Hair Code Dropped at High School

The Crowell Public Schools hair code has been set aside following a letter received Monday morning by Supt. Larry Jones from the Office for Civil Rights of the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare in Dallas stating in part that "We have concluded that policies and practices relative to dress codes, specifically hair lengths for males and female students in

the Crowell Public Schools are in violation of Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972...."

Crowell's hair code had stated that "Males are to have clean shaven faces and acceptable hair cuts. Hair should not extend over the eyebrows, ears, or collar...."

The local hair code has come under criticism occasionally through the years since it was adopted as a part of the handbook of policies and regulations for the local system. But things came to a head over a week ago when 38 CHS male students were told their hair was too long and must be cut by Monday, Aug. 30, and if their hair was not cut, the students would face expulsion.

After a great deal was printed in area daily and weekly newspapers, several phone calls to HEW, and lots of talk over coffee, the letter from HEW arrived Monday morning.

Anthrax Outbreak Hits Foard Cattle

Inspectors of the Texas Animal Health Commission are in Foard County this week in connection with an outbreak of anthrax in cattle. Inspectors reported that many of the 30 carcasses examined this week were anthrax victims.

Foard County livestock producers are being asked that in the event they have an animal die, to call 806/492-3903 so that an inspector can come and secure a blood sample from the carcass for

laboratory analysis. At the present time, inspectors are burning carcasses on the premises.

Farms where anthrax has been positively identified and adjacent farms are being quarantined until 21 days after the last death loss, the inspectors added.

They report that Foard County is the only county in the area to be currently having anthrax deaths among livestock.

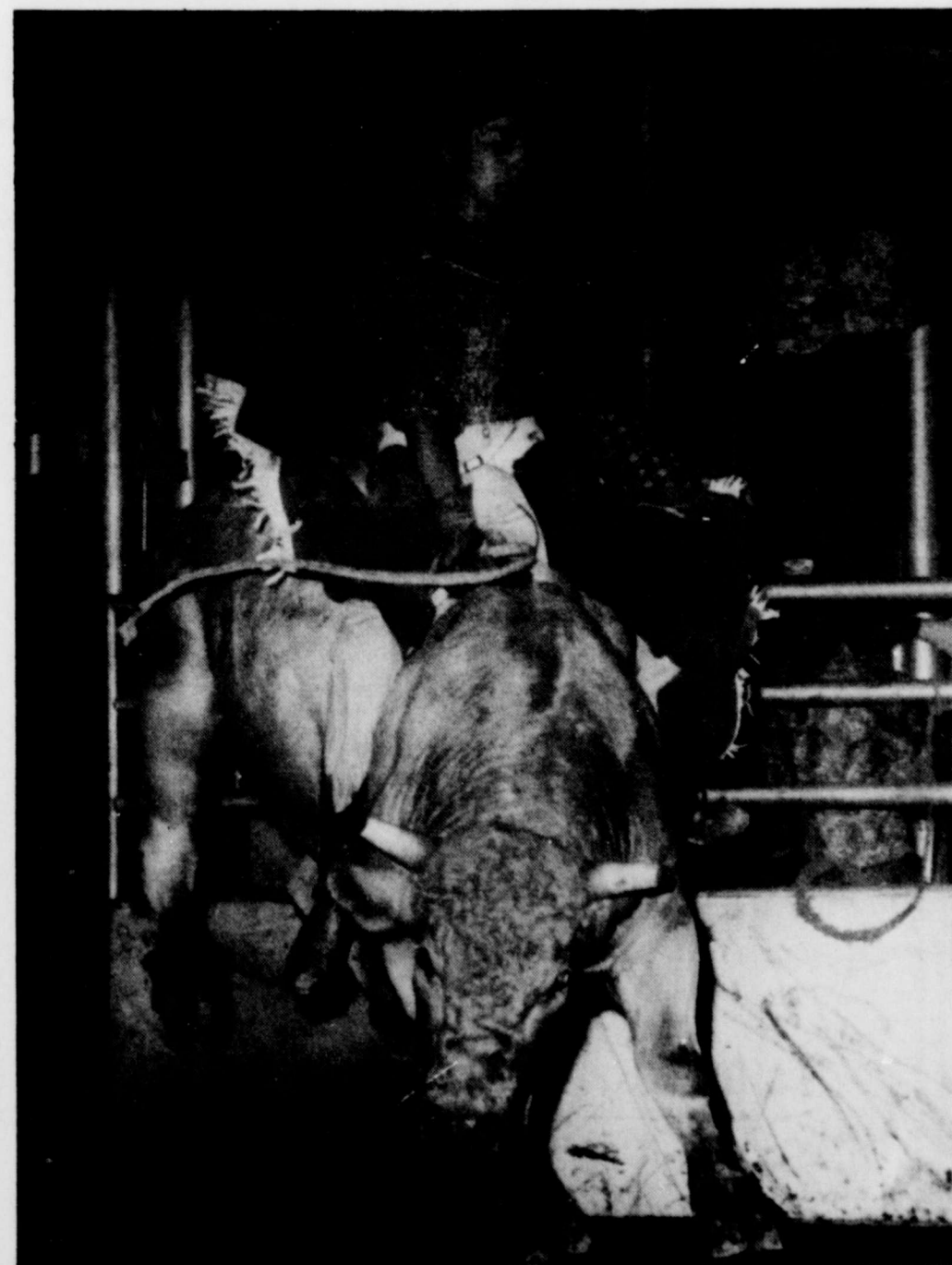

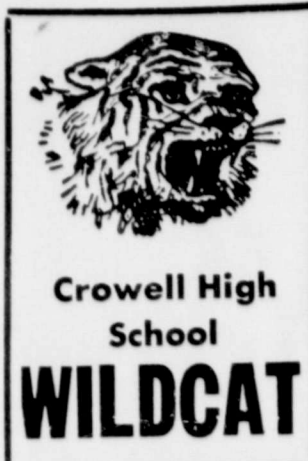

Banker Is Rotary Club Speaker

The occasion for the third generation of Crowell bank presidents to speak to a local Rotary Club audience about money and financial matters occurred Wednesday last week when Crowell State Bank President Robert Kincaid was the speaker. He was introduced by Rotarian George Self who told about how in years past, the late Dr. R. L. Kincaid and Merl Kincaid, grandfather and father, respectively, of the current president, made talks on finance and money matters to the Rotary Club.

In his talk Wednesday, Kincaid said the so-called "checkless society" was already here in some parts of the country. He said the use of a card issued to a bank depositor could when inserted into an electronic machine, would enable the card's owner to make a payment on a note, pay utility bills, or obtain cash. He said by the use of this type transaction, an almost instant check would be made of the person's bank account to determine whether or not sufficient funds were in the account to handle the transaction.

In commenting on a Texas law which forbids branch banking, he said the law is being circumvented by banks organizing holding companies in whose name the branch banks are owned.

He also commented that an attempt by savings and loan associations to secure check writing privileges for its customers would make it where "you couldn't tell the difference between savings and loans and banks."

He predicted that interest rates will remain about the same until after the election this fall, after which they will be going up. He commented that with the inflation of the past few years, only about 25 percent of the people needing housing are financially able to buy a house now, and with the ever-increasing cost of new cars, "the population as a whole can't afford to buy a new car."

Kincaid said he felt that prices for wheat and other commodities will go down, and he forecast a rise in the cattle market in the near future.

He closed by stating that twenty years ago, when President Eisenhower was running for a second term, he was strongly criticized for the federal budget reaching \$100 billion. Now Kincaid says that much is spent each year on national defense and almost that amount is required for interest payments on the federal debt.

RC&D Project at Local School Under Construction

The first contract within the Four Winds RC&D Project has been awarded for work on the Crowell School campus according to RC&D Chairman Henry Black. The contract is to install about 1500 feet of reinforced concrete curb on the campus to protect the lawn from vehicle traffic. Black stated that a curb would be installed north of the gym to the foot ball field and from the cafeteria east to the city street.

M and M Redi-Mix of Vernon, Texas, was awarded the contract for \$8,004.92. Work on the project should begin within about 20 days, according to Black.

John Adams, Soil Conservation Service Area Engineer, will be the government representative and inspector on the job.

Crowell school installed water lines on the campus before the concrete curb is installed. Water lines are for irrigation of the campus lawn. The water lines were installed by the school for their part of total program cost for the next three years.

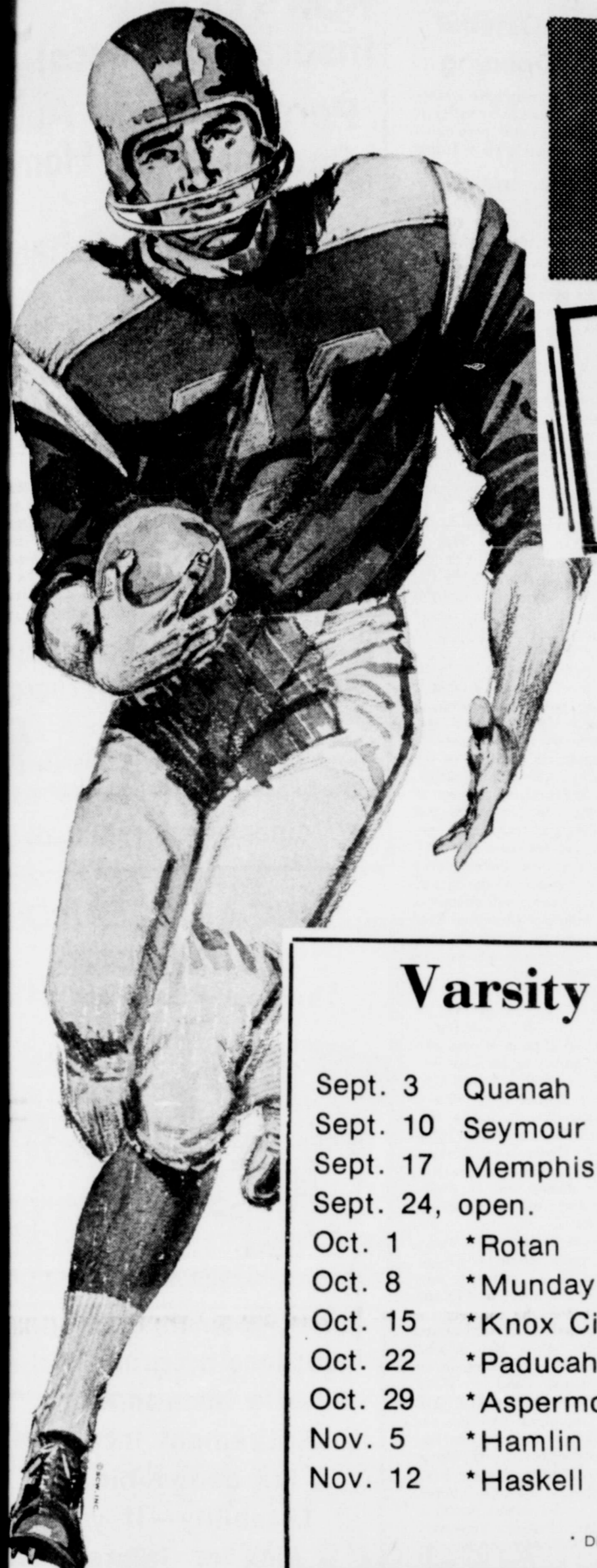

Low Altitude Flights to Continue

F-105 tactical fighters of the 301st Tactical Fighter Wing's 457th Tactical Squadron based at Carswell AFB, Tex., will continue to fly low altitude training missions over northwest Texas and southwest Oklahoma.

The low altitude missions are part of the wing's training program to assure that the F-105 fighter pilots maintain their proficiency to fly at high speeds low enough to get under enemy defenses and reach target areas.

Three routes are used for the low level flights. Route 214 starts seven miles northeast of Jacksboro, Tex.; travels west to Lake Kemp; north to a point west of Mangum, Okla.; and then loops east to a simulated target area about 20 miles

west of Lawton, Okla. Route 209 starts about 20 miles west of Denton, Tex.; passes north to Lone Grave, Okla., where it swings northwest to a point some 30 miles west of Oklahoma City. It then makes a loop and swings to the Wichita Mountains in Oklahoma, about 20 miles west of Lawton.

Both of these routes make a lazy sickle shape pattern, ending near Fort Sill, Okla.

The third flight pattern, route 219, follows route 214 to Lake Kemp, where it swings north to Frederick, Okla., and then northeast to Fort Sill.

According to General John E. Taylor, two flights of four aircraft each, use the routes daily. Tuesday through Saturday. These routes will

continue indefinitely, he said.

No sonic boom will result from the flights, which are flown at 420 knots 500-1500 feet above ground level.

In keeping with Tactical Air Command regulations, pilots will not fly low level over known hospitals, milk farms, large poultry farms, or congested areas.

The F-105 is a mach 2 multi-purpose all weather tactical fighter.

Vegetable Research Discussions

State Rep. W. S. "Bill" Heatly of Paducah talks about Rolling Plains agriculture on Sept. 8 when he takes part in a field day of the Texas A&M University Vegetable Research Station at Munday.

The veteran legislator will join Dr. Dudley T. Smith, assistant director of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, in emphasizing the importance of vegetable production to goals of the Rolling Plains Economic Program.

The Sept. 8 field day begins at 9:30 a. m. and ends about noon, said resident director Dr. B. D. Kingston. Guests will see research in the field with not only numerous vegetables but also such crops as sorghum, guar, cotton and soybeans.

Dr. Wayne G. McCully, resident director of the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center between Chillicothe and Vernon, will join other Experiment Station scientists to tell what research is finding about producing vegetables in the Rolling Plains.

Entomologists Dr. Jeffrey Slosser and Ronald D. Kirby, agricultural engineer David Bordovsky and soil scientist Dr. Cleveland J. Gerard, all of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, will tell about data they have gathered in studying insect control in vegetables and cotton and in managing the irrigation of potatoes and grain sorghum.

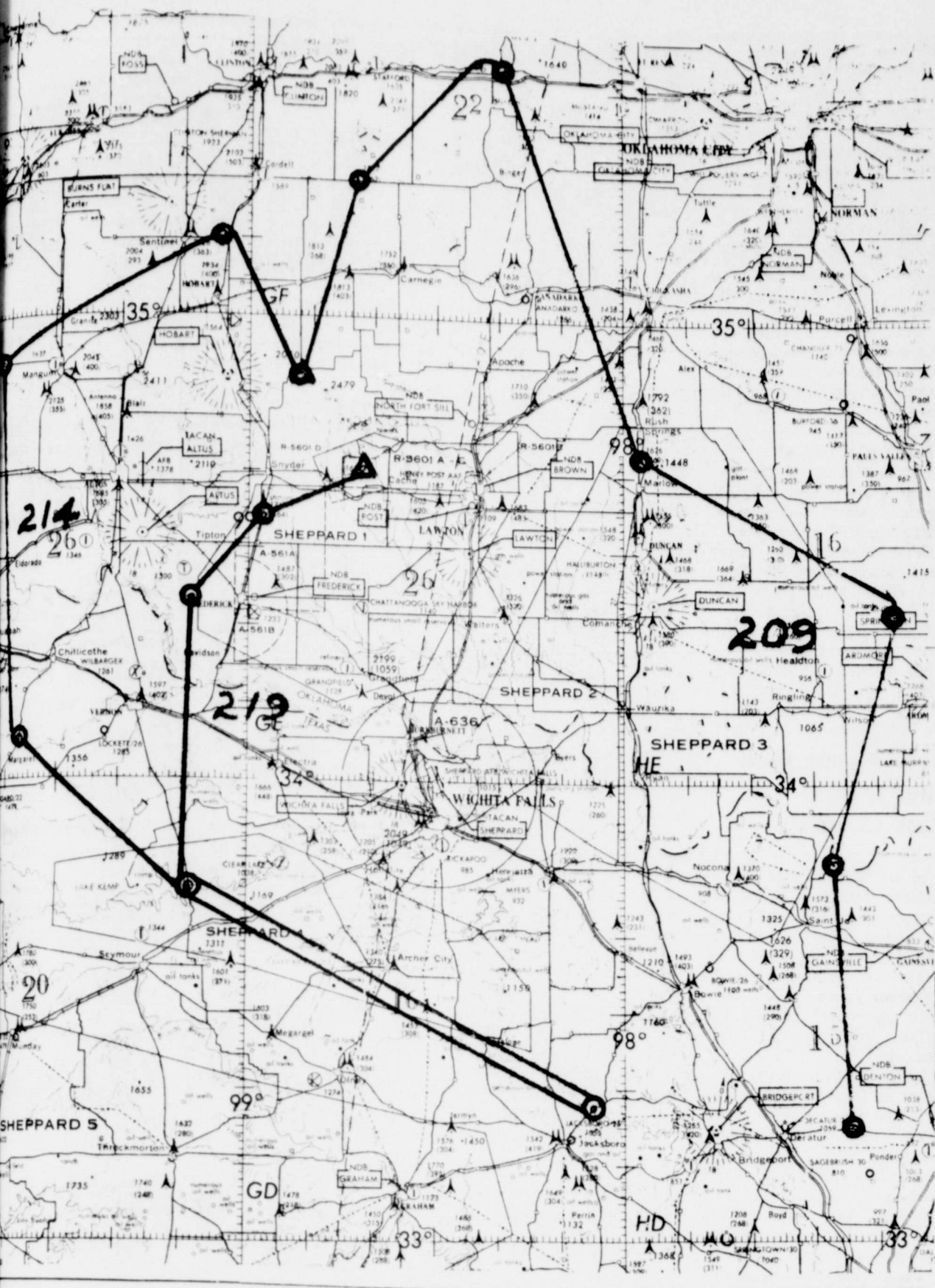

Food Factory Is in Serious Trouble

"This country's food factory is in serious trouble," the president of the Texas Farm Bureau says.

Carrol Chaloupka, Dalhart grain and cattle producer, said farmers and ranchers have responded to the call for more production, but have been penalized by lower prices.

"We have produced in such abundance that we have a big surplus, and this year's grain crops may set another record," he said. "Our production costs are rising with inflation just like everybody else's, but prices paid to grain producers and cattlemen have dropped."

The Farm Bureau leader said that at the end of the third week in August wheat prices were down 27 percent from a year ago, sorghum was 18 percent lower, corn down 10 percent, and that cattle had dropped 25 percent below last August—"which has a bad time for cattlemen."

Chaloupka said farmers are going to demand that no restrictions be placed on their markets, especially

export markets. "An embargo would be on the markets, especially export markets. 'Another embargo would be disastrous,' said. "It would also be a disaster to establish food grain reserves," the leader said. "That would depress prices further."
