Focusing on the theme EX-PLORE ROLES - EXTEND GOALS, they join half-a-million other members throughout the country in exploring the multiple roles individuals play in family, community and career life.

The results of their efforts are active involvement in home, civic and school projects, growth in individual leadership, team work experience and vocational orientation.

For more than a quarter of a century, the organization through its FHA and HERO-FHA chapters has provided worthwhile experiences which have helped young men and women prepare for the important responsibilities of their future as parents and adult citizens.

Paula Julian, President of the Texas FHA State Association explained why there is a NATIONAL FHA WEEK. "We observe NATIONAL FHA WEEK," she said, "because we are proud of our organization and wish to develop a public consciousness of some of the values we gain from membership.

"During this week we have an opporutnity to express our appreciation to our advisors. parents, school, and community for helping the organization move forward. Organized Crime

Organized crime has become a billiondollar-a-year business in the State of Tex-

Governor Dolph Briscoe, in his first address to the Legislature, said "it is correct to say Texas is in the frontier stage of organized crime, but we still have time to react and do something about it."

Attorney General John Hill and Colonel Wilson E. Speir, Director of the Department of Public Safety, are acutely aware of the problem and both have it high on their priority list.

"We are not about to sit back and let Texans be victimized by mobsters," Hill said recently.

Speir commented, "We have all aspects of the problem under close surveillance and already are making many arrests. It may be however, that new laws will be needed to assist us in cracking down hard on certain elements of organized crime."

Hill and Speir are co-chairmen of the Texas Organized C rime Prevention Council which consists of the state's top law enforcement personnel.

The Council has compiled some start. ling information.

... Gang killings, used effectively to gain promotion up through the ranks, are still occurring in and around the major metropolitan areas.

The majority of the gangland murders are believed tied to narcotics trafficing and underworld power struggles.

... Bookmaking is perhaps the largest money maker for organized crime in the state.

Bookies realized a gross profit of \$98 million from both college and professional football games during the 1971 season alone. Bets totaled some \$815 million which means about 12 per cent "off the top" went into the pockets of organized crime."

"Bookmaking is the most intricately organized field in all of crime," Colonel Speir commented, "and our investigations have just touched the surface but we are making progress."

... Prostitution is prevalent in many areas, especially those with sizeable populations.

Available information places the average gross weekly income per prostitute in Texas at \$1,400 for those working in the more sophisticated operations.

This is usually split on a 60-40 basis with the "House" or the procurer. Prostitutes, in many instances, are

lured into that "profession" to obtain money to support a costly narcotics hab-

-- At least eighteen separate narcotics smuggling rings are known to be operating in Texas cities. There are several hundred major trafficers who have been located and identified by various law enforcement agencies.

Vigorous prosecution at all levels of law enforcement has been stepped up on drug pushers. Arrests are increasing state.

The "take" in Texas on illicit drug traffic is almost impossible to reduce to dollars and cents, partially because of strong indications that in addition to supplying users in the state, the pushers also supply the markets in at least nine other

Texas drug rings are known, for example to supply connections in Chicago, New York and Miami.

This unsavory phase of gangland is highly profitable, however. It also leaves in its wake thousands of broken and shattered lives and death. Violence comes easy

in the uneasy world of the drug pusher. Nuevo Laredo's dope war bloothbaths have attracted national and international attention to that Mexican City just across the Rio Grande from Texas.

A Bexar County grand jury report last spring "isolated" nine criminal organizations connected with narcotics headquar. tered in San Antonio and the surrounding area. Since then San Antonio police have put several of these out of business and are actively working on the others.

The report said " no indications of a direct connection with the Mafia" was found in San Antonio.

District Attorney Ted Butler says, however, "organized syndicates are directly connected as purchasers and sellers of illegal drugs.'

...Poetically, or jokingly, dubbed the "Wheels of Crime," no less than 40 auto theft rings have been uncovered in Texas. Last year in Dallas alone car theft hit near the \$7 million mark.

Statewide there were 48,323 autothefts reported in 1971.

Valued at over \$50 million, these hot



cars were "fenced" in Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, California, Mexico and even Europe.

Not only are cars stolen to be stripped of their valuable parts but also resold after changing the true identification. Texas law enforcement officials state flatly that stolen vehicles figure heavily as trans.

portation for crooks involved in armed robbery, kidnapping and other offenses.

The thieves don't limit themselves to automobiles by any means.

C ampers, motorcycles, mobile homes, heavy equipment, boats and motors -- just about anything and everything on two or four wheels is fair game.

In the theft area, the problem of the "fence" is a mjor one.

Many of them recruit newcomers, especially youths for a car heist, with the thieves thus launches on criminal careers.

Narcotics, car theft rings, the "fence" (purchaser of stolen goods), and bookmak. ing are areas in which law enforcement officials feel stronger laws are needed.

Specifically, they refer to the political hot potato of electronic surveillance.

Federal court ordered electronic surveillance, which includes but is not limited to wire tapping, is legal under the Federal Omnibus Crime Control Act, but the Texas Legislature has yet to authorize it in this state by statute.

"While not in favor of just opening it we must see that proper controls such as

a court order based on probable cause, proper supervision and discretion are used," said Colonel Speir.

"Uses of electronic surveillance must be carefully limited and the penalties for abuse of this power must be high. No bill will ever have my support which does not protect law-abiding citizens from the invasion of their privacy," Governor Briscoe told the Legislature.

Attorney General Hill is also cautious about "bugs" and wire taps. He concurs, though, with Governor Briscoe and Colonel Speir that tightly regulated electronic surveillance can be effective in investigat. ing certain conspiratorial, organized criminal rings .. who plot their criminal plans by telephone.

"In seeking this type of limited law to assist our law enforcement personnel, we must be certain to build in adequate penalties for those who would undertake to illegally invade the privacy of lawabiding citizens," Hill pointed out.

But organized crime in Texas is not limited to gambling, prostitution, narcotics or auto theft.

There is evidence the policy rackets have moved into the Gulf Coast area.

"The Numbers" long has been a key part of mob business throughout the United States, but apparently it isn't that big a threat in Texas yet.

Poor people are the major customers for numbers racket operators.

Loan sharking has not found too fertile a field in which to operate in Texas, although there is some evidence it exists.

Organized crime also has quietly moved in legitimate businesses in Texas in recent years. Symptoms of criminal sheemes to take

over legitimate business operations surfaced in Texas during 1972.

A major Texas newspaper reported one "text book" example in a coastal city.

The owner of a small company was lured into joining a "mob-controlled conglomerate" by fantastic offers of credit, stability and dizzy promises of rapid financial success.

In the end, the firm's assests were raided (transferred and milked) and the company was left bankrupt.

Lawsuits pending in T exas courts list charges of "fraudulent advertising of as-

sets resulting in an increase in stock prices," "conspiring to gain control," and "attempting to dissipate the assest of both the company and the holding company.

One federal crime fighter recently noted "more and more racketeers are go-

ing into securities transactions." In recent months several Texas banks were defrauded in an illicit securities scheme that began in San Francisco and had ramifications in New Jersev.

"Cities hit in this one scheme included Houston, El Paso and Lubbock," investigators said.

One of the oldest tools of organized crime is the application of pressure to coerce potential victims.

Operators within criminal ranks will resort even to murder if the purpose suit their bosses.

Even office holders are not immune from being the object of criminal conspiracies.

For example, one office holder found himself the target of an alleged plot which resulted in indictment of threee South Texas men at the conclusion of a two-month investigation.

"The conspiracy involved the attempt to hire someone to commit murder," said a court spokesman.

Although it may not sound like ti from the above facts, Texas organized crime really isn't rampant at this point.

There's no Murder, Inc. as such, and there are no gang lords with overtones of "Godfathers."

Organized crime is not necessarily synonoymous with the Mafia.

"In general," said Colonel Speir, "it consists of unlawful activities of the members of a highly organized, disciplined and sophisticated association engaged in supplying illegal goods and services."

The Colonel added, "Home-grown criminal organization frequently employ the same tactics used by those in the more classic organized criminal operations."

Attorney General Hill puts it another way. "We know the problem exists, and all segments of the criminal justice system are working on it. Texans deserve nothing but the best efforts of us all . they have been and will continue to get nothing less to make sure their lives and property are protected."

The ink on the reverse of the stamp has been approved by the Food and Drug Adminis. tration.

"Many Americans can readily identify the role of their letter carriers, window clerks and postmasters," Mr. Klassen said. "But too often they are not aware that it also takes thousands of mail handlers, clerks, motor vehicle operators, rural letter carriers, special delivery messengers, maintenance employees, supervisors, and many other specialized people to move the

Fifty million of each of the 10 stamps in the series will be printed for a total of onehalf billion stamps. Normally, 150 million stamps in a commemorative series are printed. The stamps were designed by artist Edward Vebell of Westport, Connecticut.

"We could not depict every type of job performed in the Postal Service," Mr. Klassen said. "There are hundreds of vital duties performed in the process of handling our enormolus voluem of mail." He added, "these stamps and the Postal Week observance are both aimed at highlighting the important role performed by postal people as they serve the citizens of the communities where they live."

-- Postal employees cover four million miles each delivery day -- roughly eight round trips to the moon.

The Postal People stamps will first be printed on ungummed paper by gravure on the Andreotti press. The printd rolls will then be trans. ferred to the Cottrell press where the adhesive will be applied. There will be 50 stamps to the pane. The selvage of each pane will contain five plate number and the

words: "Postal People include Postmasters and Supervisors, Letter Carriers, C lerks, Mail Handlers, Motor Vehicle Operators, Rural Letter Carr. iers, Special Delivery Messengers, and Maintenance Employees All Serving YOU."

A special sourvnir envelope honoring Postal People with a cachet (a design printed on the lower left corner of the envelope) will be offered free to the public at each local post office on April 30th as long as the supply lasts. The envelope will be large enough to accommodate the set of ten stamps and they may be entered into the mail to receive a local cancellation. There will also be handback service at the window counter of each local post office.

The first day of issuance will occur at each local post office, branch and station.

The Postal Service will also offer the complimentary cach. eted envelope, with ten stamps affixed, by mail order to collectors for \$1.00 (80 cents worth of stamps, plus 20 cents handling charge). Two cancellations will be used for each strip of ten, each cancelling half the strip.

The cancellations will read "United States Postal Service, April 30, 1973, First Day of Issue." They will have the U.S.P.S. emblem with the words "People Serving You." Collectors also may submit their own cover bearing the stamp or stamps of their choice for cancellation. This cover should be self-addressed and contain a filler of postcard thickness.

The second service is ofoffered for collectors who place covers in albums, since the complimentary envelope is too large for most albums.

Requests for either type of mail order service should be sent to "Postal People Stamps, Postmaster, Boston, MA 02109," postmarked no later than May 7.


Burial was in Tahoka Cemetery directed by White Funeral Home.

History of Future Homemakers of America

This year marks the 28th anniversary of the founding of Future Home-makers of America as a national youth organization in vocational education, co-related with the home economics education program.

The signing of the first National Vocational Education Act by President Woodrow Wilson brought into being federally-supported, state-conducted programs of vocational education which included home economics. Through home economics education the foundation was laid for the development of Future Homemakers of America as an integral part of the program.

An outgrowth of various state and local high school home economics clubs known by different names, Future Homemakers of America was founded June 11, 1945 as an incorporated, non-profit national organization for home economics students in junior and senior high schools, both public and private.

Members of The American Home Economics Association and the Home Economics Education Staff of the U. S. Office of Education took the lead in forming this national organization to provide an opportunity for all home economics clubs to combine afforts in working together on improved home and family living on a national scale.

Kentucky was the first State Association to affiliate with the national organization. By the end of the first year, membership had almost doubled and national offices had been moved into the U.S. Office of Education.

Future Homemakers of America begin their twenty-fifth year with 604,000 members in 12,000 local high school chapters. The record shows affiliated associations in all 50 States, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and The Virgin Islands—and affiliated chapters in American Schools located in Germany, Japan, Iran, and The Canal Zone.

In its twenty eight years of existence Future Homemakers of America has served more than fifteen million high school youth.





Producers will again be faced with the possibility of using ality seed. low quality seed in planting

their 1973 crop. Weather conditions in 1972 that resulted in low micronaire lint, also contributed to the production of immature seed. The result was a heavy cleanout at delinting plants to obtain acceptable seed for planting.

These seed are often low in vigor even though they show satisfacroty germination. Ev. en heavy, fully developed seed frequently deteriorated in the field due to unfavorable weather. Early harvest produced exceptionally high quality seed in these fields, but seed quality became progress. ively worse as harvest was delayed due to wet fields.

Since high quality is basic to getting a cotton crop off to a rapid start, every effort should be made to secure the best quality seed possible. The cost of planting seed represents only five percent or less of total production cost. So, trying to cut cost here by purchasing so-called bargain seed can be more costly in terms of poor stands, replanting and finally low yields. High quality seed will contribute to more rapid seedling emergence, uniform stands which can better tolerate cold, wet conditions associated with seedling decay

organisms. In many instances, producers have no choice but to

plant lower than desired qu.

In this case, he should plant his best quality seed first when weather conditions during early spring are more unfavorable for seedling emer. gence. As the planting season advances and soil becomes warmer, the grower can use lower quality seed after the other seed has been exhaust.

A good rule of thumb, is to allow the soil temperature at the eight-inch depth to average 60 degrees Farenheit for 10 days before planting. A significantly higher percentage and more rapid emergence of seedling will be obtained if this soil temperature is reached at planting. This is even more critical if lower quality seed are planted.

In using low quality seed, the planting rate may be increased by five to ten percent depending on the level of seed quality. Excessive increase in planting rate can worsen matters by causing a buildup of seed decay organisms in the drill row. In order to adjust planting rates, properly, a grower must know the germ. ination percent and quality of seed he is about to plant. He should make sure that seed are treated with a recommended fungicide.

If producers have to plant low quality seed, they should delay planting until the soil warms up, increase seeding rates slightly and prepare a good seed bed prederably on a

TGSPB Investigates India's Charge Of U.S. Grain Contamination

A recent report by the Indian government, stating that a February shipment of U.S. grain sorghum was contam. inated with jimsonweed seed, is causing concern among grain sorghum producers of the United States. The Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, located in Lubbock, Texas, has begun an investigation of the complaint. In its meeting on March 20, the Board instructed its Education Committee, headed by John Gilbreath of Hart, Texas, to work with the staff inc ing a thorough investigation.

India has been experiencing a severe drought for several months and has purchased large supplies of grain from the United States because of its food shortage. Grain sorghum, included in these purchases, has become more widely accpeted as a human food in remonths. Through a TGSPB grant, recipes are now being developed for foods made from grain sorghum. This is due to frequent requests for recipes from foreign countries, particularly those in the Far East.

If grain sorghum used in human foods does contain jimsonweed seed, the result could be serious, as the weed is

highly toxic and can be deadly

when consumed in sufficient

quantities. Elbert Harp, exec-

utive director of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board, stated that this problem has never before occurr. ed.possibly due to the fact that grain sorghum for human consumption is a relatively new idea. He emphasized, "If the shipment to India contained

enough jimsonweed seed to cause any ill effects, we certainly want to know about it and take steps to prevent this from happening agains."

In a letter to the Ambassador to India, Harpsaid, "The grain sorghum producers of the United States are proud of our grain and we are striving to improve its quality and acceptance throughout the world. Therefore, we want to secure all the information possible regarding the shipment of grain which contained jimsonweed seed. Our board has instructed me to carry out a complete investigation and try to determine the steps necessary to see that such problems do not reoccur."

Harp requested the following information: (1 the size of the shipment of grain which was reported to be contaminated; (2 from whom it was purchased; (3 the port from which it was shipped; (4 the date of arrival in India; (the percentage of iimsonweed seed that was found; (6 how the seed was discovered; and (

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if any illness occurred in India as a result of this contamination.

The TGS PB Education Committee has also requested the U.S. Department of Agriculture's assistance in complet. ing a full investigation of the

Weed Control

vent proper incorporation of preplant herbicides which later results in poor weed control. This warning is sounded by Dr. Robert B. Metzer, area agronomist - cotton with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service at Lubbock.

Working wet soil produces clods that cannot be mixed properly with the herbicide, Metzer explains. As a result, weed seed germinate in these soil clods after a rain and cause week problems after the cotton emerges.

Proper application rate and good incorporation is the key to getting good week control with preplant herbicides , he says. Growers should follow the label, applying rates according to soil type.

"Heavy textured soils," Metzer emphasizes, "will require high rates than lighter, sandy type soil. Excessive crop residue or more cloddy conditions may require slightly higher rates to get effective weed control. Heavy crop residue should be worked into the soil before spraying.'

The best incorporation is obtained when the soil is slightly on the dry side, the agronomist points out, but anytime the soil works well with tillage equipment is a good sign that the herbicide will mix properly with the soil.

The Extension specialist added that under certain conditions. a producer might obtain higher return for his herbicide dollar if he considers banding herbicides at planting, using a drag behind his planter for slight incorporation.

"Banding herbicides at planting helps insure against weed growth if conditions such as cloddy soil, high crop residues, and excessive. ly wet soil prevents good incorporation of preplant herbicides," he explains. "Producers should check the guar. antee label concerning the use of Trefland and Planavin at planting. Applying herbicides at this time will result in substantial control of pigweed and

other annual weeds, but will not effectively control Johnsongrass, volunteer grain sor. ghum and other deeper germinating weed seed."

Other preemerge herbi cides applied at planting and approved for cotton, Metzer reports, are Caparol, Sancap, Dacthal, Karmex and Lasso.



The Texas grower said cotton producers have concentrated on cutting costs and and increasing profits in marketing fiber and have tended to ignore cottonseed.

"But all that is changing," he said. "We producers must realize that cotton is the only plant known to man that produces both food and fiber.

"It is good to clothe man. But it is just as important to feed man, and the animals that provide him meat and milk."



Throughout the political campaigning of 1972 the Administration in Washington heaped praise on the Agriculture Act of 1970 and vowed to seek its extension beyond 1973. Farmers, for the most part pleased with the cotton, wheat and feed grain programs embodied in the Act, were delighted.

But this delight is fast becoming 'dismay. Agriculture and agricluture's friends on Capitol Hill in recent months are finding that the Administration's desire for an extension of the 1970 Act doesn't mean, as it appeared, that President Nixon and Company want a continuation of current farm programs. Far

The official Administration line is still "Extend the 1970 Act." But the Administration now is calling for an extension "with minor revisions." And the proposed "minor" revisions are designed specifically to kill, not continue, farm programs as they operated under the 1970 Act.

Secretary of Agriculture Earl Butz, testifying March 20 before the House Agriculture Committee, echoed previous statements by President Nixon when he said income supplement payments to farmers should be phased out in three years following which the commodity-by-commodity base acreage system would be scrapped in favor of an overall cropland base program with payments for set-aside acreage only.

Thus if Congress follows the Administration's lead, all that will be left of present programs and the Act of 1970 after three years will be a crumbling skeleton. With no income supplement payments and with no commodity-bycommodity set-aside requirements, agriculture would be left operating in a completely free supply-demand market over which neither farmers nor Government would have any significant influence. Buyers, as always, would dictate prices.

A report compiled by the Congressional Research Service of the Library of Congress at the request of Senate Agriculture and Forestry Committee Chairman Herman Talmadge, outlines some drastic effects of permitting the Administration to have its way on this issue.

On cotton, for example, market prices without a farm program are projected at 25 to 27 cents a pound, basis middling-inch . Considering that

Spring Planting Behind Schedule . . . Texas on Quarterly Report . . . Summer Potato Plantings Increase . . . Early Lamb Crop Outlook . . . Egg Production

Planting schedules throughout Texas are behind schedule from as much as two to four weeks in many areas. All of the state-with perhaps exceptions in some sections--have adequate moisture for 1973 spring growing.

Cotton planting in the Lower Rio Grande Valley has been hampered by a long siege of wet, cold weather. Seedbed preparation is considerably behind schedule from the Blacklands to the Valley.

Wheat continues to make excellent growth on the High and Low Plains, Edwards Plateau, East Texas and Central Texas. Oats are also providing good grazing in most

Grain sorghum planting is underway in the southern half of the state but has been slowed due to wet weather.

HOG numbers are down nine percent in Texas as of March 1. On that date there were 1,150,000 head of hogs and pigs in the state. Texas recently has been added to a quarterly hog report, which shows the increased importance of the swine industry in Texas in relation to the rest of the

Texas hog producers intend to farrow 62,000 sows during March to May, which is nine percent more than a year ago.

June-August intended farrowings are estimated at 68,000 head, the same as a year ago.

Of the March 1 inventory of hogs and pigs in Texas, 16 percent were reported as being kept for breeding

Nationwide, hogs and pigs in the 10 corn belt states are up two percent from a year ago. The December 1972-February 1973 pig crop is six percent above last year. A nine percent increase in sows farrowing was partially offset by a three percent decrease in average litter rate.

EARLY lamb crop in Texas as well as the nation shows a four percent decline from a year ago. For the three-state-total--Texas, Kansas and California--the early lamb crop totaled 1,831,000 head. For Texas, the lamb crop totaled 970,000 head. The Jan. 1 inventory of ewes one year old and older was down nine percent. Lambing is reported to be ahead of last year.

Texas sheep and lambs on feed as of March 1 totaled 237,000 head, which is down nine percent from a year ago and 30 percent below Jan, 1. Sheep and lambs on feed are those intended for slaughter being fed a ration of grain or other concentrates or on succulent pastures and expected within the next three months to produce a carcass which will grade good or better.

INTENDED plantings for summer potatoes in Texas this year is estimated to be six percent more than a year ago. Growers intend to plant 15,500 acres this year compared to 14,600 acres last season. Early plantings are underway on the High Plains and will continue through

Potatoes in the Lower Rio Grande Valley have emerged and most fields reportedly have a good stand. Growth has been slowed by seasonable cold weather and **Unfred On Cotton** Inc. Board



"SHALL the Board of Trustees of the SOUTHLAND IN-DEPENDENT SCHOOL DIS-TRICT of Garza, Lynn and Lubbock Counties, Texas, be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOL-LARS (\$500,000) for school building purposes, to wit: the construction and equipment of school buildings in the District and the purchase of the necessary sites therefor, and shall there be pledged and levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due, said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at

such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Trustees shall determine?"

SECTION 4: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in acordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid propositions which shall be

set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 "MAINTENANCE TAX" PROPOSITION NU MBER 2 "THE ISSUANCE OF \$500, 000 BONDS AND THE LEVY-ING OF THE TAX IN PAY-MENT THEREOF"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of each proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the

way he wishes to vote. SECTION 5: All resident qualified electors of the District, including those who own taxable property in said District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation. shall be permitted to vote at said election. At said election two spearate ballot boxes shall be provided at each polling place. In one box only resident qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be allowed to vote. In another box all resident qualified electors (who are otherwise qualified but do not owntaxable property which has been duly rendered for taxation) shall be allowed to vote. The votes cast in each of said boxes shall be recorded, returned and canvassed in such manner as will reflect separately the votes cast by the qualified electors who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for

by all qualified electors (including those who own taxable property and who have duly rendered the same for taxation).

SECTION 6 : A substantial copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election and said notice shall be published one time at least ten (10) days prior to the date set for the election in a newspaper of general circulation in the Dis-


