaware of the danger, used it as a drug and used to go on "ether jags." It was first used by one of these students, Dr. C. W. Long, a country practitioner of Jefferson, Ga., who, remembering its effects, first used it as an anesthetic in 1842.

ART LOVERS IN FRANCE WORRYING OVER FATE OF FAMOUS TAPESTRIES

(By International News Service) FONTAINEBLEAU, Sept. 6.—The fate of fifty valuable tapestries that once hung in the Fontainebleau Palace, is mystifying to art lovers hereabouts. The tapestries have been sequestered one by one during the last decade. They include such works of art as "The Seasons," by d'Andran, the famous "Esther and Psyche" series, and five tapestries from "Triumph of the Gods" hung in the apartment of Pope Pius VII. Officially, these tapestries have been removed temporarily by orders from the Fine Arts Ministry, but since none seems to know their present whereabouts, some newspapers have started a vigorous campaign to have them returned to the palace.

## 47 Nations Join to Complete Work on World Atlas

(By International News Service) LONDON, Sept. 6.—A world atlas, with each nation's contributions of maps, drawn to exactly the same scale and on the same lines, comprising about 1,920 sheets to cover all the land on the globe, is in the process of formation.

Delegates appointed by forty-seven governments attended a great International Geographical Congress at Cambridge to report on the progress of the map.

The work, though first conceived in 1891 and begun in 1909, will not be finished for many years. Indeed, some countries, including America and Australia have hardly made a beginning.

Brazil, on the other hand, a country with vast tracts of un-surveyed land, has sent in more sheets than any other nation.

More than 200 maps have been drawn up so far, the uniform size for each sheet being six degrees longitude and four degrees latitude. The completed maps are done in layer tint, the contours being shown by various colors from green at sea level to dark brown at 3,000 metres above the sea.

Towns, lighthouses, six types of roads, tracks, streams and railways are all marked in a uniform manner in every country. A feature of this exactitude is the necessity of many sheets with a tiny corner of land in a vast sea.

The maps of Britain and France are complete. The mainland of Europe was drawn up by the Royal Geographical Society in this scale in time for the great war. It was published by the general staff and formed the basis from which boundaries were laid down at the peace conference.

## 1,800 SILVER DOLLARS OF ANCIENT VINTAGE FOUND IN OLD STUMP

DANVILLE, Ind., Sept. 6.—James Ashe, a farmer living between Perryville and Mackville, is the owner of more than 1,800 silver dollars, all bearing dates prior to 1853, which he found in a copper kettle in an old stump.

Ashe was walking through a thicket when his dog scared up a rabbit and chased it into the old, hollow stump. The dog barked and refused to leave the stump and Ashe finally decided to help him get the rabbit.

As he stuck his hand into the stump Ashe encountered the top of the kettle. At the next stroke Ashe obtained an old, discolored silver dollar. He continued his excavation and finally removed a

good sized copper kettle full of tarnished silver dollars. The money apparently had been resting in the stump for decades. Speculation was rife here where the dollars came from. It was believed by some that bank robbers, perhaps members of Jesse James' gang, hid the money.
