## Santa to be in Parade Here December 8

### Production Depth Near In Second Currie Well

Oil development in the county this week has been interesting and operators are watching intently as the Slick Morman No. 1-Nettie Currie nears production depth. The log on this well is running the same as in the producer just east of the present location. Wednesday afternoon, drillers expected to top the pay any time and will be ready to make tests this week-end.

A rig is to be moved to the Hugh Campbell place this week-end and Ateco Oil Co. will start its No. 1-Campbell. This is two locations south of the Nettie Currie producer and will be drilled to probe the same structure.

J. K. Dobbs, of Dallas, No. 5-Freeman, in the Hull-Dobbs pool, flowed 78 barrels of 41 gravity oil in 24 hours when completed at 4,014 feet.

Union Sulphur No. 2-C. R. Miller, on the western side of the Cree-Sykes field, flowed 82.33 barrels of 43.5 gravity oil on a 24-hour gauge. Bottom hole depth is 4,150 feet.

G. W. Strake No. 2-W. F. Chisum came in for a daily rating of 88.19 barrels of 43.3 gravity oil. It is a two-location extension to the Lloyd field and pay was picked up at 4,313 feet.

Eagle Producing Co. has filed a permit application for a wildcat in Runnels county 8 miles

east of Bronte. To be known as No. 1-Curtis Poyner, the hole will go to 5,250 feet.

Miami Operating Co. No. 1-H. F. Lindemann, in the Ashton (Lower Gardner) field, has received approval.

Mid-Continent No. 12-Earl Burnes, projected to 4,800 feet in the Cree-Sykes field, has been staked.

Lion Oil Co. No. 1-Goetz, in the Nora Gardner field, was being drilled at mid-week around 4,000 feet.

Robert Mead and others will drill a wildcat, eight miles south and slightly east of Winters, on the Ben Spill farm. The permit calls for a 4,600-foot hole with rotary equipment.

N. P. Powell has staked four locations for 5,400 feet in the Fort Chadbourne field. All will be on the Odum estate.

Murray Petroleum Co. has filed a permit application for a wildcat 5 1/4 miles south of Hatchel, to be known as this company's No. 1-P. G. Sturm. Drilling is projected to 4,000 feet.

Murray Petroleum Co. and Jay Simmons No. 1-R. T. and W. L. Williams, 8 miles north of Crews, was being drilled at mid-week below 1,650 feet.

Starke No. 4-Mary L. Stubblefield, wildcat three miles south and slightly east of the Fort Chadbourne field, was being drilled earlier this week below 4,000 feet in shale and lime.

### District Governor Of Rotary Makes Visit to Local Club

Officers and committee chairman attended an assembly Monday night in the home of Ewald Jones, club president. At this conference, chairman gave oral reports on activities so far this year and submitted plans for the remainder of the year. Future work and problems of the club were discussed, the district governor making suggestions.

All chairmen will submit written reports within the next week and from these a number of projects will be approved.

Tuesday noon, Mr. Wagner met with the entire club and delivered his annual message. He spoke at length on club, vocational, community and international service, the four main committees of Rotary. He cited that Rotary now has 7,350 clubs with a membership of 349,000 and Rotarians are active in 81 nations and geographical locations.

The district governor also called attention of club members to the importance of the Rotary Foundation, a fund for the exchange of students between nations. He told of the vast good being accomplished through this project in bringing peace to the world.

### Manhunt Ended When 2 Negroes Caught at Miles

Ballinger resembled a peace officer convention Saturday when law enforcement groups from 12 counties of West Texas, Texas rangers and highway patrolmen moved in here in the manhunt for two negro convicts.

The negroes, Johnnie Cook, 22, and Raymond Harris, 19, had been followed across Coleman county, heard of near Talpa twice and bloodhounds tracked them to the edge of Elm Creek on the east outskirts of Ballinger Friday night.

Officers combed this section all day Saturday without success, as the men were hid out near Evergreen Cemetery. The bloodhounds picked up the trail late Saturday and the men were arrested at Miles when they appeared at a home and asked for a ride to San Angelo, where one claimed his wife was ill. The man asked for the ride claimed he had no gasoline but called for a neighbor he "thought" would help them and reported to deputies that the negroes were at his place.

The two convicts were brought to Ballinger Monday and charged with armed robbery and other counts in connection with the robbery of Jim Roberts, four miles west of Talpa, Friday night. They took a rifle, shotgun and about \$50 in cash from Roberts as well as food, clothing and other articles.

### Area Sheep Raisers Given Substitutes In Feeding Animals

About fifty sheep growers of this section gathered at the court house Friday afternoon to hear Jim Gray, of the A. & M. extension service discuss a number of problems facing the grower at this time.

Mr. Gray stated that forage or fodder was the scarce and high item at this time and pointed out a number of substitute feeds which might be used by growers. He stated that these substitutes were not the best but might be fed during the time when other feeds were on the short list. A surprise was listed by Mr. Gray in cotton burs, which are usually burned at gins. He quoted tables to show the cotton bur has about the same food value as cottonseed hulls and in some respects is better. He told the sheepmen that the burs ground very fine and mixed with hay or fodder would make good feed.

Other feeds which may be used, the speaker said, are hegar, maize, corn, corn and shucks ground together, peanut hulls, corn cobs and prickly pears when mixed with fodder. Mr. Gray said it had been found more or less a safe practice to feed salt and concentrate together, the ratio varying from 3 to 1 and 10 to 1. The closer the feeder is to water, the greater the ratio, he advised.

Those who intend to feed lambs are asked to vaccinate them before starting them on feed, using a vaccine that will prevent scours caused by the sheep overeating. He declared scour mouth can be controlled by vaccinating lambs when they are young.

### Noted Evangelist Sends Greetings To Local Church

A letter was received last week by Rev. A. O. Rue from the well known evangelist, Lockett Adair, in which he expressed regret that it was impossible for him to attend the church anniversary recently.

Evangelist Adair is well remembered in Ballinger, having conducted a three weeks campaign here in 1909 in which all churches of the town supported the union revival.

The famous evangelist devoted much of his letter to Rev. Rue to telling some of the high spots of that revival in which more than 500 people were converted and more than 85 per cent joined local churches. He referred to one saloon keeper who closed his place of business to attend the services and united with a local church.

Amusing in his remarks was the incident that the Methodist minister, Rev. Briggs, stated that it would be impossible to have 500 conversions in a meeting and agreed to shave off his beard if that total was reached. When 400 were converted, the pastor showed up with a clean shave.

The evangelist stated that he still had copies of the Banner-Leader giving accounts of the revival which was held here in the old skating rink. He referred to the pastors of the town, Rev. Biggs, Methodist; Rev. George W. Fender, Presbyterian; Rev. J. D. Leslie, Presbyterian; Rev. H. M. Bandy, Christian; Rev. Hudson, Baptist; Rev. Ammonson, Baptist, and to a number of pioneer members of local churches.

A letter of congratulation was also received from Mrs. Ethel Pearce Hayley, in which she reviewed the days when the church was loaded on wagons and moved from Runnels to Ballinger.

### 1951 Tuberculosis Seal Sale Started in County

The Runnels County Tuberculosis Association has launched the 1951 Christmas seal sale and this week many letters with seals enclosed were mailed to people of the county. Every person receiving a letter is asked to remit \$1 for each sheet of seals received.

The first part of next week committees will call on local business houses, selling bonds. The larger contributions will come from the sale of bonds and those directing the campaign will strive to reach a goal of \$5,000 in the county by about January 1.

Rev. A. O. Rue is the county seal sale chairman and units have been formed to sell bonds in each town of the county.

The remainder of the campaign will be by mail.

Mrs. L. F. Jackson, executive secretary, stated Tuesday that all letters would be in the mails today and recipients are urged to make their returns as soon as possible.

The county association has carried on an extensive program during the year. Students have been given skin tests and mobile X-ray units made chest pictures of all 15 years of age and over.

Plans for next year call for enlargement of the program designed to stamp out tuberculosis and in order to realize all phases of this program it will be necessary to reach the goal of \$5,000.

His 4-H projects have been diversified and all-inclusive, as well as profitable in the field of agriculture. These projects have included fat hogs, breeding dogs, beef cattle, dairy cattle, dairy heifers, dairy cows, breeding sheep, muttons, breeding chickens, capons, turkeys, gardens, soil conservation, farm and home electric, rodent control, insect control, grub control, recreation, leadership, citizenship, range management, rifle shooting, safety and other events. He has been active in sports, music, painting, dramatics, wildlife and the Boy Scouts. His favorite recreation is hunting.

He was a member of the first place grass judging team which won at San Antonio and again at College Station in 1951. He was awarded a junior poultry trophy by Western Hatcheries, of Abilene, and exhibited the

best white-faced Red Cornish hen at Fort Worth in 1951 and the best pen of New Hampshire Red breeding chickens at Dallas in 1951.


**Brownie Troop No. 3 Completes Project**

# Atomic Explosion Details Told by Ballinger Soldier

Mr. and Mrs. A. O. Strother are in receipt of a letter from their son, Sgt. John P. Strother, written from Camp Desert Rock, Nevada, a few days after the atomic explosions.

Sgt. Strother was in the group of soldiers carried into the desert for the atomic explosion series and what he writes is "unclassified" and can be told. Parts of his experience are listed as "secret information" and are not reported in his descriptions.

Troops were taken to a location 5 1/2 miles from the point of the blasts and given instructions on their behavior at the time of the explosion. His letter follows in part: "At our forward position we had the bomb and its effects explained to us. We were warned that the first thing we would see would be a flash of blinding white light, and that everyone must have his back to the bomb when it exploded, or else blindness would result from the flash.

"At 7:30 we heard the words 'bombs away' from a loud speaker and in a few seconds the whole valley was lit up brighter than day. All the shadows were removed from everywhere. Even with our backs to it, it hurt our eyes. Three seconds after the blast we were told to turn and look. About 1,000 feet above the earth hung a giant fire ball, 1,000 times hotter than the surface of the sun. The vacuum it created pulled the very earth into the sky in a huge stem to

form a mushroom and immediately under it was a great cloud of dust seeming to cover everything.

"About that time we both heard and felt what we had seen. Of course, it took a few seconds for the sound and shock to reach us, but when it did, it was if a thousand rifles had exploded in our ears and if a giant hand had slapped us. There were two sound reports, one pushing outward and the other filling the vacuum which had been created.

"As the mushroom began to form we realized we had never seen such beauty. It was first snow white with a brown edge, boiling and turning all the time. Then colors of pink and purple began to emerge from it and the brown edge was replaced by a beautiful blue fizz. A red halo formed inside the cloud and an ice cap formed at the top.

"In less than 30 minutes we were in the blast area observing the damage which cannot be told. I always thought the area of nuclear blast was contaminated with radioactivity for long periods of time. We proved it is safe to go into the area immediately after the blast. We had no special clothing and no one suffered ill effects."

Sgt. Strother expects to remain at Camp Desert Rock for sometime but hopes to be home for the Christmas holidays.

Decedent was a native of Ballinger. He attended Ballinger schools and after graduation here entered Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, where he received his degree. A talented violinist, he appeared on many programs in Ballinger and this section.

During World War II Mr. Trimmie was an instructor in the mechanics of engines at the Sweetwater army air force flying school. Since the war he resided at Burbank, where he was office manager of the Los Angeles branch of the Pacific Fire Insurance Co. He had been a lifelong member of the Presbyterian Church.

His parents were called to Burbank several weeks ago when his illness became critical.

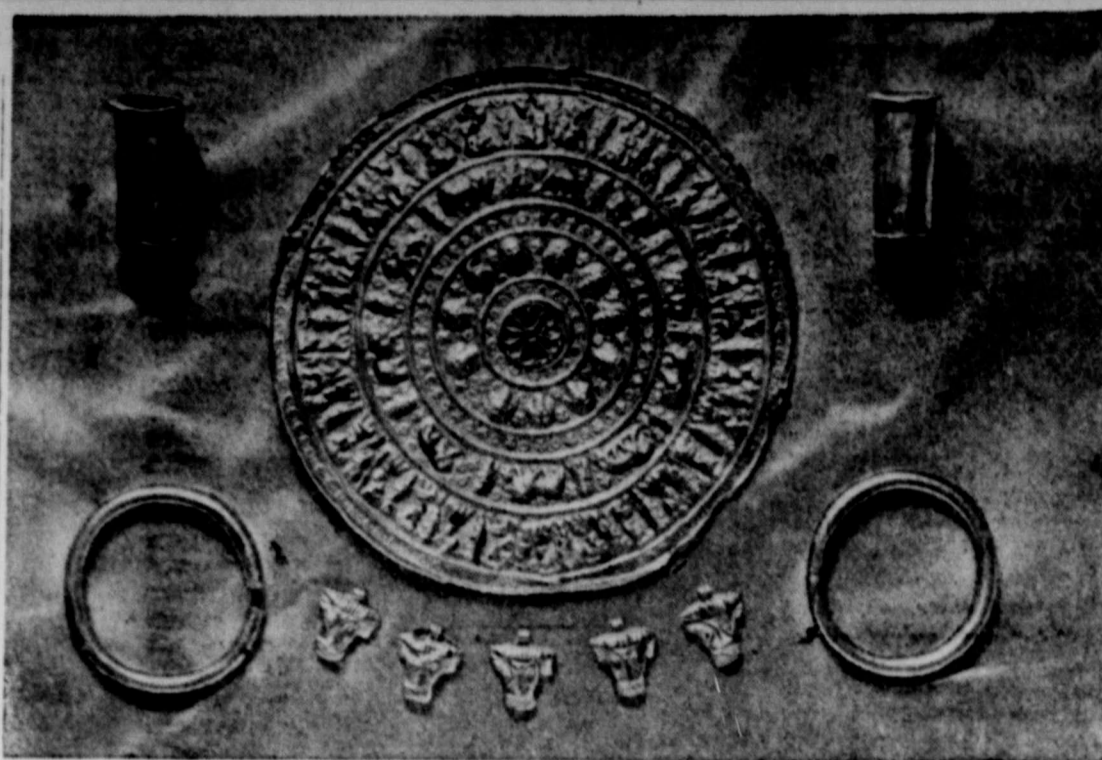
