## Stockpiled forages reduce need,

 cost of hay, supplemental feedBy Adam Russell

Stockpiled forages and winter nnuals can reduce the need for and cost of hay and other supplemental feed for beef cattle proacers in regions with adequate annual rainfall, said a Texas A\&M AgriLife Extension Ser ice expert. Dr. Jason Banta, AgriLife Ex ension beef cattle specialist, Overton, said producers can reace the need for hay and suppleforage mid-November through forage mid-November through October through May.

If they choose these options, best utilize them," Banta said. For stockpiled Bermudagras and bahiagrass, producers should bale the field for hay or graze he pasture 3-6 inches tall in the first part of September each year Then fertilize and allow growth until the first frost, which is typiTexas, Banta said After the frost, Texas, Banta said. After the frost, he first part of January "Utilizing stockpiled elps us avoid feeding hay for $4-6$ weeks potentially," he said. Banta said producers should "strip graze" the pasture by using electric fencing to restrict cows ccess to the forage if possible.
could eat in two to four days," he said. "Then every few days move he fence to allow more access. Restricting access will help pre vent the cattle from wasting th available forage."
The forages should be utilized by the first of January to mid January in high rainfall area because rain will begin to reduc quality and palatability for cattle "If waid.
If we fertilize and have good growing conditions, the stock piled forage should meet all nutrient requirements for dry
cows," Banta said. "Additionally, it will meet the requirements for most lactating cows. However in some situations small amount of supplements may be needed depending on the forage quality milk production and body cond ion score of the lactating cows. In those cases, Banta said lac ating cows should generally re ceive 1-2 pounds of a high-pro Legumes and winter per day Legumes and winter annual grasses such as ryegrass, smal used to reduce the need and cost of hay. "Those forages will be ex tremely high in both protein and energy," he said. However, utilizing winter

Banta said late-gestation cows should be limited to
grazing sessions daily. grazing sessions daily. should be used to the routine and become easier to remove from the winter annual pastures," he said.
Grazing dry cows or pairs on winter annuals or legumes should also negate any need for protein or energy supplements, Banta said. Producers should moderate-to-high $5-13$ percent magnesium to reduce the chances of grass tetany in lactating cows. of grass tetany in lactating cows. stockpiled forages and winter an nual forages can tremendously reduce winter feeding costs for producers," he said. The value of bulls in commercial herds goes be- of the five calves." yond the "relative" value typically ascribed to them in market pricing, said a Texas A\&M AgriLife Extension ervice expert.
In publications referencing cattle values for commercial producers as well as reports from beef breed associations, the value of a bull is often given as equivalent to the average value of five weaned calves," said Dr. Joe Paschal, AgriLife Extension livestock specialist, Corpus Christi. "This has been a long-held comparison for determining the value of a bull, but it really doesn't take into account all aspects of what bulls provide to the herd."
Paschal said the value of one bull to five weaned calves resulted from a relative equivalency identified
as market prices fluctuated over the past several years. market prices fluctuated over the past several years. han 50 percent of the value of those five calves on a bull," Paschal explained. "Then from 2011 until 2015 producers began to pay more, including up to 100 percent of the value of five calves in 2013. Then in 2015 , producers paid up to 150 percent of the value of five calves for one bull. And when calf prices dropped in 2016, the ratio dropped back to about 115 percent - be-

Bu this supply to to thn't fully reflect the additional val "Bulls supply the herd, Paschal said of replacement females in most commercial herds ex cept those strictly using terminal crossing," he said. "It should be remembered that bulls are more than just 'cow fresheners' as my former colleague, Dr. Rick Machen, retired AgriLife Extension livestock specialist in Uvalde, was fond of saying. As such, their value goes beyond the market price for five head of calves." Paschal said if a bull is used for three years and the producer does not introduce any outside female reslace for up to 87 percent of the cowherd's genes. sible for up to 87 percent of the cowherd's genes.
"A lot of products and equipment are touted as bo ig the best investment a cattle producer can make, bu a good bull is the only thing that can really match that a good bull is the only thing that can really match that the genes entering the cow herd will come completely from the bulls you select, and that's a huge contribution - for better or worse - to the herd's overall genetic makeup. When you look at it from that perspective you see just how valuable a good bull is to a commer
cial cow herd."

Deer season expected to provide good opportunities for hunters By Adam Russell

The general hunting season for white-tailed deer opens ov. 4, and Texas hunters hould expect good opportunities in the field, according
o a Texas A\&M AgriLife Exension Service specialist. Dr. John Tomecek, AgriLife Extension assistant professor and wildlife specialist, San Angelo, said good weather conditions have provided good "orage and cover for deer. healthy, and the bucks have good antlers," he said. "There were a few places around the state that dried out early in the summer, but the common complaint I am hearing is that everything is so green that the deer don't care about the corn, so they're not coming to he feeders."
Hunting is a multi-billion industry for the state, To mecek said. Deer leases and hunting provides a critical source of income for rural landowners,
communities.


Tomecek said there ap peared to be a good yearling crop and that conditions provided good forage and cover

them avoid predation by comotes, wild pigs and other coyotes, w
predators.
Tomecek said hunters typi cally take younger deer, but that it's preferred hunters take deer 3-5 years in age. "We like to see hunters take full-bodied, muscled buck that aren't going to get any better," he said. "They've done their part in reproduction and we like to see them taken before their bodies begin to decline." Tomecek said there are ang issues hunter

Tips for Motorists oads, medians, and curbs. Enter and exit driveays carefully.

- Be especially alert for children darting out bushes and shrubs. They're excited - and they are ot paying attention ot paying attention.
- Never drink and drive - tonight or any night. If

Tips for Parents

- Adults should accompany children at all times nd supervise their "trick or treat" activities. - Teach children to "stop, look left-right-left, and listen" before they cross the street. - Use a flashlight, and wear retro-reflective strips or patches on your clothing or costume to be more visible to motorists.
- Be certain that the mask does not obstruct vision or hearing.
- Ensure that costumes do not impede walking

Tips for Pedes
