

John's work to the public looks as good as anything in the exhibit and his talent in the art line should be developed.



FEED BACK' IN RADIO GETS IN

By William S. Neal 'International News Service Staff Correspondent

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9. - Both the honor of one of the greatest inventions of padio and millions of dellers are involved in two cases which the United States Supreme Court will bear and undertake to decide in the near future.

Involved in the case are four of the most noted inventors of the world and the greatest business organizations engaged in radio manufacturing, as well as the United States government.

Couched in technical phrases of both science and law in the hundreds of pages which make up the record of the cases before the court, is told conflicting stories of how inventors developed the "feed back circuit," declared to be the basic invention of all modern

On one point there is apparent agreement—that the great invention resulted from a desire to eliminate the nuisance of singing telephone wires and that its discovery was in part an accident.
