Herman Giesecke, Sr

Herman Giesecke, Sr., 85, died at his home in San Antonio early Saturday. He passed away in his sleep during the night and while death was sudden, he had been in declining health for a number of years.

Decedent was a colorful figure in Ballinger and Runnels county and had much to do with the development of this city and the entire area. While he had made home at San Antonio the past 25 years, he spent much of his time in his Ballinger office and in looking after local interests. His two sons, Arthur and Herman ("Pete") Giesecke, Jr., reside here and supervise interests in this county.

Mr. Giesecke was born July 7, 1869, at Old Washington, near Brenham, in Washington county. He moved to Ballinger with his family in 1893 and established home here. In his early days he worked as a cowboy on the famous King Ranch and had long been devoted to improvement of cattle breeds. He was one of the older members of the Texas Cattlemen's Associa-

Mr. Giesecke had large land holdings in Runnels county and at one time owned ranch property in Gaines and Andrews counties. A number of years ago he owned St. Joseph's Island, across the bay from Rockport, which he stocked with cattle and wild game.

A pioneer in oil exploration in Runnels county, he had drilled a number of wells on his ranch on the Colorado River southeast of Ballinger. While he never obtained big production, he lived to see a number of fields developed in the county.

Besides his ranching interests, Mr. Giesecke also engaged in a number of business ventures in Ballinger and surrounding area. He was a former president of the Farmers & Merchants State Bank of Ballinger and a director of the institution for many years. He owned the first abstract and loan company here and was instrumental in securing the first telephone franchise. For many years he had telephone No. 1 in his office here. For a time he headed the Ballinger and Winters cottonoil mills until they were sold to Western Cottonoil Mills, of Abilene. In connection with the oil mill operations, he owned gin plants in Ballinger, Miles, Rowena, Wingate, Winters and Hatchel.

Mr. and Mrs. Giesecke celebrated their golden wedding anniversary at their San Antonio home several years ago.

Survivors besides the wife, the former Hedwig Ebling, of Roun Mountain, whom he married on March 18, 1896, are a daughter, Mrs. J. W. Wingo, San Antonio, two sons, Arthur and Herman Giesecke, Jr., Ballinger; six grandchildren and two greatgrandchildren.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p. m. Monday at the Porter Loring Chapel, San Antonio, Dr. George Mauze and Dr. P. B. Hill officiating.
