Tips to protect health in extreme heat from Hl

In extreme heat, look for a National Weather Service, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) reminds local residents about steps they should take to of heat stress and heat stroke, for protect their health from the extreme a variety of reasons. The National

People suffering from heat stress may experience heavy sweating; weakness; cold, pale, and clammy skin; fast, weak pulse; and nausea ness: or vomiting. Early signs include muscle cramps, heat rash, fainting or near-fainting spells, and a pulse or heart rate greater than 100.

People suffering from heat stress should be moved to a cooler location to lie down. Apply cool, wet cloths to the body especially to head, neck, arm pits and upper legs near the groin area where combined 70 percent of body heat can be lost; and have the person sip water. They should remain in the cool location until recovered with a pulse heart rate is well under 100 beats per min-

Signs of the most severe heatrelated illness, heat stroke, include a body temperature above 103 degrees Fahrenheit; hot, red, dry or moist skin; rapid and strong pulse; and altered mental status which can range from confusion and agitation to unconsciousness. Call 911 immediately and take steps to cool the person.

While children are especially vulnerable to heat illnesses, they may be unable to explain what is wrong but may act differently than usual. In extreme heat, consider changes in a child's behavior to be heat stress.

• Drink plenty of fluids. Good choices are water and diluted sport electrolyte drinks (1 part sport drink to 2 parts water) unless told otherwise by a doctor.


• Choose lightweight, light-colored, loose-fitting clothing

• Limit outdoor activity to morning and evening hours As air conditioning use increases,

electrical grids can become overwhelmed causing power outages. In power outages, people who rely on electricity-dependent medical devices, like oxygen concentrators, may need assistance so check on family members, friends and neighbors who use this type of equip-



"As the story goes, one sunny June morning in 1906 at a one-room school in Clarion, Iowa, 11 pupils were spending their recess in search of four leaf clovers. They had plucked seven clovers when a visitor drove up, the Superintendent of schools. At the teacher's suggestion, the children surrendered their good luck charms and placed the seven clovers into the hands of the Superintendent. (I am so impressed that they had found 7!) He said, 'I've been looking for an emblem for the agricultural clubs and the schools of the county and you have just given me that emblem, the four-leaf clover, it will help explain to young and old the meaning of a four-square education.' (In those early days, 4-H was known as a 'four-square education, which is based upon education, physical, moral and fellowship development."

"Although a good story, it may not be totally accurate because in 1907 Benson had designed along with Jessie Field Shambaugh of Page County Iowa a three leaf clover with H's standing for Head, Heart and Hands which was used as an emblem

on different items. Nonetheless, the H's and the clover emblem either the three or the four leaf is credited to O. H. Benson and to Clarion, Iowa.

"In 1911, Benson referred to the need for 4 H's so at a meeting of the club leaders in Washington, D.C., they approved the present 4 H design. The official 4 H emblem is a green four-leaf clover with a white H on each leaf standing for Head, Heart, Hands and Health. The stem of the clover is always to the right. There is little doubt that the 4-H emblem is one of the most recognized logos in the world." O. B. Martin is credited with suggesting that the H's signify Head, Heart, Hands and Health universally used since then."

The 4-H name and emblem have United States federal protection under federal code 18 U.S.C 707, passed in 1939, & slightly revised in 1948. This federal protection makes it a mark unto and of itself with protection that supersedes the limited authorities of both a trademark and a copyright. The Secretary of Agriculture is given the responsibility and stewardship of the 4-H name and emblem, at the direct request of the U.S. Congress. These protections place the 4-H emblem in a unique category of protected emblems, along with the United States Seal and Smokey Bear. Stay Independent and Prevent Falls By Kelsey Duffield, PT, DPT

Did you know that falls are NOT a normal part of getting older? However, one out of three adults age 65 and older fall each year! One out of ten falls cause a serious injury, such as a hip fracture or head injury, which can require hospitalization. Many people who have suffered a fall require a few weeks to up to one year for recovery and may require a stay in a long-term care facility. Some are never able to live independently again.

A few risk factors for falls include: muscle weakness, balance problems, medication side effects, vision changes, inactivity, poor lighting, and lack of grab bars in the home. Usually, two or more risk factors interact to cause a fall.

Falls are preventable, and there are some simple steps to take to stay independent longer. First, talk openly to your doctor about recent falls or if you feel unsteady. Your doctor can review your medications for possible side effects, prescribe physical therapy to get you moving and functioning better, and/or discuss vitamin D supplements for stronger bones. Then, start moving! Starting activities that make your legs stronger and improve your balance can help prevent falls. Next, get your eyes checked at least once a year and update your glasses when needed. Last, but not least, make your home safe by de-cluttering and installing grab bars where needed.



Side Effects of Conviction

Would you take a medicine if it might cause liver damage, rash, swelling, hives or other allergic reactions like nausea, vomiting, sweating, weakness or even yellowing of the skin or whites of eyes? Honestly, you would and probably have taken acetaminophen (Tylenol) many times in your life. In fact, you take it, because you know that in light of the possible side effects, when taken properly, there will be healing and help to your body.

In a similar manner, God's prescription for sin in your life is Holy Spirit Conviction. The purpose of conviction is to bring about repentance, followed by restoration, but when God's conviction is resisted, there are severe side effects. In fact, Psalm 38 draws out these side effects and places them in two categories. First are the personal side effects of conviction. Depression, stress, lack of health, feeling overwhelmed, and a throbbing heart are all possible side effects that effect the person who is resisting conviction. Next, though, are the relational side effects. Resisting conviction will distance you from God, but also from those who truly care for you most as you seek to outlast God's hand of conviction on you because of your sin.

Although much more can and should be said about the side effects of resisting conviction, let's look at the antidote, or the cure for conviction. Psalm 38:18 says it is repentance and confession, "I confess my iniquity; I am sorry for my sin." The Lord convicts you because He loves you, and the purpose is to purge the sin from your life, so that you will pursue Him and live in His blessing.

Governor signs drunk driving law

Texas Governor Greg Abbott has signed drunk driving legislation into law that will save lives by adding a new incentive for first-time drunk driving offenders to install an ignition interlock on their vehicle.

Governor Abbott signed HB 3016, which allows first-time drunk drivers with a .08 to .14 blood alcohol concentration (BAC) who successfully use an ignition interlock for six months

and complete other court conditions — to apply for a nondisclosure. That means the DWI would be removed from their record. Only offenders who do not cause injury or property damage can apply for the one-time nondisclosure.

A drunk driving offender in Texas who is not ordered on an interlock, or who chooses not to install the device, must wait five years before being eligible to apply for non-disclosure. Currently, Texas courts cannot consider a previous DWI that occurred more than five years ago when sentencing drunk drivers.

"This new law provides one nation for drunk drivers to install an ignition interlock. This is a smart justice, pro-victim approach to stopping drunk driving," said Jaime Gutierrez, executive director of MADD Texas. "MADD strongly supports this incentive to increase the use of interlocks to save lives and reduce repeat DWI offenses."

In many states, including Texas, plea deals or reduction in charges enable offenders to avoid an ignition interlock order or an original DWI charge. This law seeks to change that by giving offenders a second chance if they install an interlock. The tradeoff for society is that the interlock user is learning to drive sober and less likely to become a repeat offender endangering the lives of Texans.

locks have stopped more than 244,000 attempts to drive drunk with a BAC of .08 or greater in Texas," said Gutierrez. "Expanding the use of interlocks will save countless lives."

"Since December 2006, inter-

"I'd also like to commend the efforts of Senator Bryan Hughes and Chairwoman Senfronia Thompson, who championed the bill in the Senate and House as well as MADD, whose tireless effort in education and advocacy throughout the legislative process helped make passage possible."



Soil water storage, new varieties critical to wheat production

Regardless of what watering regimen a producer might have on wheat, in the High Plains it is critical that new varieties are grown to maximize yields, according to a long-running study by Texas A&M AgriLife Research.

The purpose of this study is to show how different varieties of wheat respond to different levels of water, said Dr. Qingwu Xue, AgriLife Research crop stress physiologist in Amarillo.

"The overall objective of our program is to better understand the physiological responses of different wheat genotypes to drought stress and water-limited conditions," Xue said. "We have an overall goal to improve the water-use efficiency and yields of wheat."

Utilizing a center-pivot irrigation system, he has been growing the top 20 varieties for the High Plains under three to five different water treatments ranging from dryland to limited and full irrigation since 2011. The physiology group works with Dr. Jackie Rudd, wheat breeder, and Dr. Shuyu Liu, small grain geneticist, both with AgriLife Research in Amarillo.

"We want to identify the best management practices and genotypes in these environments to recommend to producers that will help them optimize their water use," Xue said.

"So far, what we have found is effective water use is still very important, especially under limited-water conditions. Dr. Sushil Thapa, the post-doctoral scientist working in our group, has summarized field data for the last five wheat growing seasons at Bushland.

"We are looking at the soilwater dynamics in different varieties developed from the 1970s to the most recent and how the soil-water extraction is correlated to yield and yield components," Xue said. "What we found is the newer varieties have better capability to utilize

Wheat needs to be able to access and utilize stored soil water, seasonal rainfall and any irrigation water to get higher yields, Xue and Thapa said.

They found the wheat was using water only from the 3-4 foot soil profile in the dry season of 2011. In contrast, the wheat plots harvested in 2016 were able to use the water from 6-8

"That's very important when you look at the roots and the soil-water dynamics," Xue said. "In very dry seasons, the roots cannot go deep enough to take advantage of the water."

That is why it is also important to take care of the aboveground growth, he said. The newer varieties have better and more vigorous early growth, which means they have more above-ground biomass and better ground cover in the early stage. This also helps to improve the root mass as well as the rooting depth.

Over the last 30 or 40 years, breeding has improved wheat's capability to access soil water stored during the fallow period and the water from seasonal rainfall.

They found the newer varieties are especially able to access the deeper water.

'We specifically looked at TAM 105 compared to TAM 111 and TAM 112," Xue said. "Comparing those three varieties, the two newer varieties always had a better ability to extract water from the deeper

The best way to improve soilwater storage is allowing for sufficient fallow periods with good residue management, Xue

With good soil moisture, the newer varieties will produce more forage and establish a better root system in the early stages of growth, Thapa said.

"While many producers may think about forage only for cattle grazing, it is also important for yield potential as it is a good indicator that a strong root system is being developed," Xue

Xue provided an example of how the varieties make a difference. In an extreme drought year like 2011, TAM 105, developed in the 1970s, yielded only 8 bushels per acre. TAM 111 and TAM 112, developed more recently, yielded 10 bushels per acre under dryland con-

"In a wet year like 2016, the variety difference was even more significant," he said. "With the older varieties, you're looking at around 40 bushels per acre. But the newer varieties like TAM 114 yielded 60 bushels per acre. So if you can get 10 to 20 bushels per acre difference over a large area that's a big difference."

Xue said using the newer varieties with the ability to produce more forage early and thus deeper roots will help, but the field must have good soil water to start with, even on dryland, or it might be well to let the field lay fallow for a longer time.

"In this environment, if you don't have good ground cover and good forage in the early stages of wheat, you probably don't have a good chance to obtain the higher grain yield, given a highly variable seasonal rainfall," he said.

For years with exceptional water, he suggested producers consider putting nitrogen on their wheat field to help early growth and the ability to utilize deep soil moisture.

Also, producers who know their wheat will have adequate water need to consider the newer varieties with disease-resistance traits, he said.

"That was especially significant this year when we saw a lot of wheat streak mosaic virus damage on some varieties and much less on others," Xue said.




