



The motor car at once demand by means of the various on cars, parts and fuel supplied the major funds for building them the demand for the chief prodof petroleum, and the business of production and service has kep pace with the increasing number of automobiles and trucks. The building of roads, thus made relatively easy, has advanced at an amazing pace and has greatly increased the demand for cars.

It was the advent of the gaspropelled car that made these things possible. One needs only to recall the well established, but scarcely fluctuating demand for oil and oil products before that time. Or to recall the uphill agitation for the building of good roads. For 20 years the National Good Roads asociation, encouraged and in some measure financed by the federal government, prosecuted the extensive good roads campaigns, built samples of allweather roads and appealed to states to establish main highways to facilitate the transportation of products and the movement of the population. Little was accomplished, and that little very slowly.

Now every state has a road plan. some admirable, some only half way, but all in all we have a national system hooked up with state systems, with a vast mileage of hard-surfaced and other allweather types constructed and large additions made to this mileage from year to year.


