# CitizensRaising **Money for Paving** Of Ninth Street

Thirty home owners who live on Ninth Street attended the meeting at the city hall Friday evening to discuss the proposal for paving thirteen blocks on that street Detailed plans for the improvement were explained by the project engineer and the type of pavement specified.

A general paving project has already been approved for Ballinger by the WPA, but no specific project has been filed. Before the final plans can be drawn and filed for allotment it will be necessary for the property owners to raise \$3,600 and place it in escrow as their part of the costs

Part of the money was raised at the meeting Friday night and a committee, composed of E. F. Batts, J. M. Garlington and E. L. DeWitt, was appointed to make a general canvass of the home owners on the street. This work will be done at once, and as soon as the money is subscribed plans for the project will be filed with the city commission, sponsor of the improvement.

The city's part of the work will be to furnish rock from its quarries and the machinery for getting the rock out and crushing it for the base. Plans call for an 8-inch base of caliche and two layers of crushed rock and



# Cocos Revealed As Treasure Isle Of the Pacific

WASHINGTON, November 27,-Cocos Island, near which the U. S. Houston anchored early in October while President Roosevelt and his party fished, has been in recent years more famous as a rendezvous for treasure hunters than for fishermen. The sharkinfested waters off the island, however, are reported to be among the best fishing grounds between California and Panama

"Made up of sixteen square miles of uninhabited, forest-covered mountains and deeply gashed valleys, rising out of the Pacific about 300 miles off Costa Rica, Cocos owes its fame to activities of pirates along the coasts of Central and South America in the seventeenth and the early part of the last century," according to the National Geographic Society.

"Captain Edward Davis, who looted Leon, Nicaragua, in 1685, fled to Cocos, buried his treasure and rested until his next plundering expedition. In the early 80's, Benito, a former Portuguese naval officer, who was a scourge to shipping in the Caribbean, felt that his old field of operations was becoming too well policed for his profession, rounded the Horn, preyed upon towns and shipping along the Pacific Coast and sought refuge on this isolated island. He also is believed to have buried his treasure on Cocos before he and his crew were captured.

"The loot of other pirates has been reported cached on Cocos; but the famous 'loot of Lima, probably has been the chief magnet drawing modern treasure hunters to the island, far off the shipping lanes of the Pacific.
