Bacteria Used By Chicago to **Purify Sewage**

CHICAGO, Oct. 24.-It's the little bugs that do the business! Outside of \$32,000,000 worth of tion being placed in operation in Chicago, it's all bugs.

There is not one chemical in the 100 acres of buildings, vats, pipes, pumps and tunnels as big as New York subways.

All the work of purifying the sewage from 200,000 homes on the far north side is done by bugs. The engineers of the sanitary district call the little bugs "aerobic bacteria," meaning bacteria which like

"Bugs" Like Air

The air bugs like air so much in fact the engineers insist that one of the problems solved after many months of experiment in the laboratories was how to keep the bugs from getting too much air. When they get too much air they get woozy and drunk and gum up the works, 20,000,000 drunken bugs to the cubic inch.

So the great air pumps, devoted to forcing air at pressure into the bottoms of the giant sewer tanks, have to be operated on an exact schedule of pressure and the bugs must be watched.

Where do the bugs come from and what do they do to purify the sewage. Ah, very easily answered.

They eat and digest all solids, leaving a waste product of their sharp knife, and use it with the own which settles to the bottom and which is without odor, does not pollute streams so as to annoy even a fish, and which has a value of \$13 a ton when dried to stimulate golf course greens. Which accounts for Bobby Jones' good

In all sewage, the engineers report, there are bacteria which in time will eat and digest the solids. They work slowly. The problem solved by the Chicago Eanitary District was to develop and cultivate one best variety of sewage eating bugs and then give them





WILSON URGED KIN TO SUPPORT SMITH

WASHINGTON. - President Woodrow Wilson in 1918 urged his relatives to vote for Alfred E. Smith, who was then a candidate for Governor of New York, and to work for his election.

The incident was described to friends by Mrs. Rolfe E. Bolling. . sister-in-law of Mrs. Wilson, who now resides in Washington

"Mr. Bolling and I called on Prestdent and Mrs. Wilson during a Red Cross drive in the late summer of 1918, when we were living in New York. President Wilson asked if I had registered. I replied in the negative, explaining that we had not done so because we thought Mr. Smith was the candidate of Tammany Hall.

"I will never forget how he looked at me and said in a very serious tone: "Ge tomorrow and register and noth work and vote for Mr. Smith." "We did," added Mrs. Bolling, "and 4 feel that in voting for him again this year we are obeying almost . solemn injunction.

Darker Colors In Auto Plates For Next Year

CHICAGO, Oct. 25.-What gentlemen prefer has nothing to do with the case in the choosing of colors for automobile license plates in the various states. With 39 states changing the color of the combinations of numerals and background for 1929 plates, there is a decided trend toward darker colors, according to the Chicago Motor Club.

The "brunet" in license plates is increasing its lead over the 'blond" an association summary of the colors in all states shows.

Twenty-three different color motifs will be used in 1929 and no single one can be said to prevail, though six will be fellow figures on a black background and an equal number will be orange and black. Black on . white, used by five states this year, will be used by only four in 1929, white on green and white on black being used in four instances each. Nine states and the District of Columbia will use this year's colors, reversing them as to background and
