## No Clue to Robbery Of Local Garage

No trace has yet been found of the robber or robbers who boldly entered the Home Motor company Saturday evening about 8:30 and took \$174 in currency from the cash drawer. At the time of the robbery all employees of the company were engaged in different pursuits about the building and no one saw the thieves either enter or leave.

In rifling the cash drawer the thieves took only currency, overlooking or not deigning to take the small change.

No one has been identified as yet with the attempted getaway with a Dodge touring car from the garage of A. M. Burden Sunday evening. It is reported that while the family of Mr. Burden were sitting in the house Sunday evening awaiting church time that it was noticed that the lights of the car were burning while the car was in the garage. Upon investigation it was found that the engine was running, also and that an attempt to steal the car had been frustrated.

Mr. Burden and a son gave chase after the thief, but after covering about a block the miscreant was picked up by a companion in a sedan. Mr. Burden secured the license number of the pick-up car, and while it is registered in this county, the identity of the owner has not yet been established.

The sheriff's department has been at work on both these cases but no arrests have been made.

## Governor to Name Good Roads Body

The governor stated that he has written to each member of the House and Senate in each of the 31 senatorial districts to suggest a name from each district for membership on the committee.

## Girl Bandit's Case on Appeal

 AUSTIN, Oct. 17.—In the Court of Criminal Appeals oral argument today was submitted the case of Rebecca Bradley Rogers, former University of Texas co-ed, who was sentenced to 14 years in the penitentiary for robbing the Farmers State Bank at Buda two years ago.

There are 20 assignments of error in the appeal and the transcript and statement of facts covers more than 1200 pages.

## State Treasurer Makes Report

 AUSTIN, Oct. 17.—On September 30 there was a balance of \$15,144,558 in the state treasury to credit of all funds, with outstanding warrants of \$2,274,241. This was announced today by W. Gregory Hatcher, state treasurer. A balance of \$10,414,877 was in the state highway fund against which were outstanding warrants of \$644,735.

## 19,779 Bales Cotton Ginned in the County

### Schools Seeking 2 Amendments

School people over Texas are very much interested in two amendments that will be voted upon at the November election, pertaining to school matters. The Texas Teachers association, the Texas Outlook, educational publication, and many other bodies connected with our schools are urging the people to go to the polls and vote for the two amendments.

The first amendment is in regard to the State Board of Education and proposes that "The Legislature shall provide by law for the State Board of Education," whose members shall be appointed or elected in such manner and by such authority and shall serve for such terms as the Legislature shall prescribe not to exceed six years. The said board shall prescribe such duties as may be prescribed by law."

The State Board of Education has been in effect for more than 50 years. At first its duties were not very numerous and only in recent years has its work become such that it is imperative that the board be completely reorganized so that it may properly look after the school matters of Texas.

Amendment No. II proposes that "The Legislature shall fix by law the terms of all offices of the public school system and of the state institutions of higher learning, inclusive, and the terms of members of the respective boards, not to exceed six years."

The present constitution limits the term of office as a school trustee to two years. It is the plan of the proposed amendment to make that limit six years with an odd number on the board, electing a certain number each year so that the board would never be demoralized by a majority of new members.

It would likely be the plan in an independent district like Ballinger to elect for a term of three years, two the first year, two the second year and three the third year.

These amendments are popular with school people all over the country and they are working for their adoption.

The cotton ginnings up to and including October 13 amounted to 19,779 bales. This report was compiled by the Ballinger Cotton Oil company from all the gins of the county.

The figures gathered Monday from over the county gave the following figures for the towns listed below:

Ballinger	4,426
Rowena	1,767
Miles	2,313
Winters	6,276
Norton	1,633
All others	3,364
Total	19,779

Estimates on the cotton crop of the county vary according to estimates made public by local cotton people. Some estimate that the present ginning report represents about one-third of the present crop while others bring the crop down as low as between 40,000 and 45,000 bales.

At the present time there is lots of cotton open in the fields all over the county and many pickers are working from daylight to dark gathering the crop as fast as possible. Ginning receipts are behind last year's receipts at this time more than 5000 bales but that is on account of the lateness of the crop and not on account of gathering the crop any slower.

## Union Company Spuds; McMillan No. 3 is Due

### Government Sues Sinclair Oil Co.

(By International News Service)  
 WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Governmental machinery was set in motion today to break the \$65,000,000 contract whereby the Royalty Oil in the Salt Creek field, adjacent to Teapot Dome, is sold to Sinclair Crude Oil Producing company. The contract was given to the Sinclair company by ex-Secretary of Interior Albert B. Fall.

Last January it was renewed by Fall's successor, Dr. Hubert Work, now chairman of the republican national committee. Attorney General Sargent in an opinion to President Coolidge, held that the contract was invalid, chiefly because it contained a secret five year renewal clause. The Interior Department will advertise for new bids for the sale of the oil and stop the Sinclair company from taking out the oil.

## Plan Union of Three Churches

 WASHINGTON, Oct. 17.—Delegates to the Triennial Episcopal Convention today were discussing the possibility of an organic union of the Episcopal, Methodist and Presbyterian churches of America. Bishop Charles H. Brent of New York, introduced a resolution providing for a commission composed of three bishops, three presbyterians and three laymen of the Episcopal church which would invite the other two churches to form a similar commission and discuss the matters of "Christian Morality." The resolution was adopted by an overwhelming majority.

## Gov. Smith is on Way to Chicago

 SEDALIA, Mo., Oct. 17.—Governor Al Smith, democratic presidential nominee, returned eastward today for the duration of the campaign. His train left here at 10 o'clock this morning for Chicago, via St. Louis, Springfield and Bloomington. He is due to arrive in Chicago tonight where he will speak Friday night.

The Union Oil company of California have spudded their well on the W. E. Allen place west of town and are drilling at present at about 100 feet, according to local oil operators. B. L. Agnew & Son are doing the drilling with Gill Agnew actively in charge of the force. This well is to be a deep test and the hole will be drilled as fast as possible to its completion, or until a producing well is brought in.

The Vacuum Oil Co. McMillan No. 3 is past the 2400 foot mark and is expecting to bring that well in Friday of this week. Everything is in readiness to bring in a well at this location and the sand is expected to be topped around the 2500 foot mark. No. 1 and No. 2 McMillan topped the sand around 2545 and 2520. Both of these wells are still producing high grade oil after being brought in a year ago.

The Agnew & Son Russell No. 1 six miles up the Colorado River is reported drilling at between 3400 and 3500 feet. They are making good progress and will continue on to a deeper depth, perhaps making one of the deepest tests in this county.

The Nourse-Tilton No. 1 near Winters which has been shut down since spudding to a depth of 150 feet, to clear some titles, will resume drilling next week according to reports from those in charge of this well.

Other activities in the county are in progress but have not yet reached a place where any definite information can be given out on them. Operators are here working on several different projects and it is likely that new locations will be announced in a few more days.

## Zeppelin May Go Home at Once

 NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The Graf Zeppelin may go directly back to Germany, when repairs are completed, and make a second trip here later in the year, it became known today. In this event the airship will not make any trips inland over America at present, it was said by Hugh Allen, representative of Dr. Hugh Eckener, commander of the dirigible. A decision as to the future plans will be made within the next 24 hours, Allen said. If it is decided to make inland trips while here, Detroit, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Louis will be visited.

**THE PARAMOUNT ISSUE  
IN NATIONAL CAMPAIGN**

Is prohibition of the liquor traf-  
fic a real or important issue in  
this campaign? It is apparent that  
since the attitude of one of the  
candidates is well known to be  
unfavorable to our present prohibi-  
tion laws, the opposing party  
will do all in its power to make  
prohibition the most prominent  
issue in the coming campaign. By  
appealing to the political and pro-  
hibition prejudices of republican  
farmers and by an appeal to the  
religious prejudices and fanatical  
prohibition sentiment of the demo-  
cratic farmers of the South and  
by these means alone, can the  
liquor question be made an issue  
in this campaign.

The prohibition question is set-  
tled, so far as the law can settle  
it, and will be completely settled  
for all time, just as soon as the  
participation regarded as the  
upper half socially, educationally,  
and financially decide that they  
ought, in all common decency, to  
respect their oaths, actual and  
implied, to uphold the Constitution  
of their country.

The prohibition amendment is  
in the Constitution and cannot be  
taken out without first an affirma-  
tive vote of both houses of Con-  
gress and the signature of the  
President, and not then until  
three-fourths of the states acting  
separately through their legisla-  
tures approve. This has never  
been done to any part of the Con-  
stitution in all our history. There  
are Southern States enough to  
alone prevent the Eighteenth  
Amendment ever being taken out  
of the Constitution. Again, Con-  
gress has not voted on the ques-  
tion, since the amendment to the  
Constitution, that it has not re-  
corded an overwhelming majority

in favor of our present laws.

One is constrained to ask what  
more do the prohibitionists want?  
They have an amendment to the  
Constitution, they have most  
stringent laws for the suppression  
of the unlawful traffic, they  
have the platforms of both politi-  
cal parties pledging a rigid en-  
forcement of our present prohibi-  
tion laws and the records of both  
candidates indicate that they will  
enforce the laws to the limit of  
their resources and responsibilities.

We yield to none in our loyalty  
and support of prohibition. We  
do not drink illegal liquor, and we  
would not vote for any man, if  
we had the slightest idea he could,  
if he would, annul the prohibition  
amendment to the Constitution  
and the laws passed under that  
amendment; but we regard the  
prohibition question settled and  
out of politics and we will not  
permit ourselves to be misled nor  
our prejudices to be aroused by  
any political party in its attempts  
to beloud what we regard as the  
most important issue now before  
this nation—the farm problem.  
And Herbert Hoover, by his actions,  
has shown that he has no sym-  
pathy for the farmer nor the  
farmer's rights.—The Progressive  
Farmer.

from this one buyer was \$140.

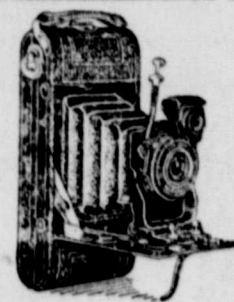
As a net profit for the growers

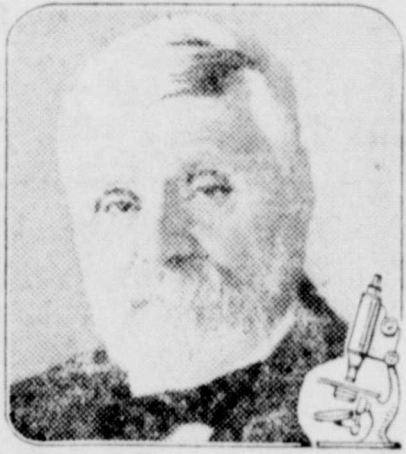

A Mexican sheep herder who was spending the night with his flock not far from the base of the mountain said he heard the same rumbling and saw a big ball of light shoot from the top of the mountain.

The shock from the earth was felt at Bailey, Grant, Pine, Cassels, Shawnee, Deer Creek and Shaffers Crossings. These points are about 50 miles west of Denver.

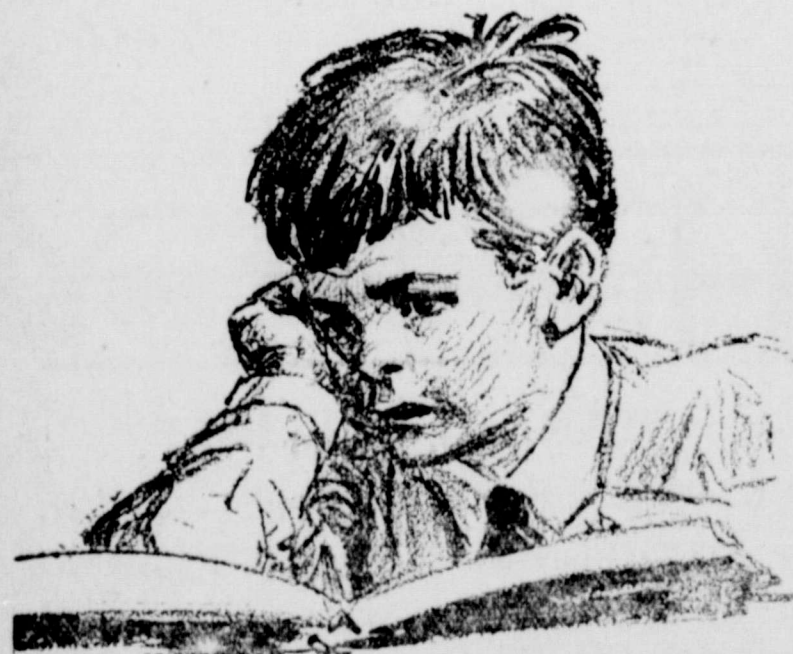

## VATICAN WORKERS BUSY TO SAVE ANCIENT TOWER FROM COMPLETE COLLAPSE

ROME, Oct. 17.—Workmen of the Vatican were busy today saving from collapse one of Rome's historic Christian battlements, the eleven century old tower built by Pope Leo IV for the protection of the Vatican Basilica against the Saracen invasions of the Ninth Century.

Inspectors for the architectural offices found in a vital buttress supporting the tower a dangerous crack that imperilled the entire structure, threatening its collapse. Workmen were summoned immediately.

The tower is one of three which still stand along the line of defending walls constructed by Leo IV so as to enclose the hill and the Basilica against the Saracens, who had taken the city of Ostia nearby. All three towers are of remarkable strength, and now are used for astronomical observatories by Vatican scientists.

In recent years there has been a growing movement to restore ancient ruins or at least preserve what remains of many of the relics of early Roman civilization.

Other ancient structures about the Vatican will also have the attention of the church authorities.
