## Small Grain Movement Here Is Still Rushing

The movement of small grain continued here this week with no let up, however, Jack Fry, manager of the Ballinger Co-op Gin & Elevator Co., stated Tuesday that he expected movement to slack off some this week-end. The elevator is still operating on a 24-hour, round-the-clock schedule.

All storage at the plant has been filled and Tuesday oats were being hauled to a building on Railroad Avenue between 12th and 13th Streets where some 60,000 bushels are to be stored. Mr. Fry expected to be out of oat storage by today or Friday and after that he stated they would buy and ship oats. All barley storage is full and this product is being bought and shipped at present.

It was estimated that three-fourths of the oats have been harvested and that the remainder of the crop is ready for the combines. Barley is about three-fourths out but wheat is about half cut and will continue to move for some time.

All wheat is being handled at the elevator on Tenth Street on the Santa Fe tracks and loaded into cars for shipment as fast as it is received. Tuesday morning 15 earloads had been shipped from that point. Mr. Fry stated that he did not know yet just how many oats were stored in local warehouses but it was over 500,000 bushels.

Some small grain in the north part of the county suffered from wind, rain and hail Sunday and Monday. Some damage has been reported around Wingate, Wilmett and in the Winters section. Hail the size of golf balls and larger fell at Winters Monday night along with more than two inches of rain in a short period.

Tuesday morning the Santa Fe had handled 18 cars of wheat and 3 cars of oats. The Abilene & Southern had 7 cars of wheat, 4 cars of oats and 6 other cars of oats were being loaded Tuesday.

## Hail-Wind-Rain Leave Damages In Winters Area

Hail, wind and rain Sunday and Monday nights in the north part of Runnels County has left damage to crops and also to buildings.

Sunday night hail fell from a short distance west of Winters to Wingate and destroyed many crops and left heavy damage to small grain which was still in the field. In some areas, the grain loss was complete and young cotton was stripped and will have to be replanted.

No dollar estimate has been given for the damages in the north part of the county for the two evenings of hail, wind and heavy rains, but it is expected to run into hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Insurance people at Winters estimated that 85 per cent of the buildings in that city were damaged, most roofs suffered a heavy loss and in most cases will be listed as complete loss. C. T. Parker, county farm agent, after making a survey, stated that in the Winters area the loss would be 50 per cent to farm crops. Areas around Pumpirey and Drasco were practically wiped out but the agent said there is sufficient moisture to replant cotton.

The south half of the county, in the midst of the largest small grain harvest in many years, received no damage and combines have been running each day this week.

## Franchise Granted Telephone Co. By City Officials

The Ballinger City Commission was in session Tuesday morning to transact routine business and take up several special matters.

A. J. Lacey, divisional manager of the Southwestern States Telephone Co., met with the commission and made a request for a franchise. An ordinance was passed granting the company a franchise for 25 years and they are to pay a 2 per cent tax on gross receipts of local telephones in the exchange. The company has been serving Ballinger for many years.

Wylie Hearn was granted a \$2,500 building permit or an addition to a warehouse on the Santa Fe Railway tracks between Third and Fourth Streets. The commission received a check from the State Highway Department in the amount of \$1,341, a refund on curb and guttering on Hutchings Avenue between Tenth Street and the Colorado River bridge. This will be distributed to property owners along that street.

A petition was presented to the commission, signed by most of the business places on Eighth Street between Hutchings Avenue and Railroad Avenue, asking for one hour parking. This action was taken after one hour parking became effective on Hutchings and many clerks and others moved cars to Eighth Street to get benefit of the two hour parking. The additional cars moved there took up practically all the available parking space along the one block. The commission did not pass on the petition Tuesday but will give it more study.

## Guard Company I Starts Training at Fort Hood

The remainder of the company, under the command of Capt. Thomas I. Gabbert, left the Ballinger armory at 6 a. m. Sunday and arrived at North Fort Hood at 10:15. They spent the day cleaning up the company area, setting up equipment and preparing for field training exercises. This year the company will be in garrison and will make field trips during the day.

## 6 New Locations Shown In County During Past Week

Runnels County gained a number of new locations for oil tests the past week in various parts of the county.

Louboya Oil Co. of Midland will drill their No. 1-Nunn Estate, 3/4 mile west of production in the two-well Patsy field, four miles north of Ballinger. The scheduled depth is 2,999 feet. The field produces from pay topped at approximately 2,526 feet.

L. R. Allison of Abilene has filed application to drill No. 14 L. J. Byers, a 3,000 foot wildcat, five miles northwest of Talpa. The prospector is one mile north-northwest of the recently opened one-well Charleboen (Serratt) field that produces from pay topped at 2,064 feet.

Bert Field of Dallas will drill the No. 7-J W. Smith, 3/4 mile northeast of production in the five-well Norton, West (Palo Pinto) field. Scheduled depth is shown at 4,000 feet.

W. W. West of Midland has filed application for their No. 2-Superior-Alcorn, three miles northwest of Talpa. The proposed depth is 2,200 feet.

A Pace (Fry Sand) field location has been staked 2 1/2 miles southeast of Wingate. It will be the G. W. Strake No. 4 Williams Stevens Estate. It is slated for a 4,500 foot test with rotary.

Location has been amended for the Robinson-Puckett Inc. No. 3-H. M. Roberts, a 4,800 foot test, 3 1/2 miles southwest of Winters.

## Club Directors To Cut Moss At City Lake Here

Directors of the Ballinger Country Club met last week-end to set the date of the annual stockholders meeting for the evening of June 24 and announced plans for lake and club house improvements.

The annual meeting on Tuesday, June 24, will hear reports of work done the past year, discuss new improvements and elect new directors. All shareholders are urged to make their plans to attend this meeting.

Directors authorized the purchase of an underwater mower and a crew will start at once to rid the lake of moss. The mower has its own motor and will be attached to a boat which will make it possible to cover all areas of the lake.

Directors stated that a large number of lakes are using this type mower to keep them clean and available for swimming and fishing. They stated that after the moss is cut several times it begins to grow slower and is not so hard to keep. The equipment will be in use within a short time and the first cutting of the lake will be done before July 4.

The directors also authorized considerable work on the club house which will include repairing and redecorating, and a general modernization project. Other work is being done on the golf course and to other club property.

It was also voted to hold the annual July 4 celebration for all club members. This will follow the pattern of the observance for many years and will include a barbecue dinner at the noon hour, a golf tournament for members, bridge tournament and other games and recreations for members and their families.

An announcement will be made shortly in regard to golf players and their qualifying rounds, the time of the bridge tournament start and other features for the day. Clifford Cook is in charge of the golf tournament and has stated that it will all be played in one day with first rounds in the morning and the 18-hole finals in the afternoon.

Mr. Cook has announced that golfers may qualify from June 22 through June 29 and that flights and pairings will be made up after that date, with exception of a visiting flight.

Visitors may enter the special flight the morning of July 4 by paying their entrance fee of \$1.50. All golfers will pay an entrance fee that will be used for buying prizes.

In the regular club flights, a trophy and a prize will be given to the winner and a prize will go to the runner-up and the consolation winners. In the visitors flight, a prize will be presented to the winner and runner-up.

## Grasshopper Warning Given By Farm Agent

From reports coming to the county agent's office and a survey made through the county last week, Runnels County is threatened by a serious grasshopper outbreak, according to County Agent C. T. Parker Jr. Hopper infestations are extremely heavy in the northern part of the county and are a threat to all crops.

Mr. Parker urges all farmers to make an inspection of their fence rows and pastures bordering fields and if hoppers are available, take immediate steps to poison them.

Fortunately the hoppers are fairly small and are easy to kill right now but Mr. Parker warns that if they are not stopped now they will be extremely hard to kill later on after weeds get dry and they move out into the fields. Right now the hoppers are in bunches and spot spraying is all that is necessary. The best time to spray is during the hottest part of the day. At this time the hoppers are laying up in the shade of weeds or trees and a good strong spray-

ing will clean them up. The chemicals to use and their rate per acre are:

1. Dieldrin, 2/3 to 1 1/2 pints per acre.
2. Aldrin, 1 to 2 pints per acre.
3. Heptachlor, 1 to 2 pints per acre.
4. Toxaphene, 1 to 2 pints per acre.

Mr. Parker warns that if Aldrin or Toxaphene is sprayed on pastures, then cattle or sheep should not be grazed on the land for at least 30 days. If Heptachlor is used, stock should be kept off seven days.

For jumbo hoppers the old poison bait is still the best. They are mixed at the rate of 2 ounces of Aldrin or 1/2 pound of Chlordane, 4 ounces of Heptachlor or 1 pound Toxaphene to 100 pounds of bran. Syrup is added just enough to wet the bait.

The agent warns that if steps are not taken in some sections the entire crop may be ruined by hoppers, and adds that right now while they are small is the time to kill them.

With the real birthday date, June 29, coming on Sunday the program will be staged on Friday, June 27, in order to have the Lightertrust Doughboys here as a feature.

Several politicians, including Senator Henry B. Gonzalez, candidate for governor, and Parker Nunley, candidate for state representative, have accepted invitations to be here and speak at the afternoon session. Others are expected to round out a good political program.

The parade committee is working hard to line up entries for the opening of the activities Friday morning. The rest of the program will be moved to Bruce Field where carnival attractions, the barbecue and other features will be held.

The final feature of the day will be the street dance with the Lightertrust Doughboys providing the music.

The Jaycees are busy now publishing a program booklet which will also carry a large amount of historical data on Runnels County and Ballinger.

All members of the Jaycees have been assigned special jobs and they are completing the features as fast as possible. All merchants are asked to cooperate in extending a welcome to the visitors here June 27.

## Die-Off Of Fish Reasons Listed By County Agent

The county agent's office here has received many requests for information on farm pond fish dying for no apparent reason. There are some fairly common causes for such die-offs, including the following:

1. Drift of insecticides from nearby fields crops being sprayed.
2. Agricultural chemicals washing off sprayed livestock wading in the pond.
3. Agricultural chemicals washing into ponds from sprayed fields, cow lots, etc.
4. Oxygen depletion in the water.

Normal precautions and careful planning will remedy the first three causes of fish die-offs. Oxygen depletion is fairly common during spring and summer months, especially on hot cloudy days. To remedy this situation, aerate the water by running an outboard motor in the pond until fish no longer show signs of distress.

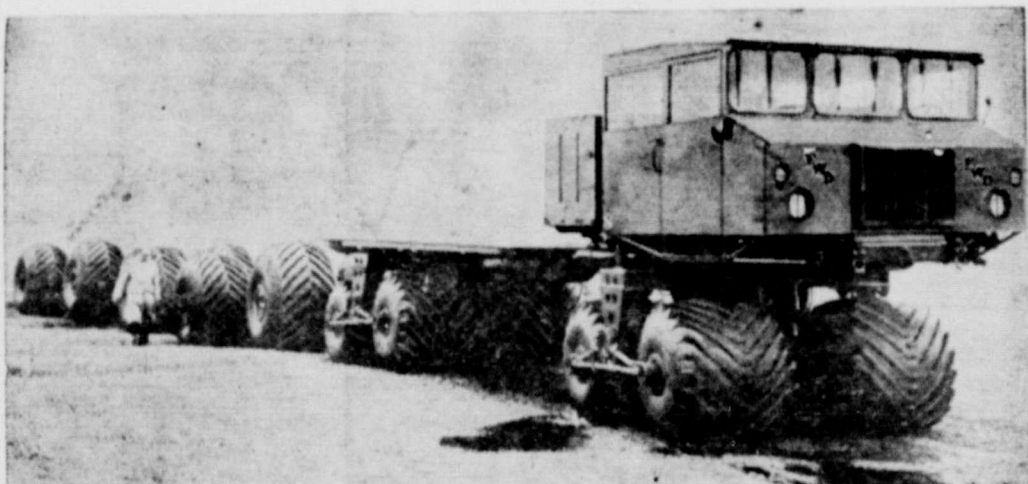

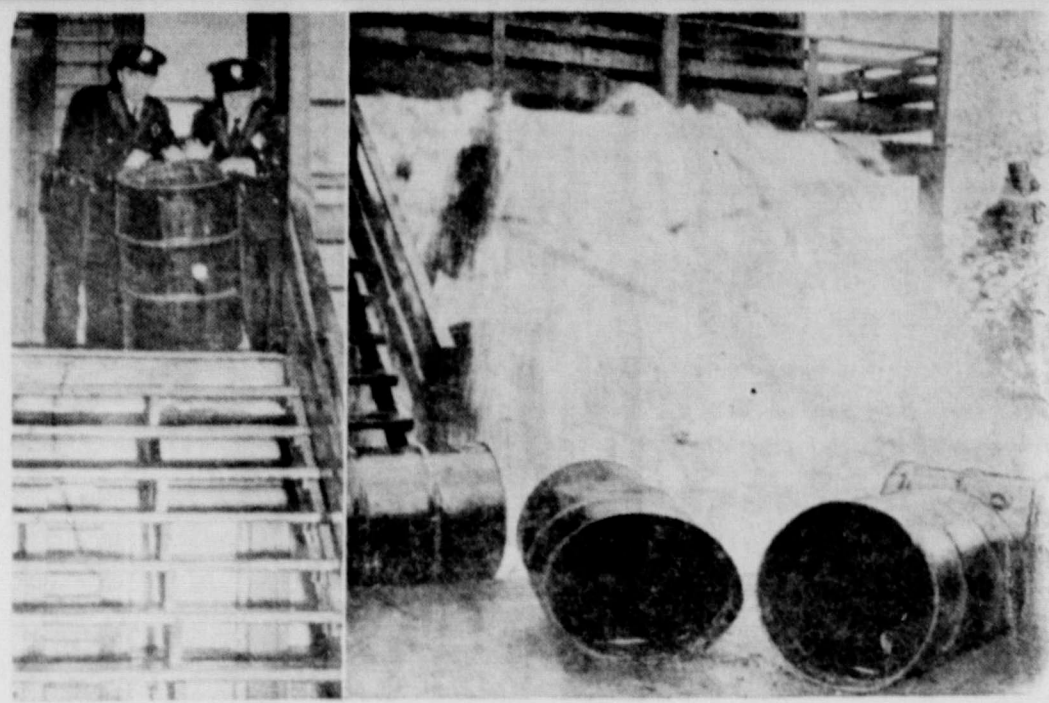

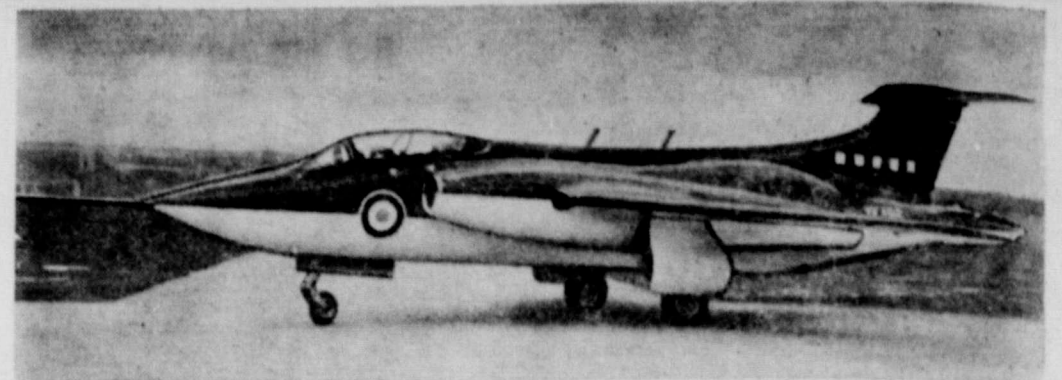
