We simply cannot buy the governor's story that his \$62, 500 windfall in Sharpstown stock was a routine business transaction by a friend. We can't understand how he knew only hazily about an unsecured loan for highly speculative purposes. If the governor didn't know why the Sharp bank ing bill was pushed through his office with his approval for special consideration, then he is either naive or gullible. And either of these two characteristics makes him unsuitable for the high office.

We fault Ben Barnes for not finding out more about the Sharp banking bill before he let it fly through the Senate. No one has proved that Barnes was linked with the stock scan dal and we will accept his word that he was not. But surely someone in the Senate knew what was going on. Lobbyists trying to ram through a very questionable bill don't spend the time, money and effort they did in the House and then do nothing in the Senate.

It would have been a simple matter for Ben Barnes to call in a few reliable senators and tell them to find out something about the bill and report. He had the power, he had the knowhow and the drive to illuminate any bill bearing the taint of suspicion. And he didn't. This could turn out to be the greatest mistake of his political life.



#### **Narrow-Row Cotton**

duction at the High Plains Research Foundation in 1971 pointed to the importance of management skills necessary for profitable production.

In the first year of the narrow-row cotton variety test, Dr. Owen said two things became evident. "First, the management aspect of farming narrow-row cotton is more critical than regular row width production and, secondy, there is not yet well adapted variety available to farmers.
"And we cannot over stress

the importance of management of cultural practices in narrow-row cotton production," Dr. Owen said.

The narrow-row cotton variety test was sponsored by companies with varieties in the test and a grant from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. Dr. Owen said this test would be continued this year.

Dr. Owen pointed out that narrow-row cotton production means anything planted on less than 40 - inch rows. Cotton in narrow-row tests at the Foundation was doublerowed 12 inches apart on 40. inch beds. Yields ranged from the top 386 pounds per acre to 197 pounds on varieties in the test. Low yields resulted from excessive fertilizer and moisture combined with unfavorable weather in Aug-

ust and September. The high yielding performer was the Paymaster dwarf variety which should be available to farmers possibly in another year. Dr. Owen said. He stated there was no significant yield difference among varieties in the test. Top performers currently available to farmers included Paymaster

18, Rilcot Stripper N, Blanco 3363, Lockett 4789A, Coker 312, Dunn 119, Tamcot 788 and Belew 5B.

Dr. Owen said cultural practices, especially bed shaping, were more critical for narrow-row production. shaping for uniform width and height is important for easier harvesting. Irrigation timing, weed control and plant population are other important factors,' Dr. Owen said.

Normally in narrow - row production, population of 70, 000 or more plants per acre are expected as compared to 40,000 - 50,000 plants in regular 40-inch rows, he noted.

The highest yields recorded in the standard single-row variety test were two experimental Paymaster varieties. The highest yield on a released variety was Dunn 119 with a 516 pound yield. Average yield for the test was 401 pounds.

Due to the adverse weather condition, micronaire readings for all varieties were low with an average of 2. 9 and grades ran in the low middling range.

Recommending some of the better performing varieties for this area, Dr. Owen suggested Paymaster 111A, Belew 5B, Coker 312, Paymaster 18, Paymaster 202, Tamcot 788, and Blanco 3520.

"There are more cotton varieties than the 26 in our test but only those entered by the

various seed companies interested in the performance of their varieties in this area are tested. Therefore, we have no way of judging the performance of those varieties not included in our tests."

This vitamin is found in grains. Normally we would get vitamin E through bread and cereal, but todays grains are processed to the point where the essential vitamin is lost. Whole wheat bread contains it. Also wheat germ.







Accordingly, the basic principles

of contract law will apply. Once the terms of the agreement are fixed, neither side can arbitrarily make changes.

However, if the contest judges keep within the limits of the original contract, they generally do have broad discretion.

In another case, contestants were supposed to deposit their entries in person at the show-room of a local automobile dealer. One contestant, disqualified by the judges for having mailed in his entry, insisted that this was too flimsy a reason for him to be barred.

But this time, the judges' ruling was upheld in court. The court said they had acted within the reasonable scope of their

What about a rule against participation by company employees and their families? Again, the specific wording is crucial. In one case, the father of a company salesman submitted an entry in a football pool contest.

According to the rules, "no employee or member of his immediate family" could compete. Was the father a member of his son's "immediate family"?

In a court hearing, he pointed out that the son lived in his own home, on his own income, with his own wife and children. The court concluded there was enough separateness between the two men to leave the father eligible. He took first prize.






