### Summer Preschool to Start Monday

The Tahoka Independent School District Summer Preschool will begin Monday, May 31, and will operate from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. five days a week through July 23rd. The program is funded under Title I of Public Law 89-10 and is primarily for economically and educationally deprived children; however, other children may be included. Any child who will be six years of age or before September 1, 1971 and who was not enrolled during the 1970-71 school year in the Tahoka Independent School District Kindergarten Class is eligible to apply for admission. A morning snack plus a full meal will be served by Dorothy Smith of the Tahoka School Cafeteria staff. School bus will run in town and will pick up children just

before 8 a.m. and will deliver them home shortly after 1 p.m. Parents who live in the country are urged to transport their children to and from school as this program will offer great benefit to each child that attends.

There is no cost for this program and it is hoped that all minority group children within the eligible age will be enrolled. Children who were enrolled in a church kindergarten and who will be six years of age by September 1, 1971, are eligible and parents are urged to enroll them.

A regular teacher in Tahoka South Elementary School, Mrs. Louise Wyatt, will teach the class and she will have Connie Gardner and Sandra Marez to serve as her teacher aids. The program will consist of reading readiness, music, art, patriotism, organized educational games, concepts and organized play.

It is not necessary to have pre-registered for this program; therefore any parent who wants to enroll their child should bring the child to Tahoka South Elementary School at 8 a.m. Monday, May 31st. Melvin Burks, Director of Federal Programs for the Tahoka Schools, will coordinate the program and if anyone has a question concerning the program, they may call him at 998-4538 or may see him at the high school any day from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

He served the Baptist Church here as pastor for more than eight years, starting back in 1934, following a drouth.

George A. Dale has had a most unusual life as a minister. He was born back in the hill country of Tennessee January 12, 1881. He had his 90th birthday this past January, 1971. He married before he was eighteen years old and still lives with the same wife. That is saying a whole lot for a man. He started preaching sixty-five years ago in 1906 and served churches in Texas and Oklahoma. That will age any man.

When George A. Dale was pastor of the local church he was a public spirited citizen. He helped organize the old luncheon club and was a charter member of the Rotary Club. As pastor of the Baptist Church he led in a most substantial growth. The Brotherhood was organized. Four deacons were ordained; more than 300 members were baptized into the church. The top story auditorium was built on to the old basement and the debt paid off. This was in 1938, following the great depression, when a dollar was as big as a saddle blanket and was even harder to find.

Rev. Dale was a hard worker and driver and that, no doubt, was one of the contributing causes of his heart attack that

# SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

By RICHARD L. CHRISTIE

The men who know say it pays. That sounds like a slogan for an advertisement of a particular firm. But it is a good title for the subject of conservation of our natural renewable resources; water, plants, and soil. The farm and ranch management expert, I am talking about people actually in that business tell us every day that the return on money spent for improvement of nature through conservation is the best return on any money they spend.

John Barrow, Trust Officer for the Republic National Bank of Dallas, said this about conservation: "We keep record, good records, we know it pays". His job is to know and make the right decisions in management farm and ranch operations of the largest Agricultural trust department west of the Mississippi River. Barrow also said, "You got to start sometime with the conservation." Usually after you get started it only takes management to keep it in good shape. He added, "You have to spend a little to make a little and conservation works money well spent. We keep a good eye out for improvement and conservation is the best improvement."

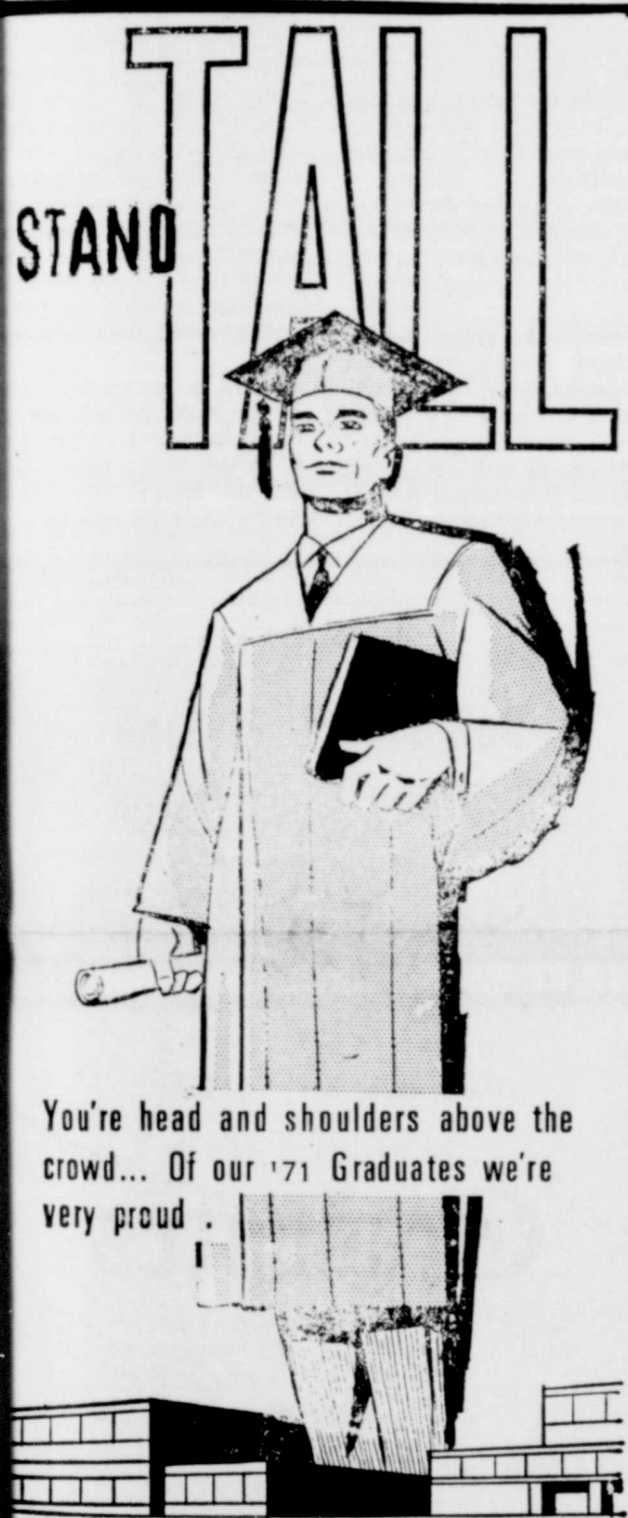
Billy Carr of Midland is Land Agent for the University of Texas System on 2.1 million acres they own in West Texas. This University System recently installed a policy of better grassland management on

the state-owned school land. This public land is located in 19 arid West Texas counties from Eldorado to El Paso has 5,700 oil and gas wells which pump nearly \$600 million into University Funds. It now has a mandatory policy to have and carry out a conservation plan on this land in order to renew a lease. There are 136 leases at this time. Carr was instrumental in getting this adopted after working with Herb Stoner with the Soil Conservation Service in Midland. Carr emphasized that the success of the program hinges on

the conservation plan and the willingness and interest of the lessee in carrying it out. Some day Carr thinks the university's conservation policy might help make the surface just as valuable as the rich subsurface resources. He points to increased grazing values, hunting and recreation development. The lessee initiates action with money held in escrow from surface damages of oil and gas companies. Then the lessee with the help of the S.C.S. sees to it that the management is applied and Carr uses the conservation as a yard stick to measure lessee and their application for lease renewal. The Trust Department of the First National Bank of Ft. Worth make conservation, both, management and mechanical treatment, a part of their lease agreement.

If these men that are professional have ask and received the help of S.C.S. in their conservation plans it indicates to me that it is worth while.

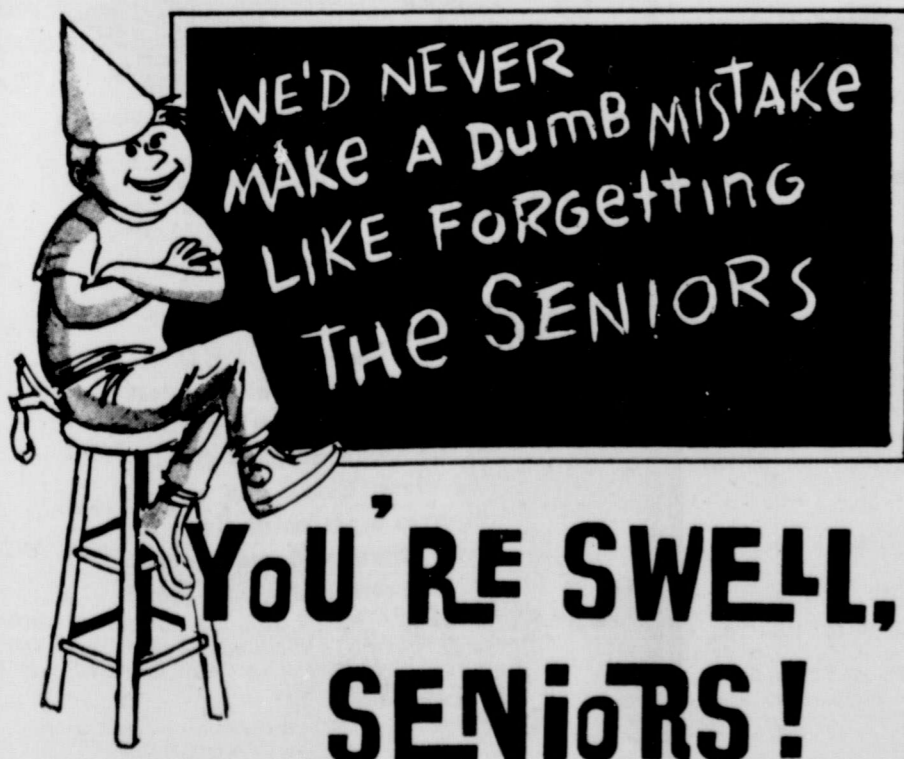

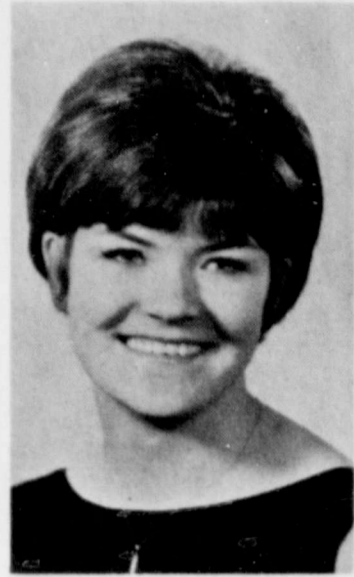


ROGER MILLER

EUNICE SMITH

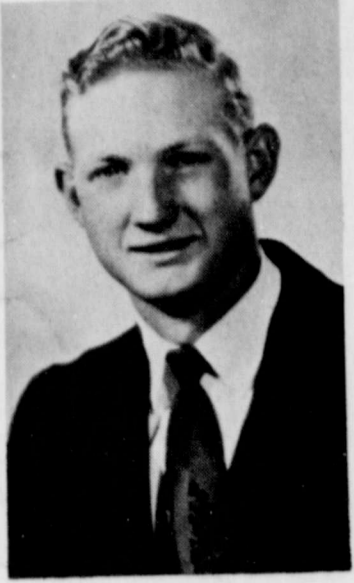
