In accordance with January being designated as School Board Recognition Month, Superintendent Dr. Pam Ray opened the meeting by thanking the board for their dedication and hard work. She presented each of them with a certificate and a gift basket.

Zachary Hobbs, a Human Resources consultant with the Texas Association of School Boards gave a power point presentation entitled "Survey and Recommendation Options: How to Best Allocate Resources" which was a study on how the FISD could best utilize its employees. This

The Board of Trustees of staffing report included comparing FISD to other school districts in the area to determine benchmarks or guidelines in order to evaluate how resources can best be used.

> Next, Mike Baker and Aaron Rivera, representatives from the firm Parkhill, Smith, and Cooper, presented a "Facility Needs Assessment report" which provides a comprehensive evaluation of all FISD properties. It is an in-depth look at the age, condition, maintenance cost, code compliance, and replacement price for all FISD assets. Meetings with the public are also planned to present the findings. Final results will be made available for publication.



Xcel Energy remembers Jupiter as it plans for winter


January and February can be the worst months for dangerous winter storms

This time a year ago, the northeastern Texas Panhandle was ground zero of one of the largest power restoration efforts in recent history after Winter Storm Jupiter froze the power grid over hundreds of square miles in Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas.

And while this winter has been tame by comparison, Xcel Energy is always preparing for the next big ice or snow event, while reminding customers that January and February are the prime months for strong winter storms that can affect electric service provided by Xcel Energy.

On Jan. 15, 2017, heavy ice began to build on electric distribution lines in the northeastern Texas Panhandle, eventually causing the lines to fail as even the lightest breezes ripped ice-caked wires from insulators and snapped hundreds of poles and cross arms. storing power. For their efforts, the Edison Electric Institute awarded Xcel Energy crews with its Emergency Recovery Award in the summer of 2017, the second year in a row the company earned accolades from EEI for restoring power after winter storms.

"While it's difficult to prevent power outages during rare events such as an ice storm, we can limit the duration and severity of outages with advance planning that helps us save time and provides more options for our crews as they work to restore power," said David Hudson, president, Xcel Energy -

during a storm. Storm Jupiter provided Xcel Energy more insight into supplying such a large restoration force and ensuring they had the materials they needed at the right time, and the company added these lessons to a growing knowledge base of effective field operations.

Customers who were affected by outages also learned a great deal. Their experience is a reminder that residents of Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico should always have plenty of water and nonperishable food on hand, and have plans for safe ways to protect themselves from extreme cold in the event of an outage that lasts more than a day. As part of that plan, customers should also consider alternative lodging if it is dangerous to remain in an unheated home, especially if they have family members who are elderly or disabled, or have small children.

Xcel Energy has increased the ways in which customers can communicate with the company during these extreme weather events. Customers can sign in to "My Account" at www.xcelenergy.com and, among several useful features, have the company send important information on outages by email or through text. Customers may also use their My Account credentials to access outage and billing information through the new Xcel Energy app, which can be downloaded at Apple Store or through Google

Customers may also report outages through My Account or on the Xcel Energy app. Additionally, customers can still contact a customer agent by phone by calling 1-800-895-1999 to report outages or downed power lines. Customers who see a downed line should stay clear of the area and report it as soon as possible.





We did try from the side once, but flew right over her and landed on the ground.

This was due mainly because the older kids wanted her to do what they wanted and there was the rub. You could tell when she was about to start bucking, the head went down and the rodeo was on. In my mind I looked like Billy Etbauer, but the reality was I was on a sawed off pony with some attitude who was only good for two or three jumps before she settled into doing what was asked.

I am pretty sure we are no different. The world is all rose pedals and butterflies until we don't get our way. Then the head goes down and the bucking begins. When a kid throws a fit, we tend to give them a little rein because we were all young once and disappointed by something, but not so much rein that they don't learn from it. Adults, however, when they throw a fit, it is more than a little embarrassing.

Submission is not a word we chew very well. Yet, until we learn to yield to the Lord and do as He desires we will likely not know the abundance a ride with Him can offer.


