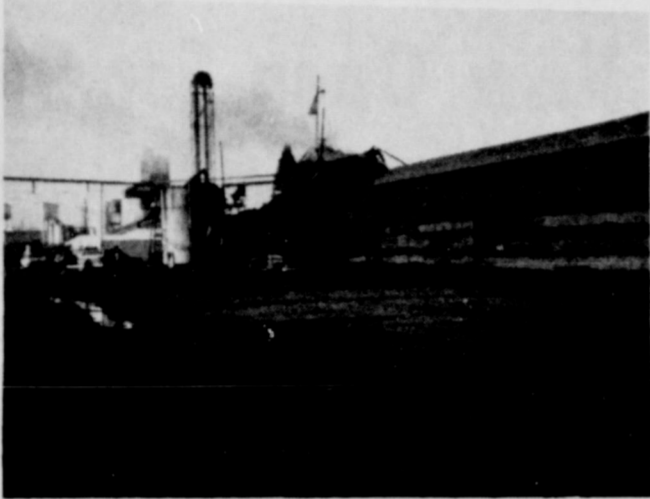
Accidents in County

Texas Highway Patrol reported two accidents on highways in Lynn County during the month of May 1976, according to H.E. Pirtle, Highway supervisor of this county. Crashes resulted in persons killed and no injured. A fatal traffic accident for this county during the first four months of 1976 shows a total of 11 deaths resulting in one killed and one injured. A fatal traffic accident for the 60 counties in Lubbock County Safety Region for 1976, shows a total of 10 deaths resulting in 10 killed and 318 injured, as compared to 1975, with 425 deaths resulting in 18 killed and 251 injured. This was 85 percent more injured in 1976 than in 1975. In the following two each in the county: Boyd and Wise; and one in Boyd, Hale, Haskell, Potter, and Roberts.

One Volunteer Umpire's Story

The following article has been making the newspaper circuit in recent weeks and was brought by the Sentinel by a person who saw it in the Hobbs paper. It is an article that fits almost any Little League town or community, but carries a message everyone should hear.

The article, in the form of a letter by Donald Jensen, a volunteer sandlot umpire in Terre Haute, Ind., is food for thought. During one particular game, he was struck on the head by a thrown bat. He finished calling the game, but was later admitted to a hospital for overnight observation. It was while in the hospital that he wrote the following:

Dear Parent: I am an umpire. I don't do it for a living, only on weekends for fun. I've played the game, coached it, watched it. But somehow nothing takes the place of umpiring. Maybe it's because, deep down, I feel I'm providing kids a chance to play the game without disagreement and argument. With all the fun I've had, there is something that bothers me about my job. Some folks don't understand why I'm there. Some feel I'm there to exert authority upon their son. For that reason, they often yell at me when I make a mistake or encourage their son to say things that hurt my feelings. How many of you really understand that I try to be perfect? I don't want your son to feel he got a bad deal from an umpire. Yet, no matter how hard I try, I can't be perfect. I counted the number of calls I made in a six-inning game today. The total number balls, strikes, safes, outs, was 146.

I tried my best to call them all right, but I'm sure I missed some. When I figured my percentage on paper, I could have missed eight calls and still got about 95% correct. In most occupations, that percentage would be considered excellent. If I were in school, that grade would get an 'A' for sure.

But your dreams are higher. Let me tell you more about my game today...

There was one real close play that ended the game. A runner for the home team was trying to score on a passed ball. The catcher chased the ball and threw it to the pitcher covering the plate. The pitcher made the tag and I called the runner out.

As I was getting my equipment to leave, I heard one of the parents comment: "It's too bad the kids have to lose games because of rotten umpires. That was one of the loudest calls I've ever seen."

I felt just terrible when I

got home. Here was a group of kids who had made a lot of mistakes which cost them a number of runs. Obviously, a team which does not play well, yet is given the chance to blame the loss on an umpire, is being given the chance to take all the responsibility for the loss from their shoulders.

A parent or adult leader who permits young players to blame his failures on an umpire, regardless of the quality of that umpire, is doing the worst kind of injustice to the youngster. Rather than learning responsibility, such attitude fosters an improper outlook toward the ideals of the game itself. This irresponsibility is bound to carry over to future years.

As I sit here writing this letter, I am no longer as upset as I was this afternoon. I wanted to quit umpiring. But my wife reminded me of another situation which occurred last week.

I was umpiring the plate for a pitcher who panted his displeasure at any call on a borderline pitch that was not in his favor. One could sense he wanted the crowd to realize he was a fine, talented player who was doing his best and that I was a black-hearted villain working against him.

The kid continued for two innings while at the same time yelling at his own players who dared make a mistake. The manager watched. When the kid went to the dugout to bat at the top of the third, the manager called him aside.

In a voice loud enough that I was able to hear, the lecture went like this: "Listen, son, it's time you make a decision. You can be an umpire, actor or pitcher. But you can be only one at a time when you play for me. Right now your job is to pitch and, basically, you're doing a lousy job. Leave the acting to the actors and the umpiring to the umpires or you won't do any pitching here. What's it going to be?"

Needless to say, the kid chose pitching and went on to win the game. When it was over, the kid followed me to my car. Fighting to hold back tears, he apologized and thanked me for umpiring his game. He said he'd learned a lesson he'd never forget.

I can't help but wonder, as I lie here how many fine young men are missing their chance to develop into outstanding ballplayers because their parents encourage them to spend time umpiring rather than working harder to play the game as it should be played.

Note: The morning after volunteer umpire Donald Jensen wrote those words, he died of a brain concussion.

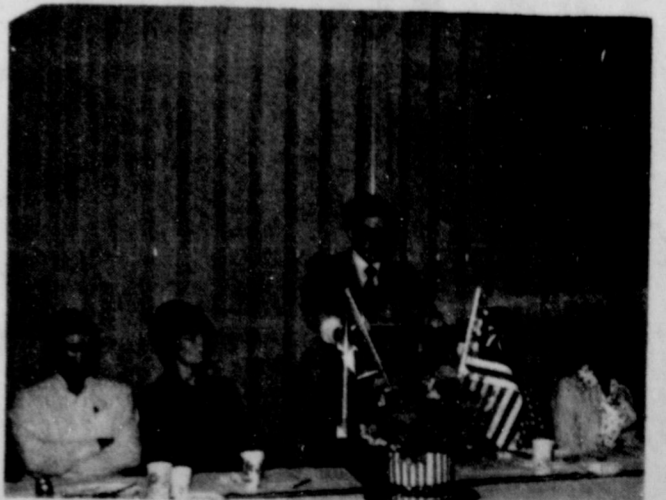

Texas Taxes

AUSTIN---Some Texas consumers are being charged sales tax by mistake on non-taxable items. The Comptroller's Department constantly attempts not only to collect all taxes legitimately owed to the State of Texas, but also to insure that no taxpayer pays more taxes than required by law. We are trying to help those taxpayers who are overcharged save those extra pennies. The problem occurs most often in drive-in, fast-stop

grocery stores. While many items sold in such stores are taxable, take-home food is not. Many of these stores now sell sandwiches and offer their customers the choice of heating it in a radar oven or taking it home. Drive-in groceries are not considered eating establishments. Often, however, the clerks in these stores are not aware of the subtleties of the law and mistakenly charge the tax on the sandwich as a restaurant would be required to do on a meal. If the item cost 95 cents, the tax collected in error would be five cents. The consumer loses a nickel. As we all know so well—especially during these tough economic times when inflation is depleting almost everyone's pocketbook—those pennies and nickels add up fast.

God's Authority And The New Morality

The "new morality" is spreading in our country. The "new morality" is an attitude which says that man is a law unto himself and that this law varies with the circumstances. Man is to "do his own thing." What else can we expect when an ever increasing number of religious people deny or ignore God's authority.

There are those who want to seek comfort because of their denial of Bible authority; therefore, they twist scripture so that wrong is no longer wrong. People decide that denial of God's authority is really alright because they are "doing their own thing" according to the dictates of the circumstances. Their conscience becomes seared and no longer rebukes them for they have rationalized and become deluded in their understanding of good and bad. (Read 2 Thess. 2:10-11) They can "do their own thing" till their heart's content without being disturbed by their own conscience or the rebukes of others.

Of such, Isaiah said, "Woe unto them that draw iniquity with cords of falsehood, and sin as it were a cart rope --- Woe unto them that call evil good, and good evil; that put darkness for light, and light for darkness; that put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter!" (Isa. 5:18-20) Religious advocates of the "new morality" quickly turn to Matthew 7:1-2 (Judge not, that ye be judged---) to defend their error. They say that it is sinful for others to judge them. The same Bible says "Believe not every spirit, but try (JUDGE) the spirits whether they are of God; because many false prophets are gone out into the world." (1 John 4:1) Matthew 7:1-2 warns against hypocritical judging and 1 John 4:1 is one of many apostolic commands to judge righteous judgement as explained in John 7:24.

In a saucepan, blend prepared mustard with about 1/4 cup vinegar. Stir in remaining vinegar, sugar and next six ingredients. Heat to boiling. Add vegetables; heat just to boiling. Simmer while quickly packing one clean, hot jar at a time. Fill to within 1/2 inch of top, making sure vinegar solution covers vegetables. Cap each jar immediately. Process five minutes in boiling water bath. Yield: 9 to 10 pints.

Measure one fourth cup cold water, add 1 tablespoon gelatin, and when soft, add to hot squash mixture. Mix thoroughly and cool. When it begins to stiffen, beat three egg whites until stiff, beat in one-fourth cup sugar and fold into squash mixture. Pour into baked pie shell, chill in refrigerator or cold place. Garnish with whipped cream just before serving.

Squash Cheese Souffle 2 cups mashed squash 1/2 cup cream 2 eggs 2 tablespoons butter 1/2 cup grated cheese

Mix the mashed squash with the cream, cheese and seasonings. Add the well-beaten egg yolks. Beat the egg whites until stiff but not dry, and fold them carefully into the squash mixture. Pour into a welloiled baking dish set in a pan of hot water and bake at 350 degrees F. for 40 minutes, or until a knife inserted in the product comes out clean. Serve at once. The amount of cream will need to be varied according to the dryness or moistness of the squash used.

Baked Squash Goulash 4 slices bacon 1 large onion 1 mediumsize summer squash or 1 pound of winter squash 1 green pepper 2 cups tomatoes, fresh or canned salt, pepper and sugar

Cut the bacon in small pieces and fry it. Add the onion sliced thin. Cook the onion until yellow. Add the squash cut in thin crosswise slices. Add the pepper, cut in small pieces, the tomato, salt and pepper, and sugar. Mix thoroughly and turn the mixture into a casserole.

Cover and bake it in a moderate oven for one hour.

Summer Squash Bake 1 quart summer squash, sliced 1/2 cup water 1 teaspoon salt 1 cup medium white sauce 1/2 cup breadcrumbs 1/2 cup process cheddar cheese, shredded 2 eggs beaten

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Grease a 1 1/2-quart casserole. Cook squash in boiling, salted water for five minutes. Drain. Mix squash with white sauce with white sauce and eggs. Place mixture in casserole, sprinkle cheese and crumbs over the top. Bake for 25 minutes. Provides six servings, 2/3 cup each

Medium White Sauce 2 tablespoons butter or other fat 1/4 teaspoon salt 2 tablespoons flour 1 cup milk

Blend flour with fat, then combine with remaining liquid, stirring constantly over low heat until thickened.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—If your yard is the only one on the block that doesn't look like a well-tended park, there may be a variety of reasons. You may be too busy to spend time on lawn and garden care, you may be physically incapable of such strenuous work, you may not have the proper tools and equipment, or you may just not have the inclination.

For whatever reason, many consumers who want the pleasure of having a well-cared-for yard for spring and summer outdoor living turn to professional yard care services.

Established, reputable, professional yard care services can be a boon to the homeowner, our Consumer Protection Division attorneys have learned. In many cases, they do a better job than the novice who lacks specialized equipment and who may not know how to select and apply fertilizers and pesticides properly.

Consumers who are considering such services can choose those which specialize in jobs such as lawn maintenance, tree trimming, lawn and tree spraying, and landscaping, among others. There are total-care services and those which offer either year-round maintenance or service only during warm weather months, too.

However, our Consumer Protection attorneys caution homeowners considering such services to investigate carefully before committing themselves to a contract for work, or for advance payment for a job.

As with all such contract work, it's important to decide what you want done, then get at least three estimates from different firms or individuals. You should get recommendations from friends or relatives who have used such services, or

check with the Better Business Bureau to determine the reputation of a firm you don't know.

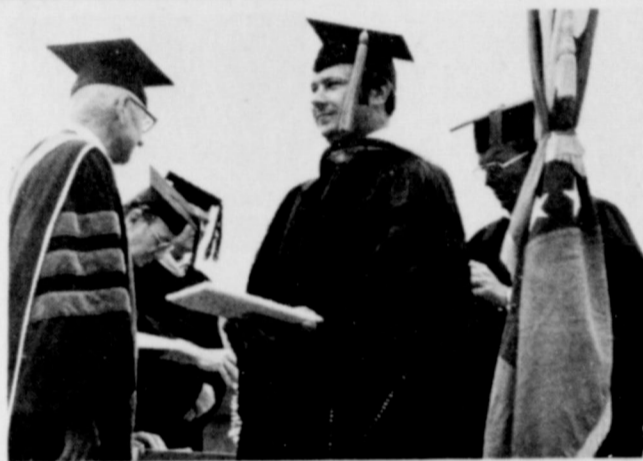
If you're entering into a contract for a continuing service, be sure it spells out precisely what work is to be performed for what length of time and at what total cost per month or year. If you are contracting for a one-time-only major job, be sure that the dates work is to be started and completed are included.

Our attorneys urge consumers to exercise care when dealing with itinerant yard care specialists who solicit business door-to-door. Often this may only be a student who wants to earn some spending money for the summer by mowing lawns.

But if the solicitor is seeking large yard care jobs that involve considerable sums of money, be cautious. You are protected by the Texas Home Solicitation Act, which allows you to cancel any contract for \$25 or more by midnight of the third business day. If you're dealing with an unscrupulous itinerant, though, your check may be cashed and spent the same day of the transaction, and the yard care "specialist" may be in the next town by the time you decide you didn't get your money's worth.

If you do deal with an itinerant, never pay for a job in advance, and always inspect the completed work carefully before paying for it.

Farm Credit System Loans Top \$30 Billion

Farm Credit System loans in 1975 soared 10 percent from those a year earlier to a record total of \$30.2 billion. Loans were made to farmers and farmer cooperatives.

On December 31, 1975, loans outstanding stood at \$31.7 billion, another record and an increase of 15.8 percent from \$27.4 billion a year earlier. The system's net worth—primarily members' capital stock and accumulated savings—totaled \$4.1 billion at year end, up 13.9 percent from \$3.6 billion a year earlier.

Despite the 10-percent increase in loans, farm borrowing slackened in 1975, compared with the pace in recent years. Loans in 1974 increased 16.5 percent, and 1973 loans leaped 40 percent from 1972 borrowings. Farm Credit Administration Governor W. M. Harding attributed the moderating loan demand primarily to farmers' use of funds they accumulated in the good income years of 1973 and 1974. In addition, he said inflation in land and production input prices lessened, the number of land sales was down and farmers were generally more conservative than in the immediately preceding years when held-down desires for machinery and supplies were gratified by heavy spending.

The three lending units of the Farm Credit System are Federal Land Banks, which make long-term loans through local Federal Land Bank associations; Federal Intermediate Credit Banks (FICB), which provide loan funds for local production credit associations, the System's short- and intermediate-term lenders; and the Banks for Cooperatives, which finance farmer cooperatives. The Farm Credit Administration is a Federal agency that supervises the member-owned System.

Of the System's three lending units, Production Credit Associations showed the largest increases last year. Loans through PCA's totaled \$16.1 billion, a rise of 11.6 percent from 1974 figures. Loans outstanding at year end stood at \$10.8 billion, up 13.4 percent. The number of members having loans outstanding at year end was 331,635, a 1.8 percent increase from the year earlier. In addition to

PCA lending, Federal Intermediate Credit Banks made \$765 million in loans to other financial institutions during the year, a decrease of 12.9 percent from 1974.

Federal Land Banks made \$4.4 billion in loans last year and at year end had \$16.6 billion in loans outstanding. These represent an increase of 4 percent in loans made and 19.5 percent in loans outstanding from year earlier figures. The number of Land Bank members with loans outstanding rose 4.5 percent to 467,039.

Banks for Cooperatives made loans totaling \$8.9 billion during the year, up 6.4 percent from 1974. At year end, the Banks had \$4.0 billion in loans outstanding, up 11.3 percent. The Banks served 3,171 farmer cooperatives during the year, up 4.7 percent from 1974.

The System obtains its loan funds primarily through sales of its bonds and notes in the private money and capital markets. Last year's sales totaled \$ 21.0 billion and included \$4.8 billion by the FICB's, and \$5.9 billion by the Banks for Cooperatives, for a cumulative increase of 2.3 percent. The System also issued \$3.8 billion in discount notes.

Included in the overall figures are rural home loans, farm-related business loans and loans to open seas fishermen, programs which have been authorized only since 1971. Loans made last year for non-farm rural homes totaled \$194 million and at yearend \$558 million in such loans was outstanding to 25,577 borrowers. Loans to fishermen in 1975 totaled \$37.4 million, and farm-related businesses received \$21.7 million in loans. Land Banks made most of the rural home loans while PCA's accounted for all of the loans to fishermen and nearly all of the farm-related business loans.

Existing Housing Assistance Program Becomes Available

John Gildersleeve, Housing Coordinator for South Plains Regional Housing Authority, announced that the South Plains Regional Housing Authority has a new rental housing program called Section 8 Housing Assistance Payments Program (provided by the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974) available to low-income and lower-income families and elderly, disabled, handicapped and displaced citizens. The Housing Authority is responsible for providing financial and other assistance in securing decent, safe, and sanitary housing. The amount of family financial assistance is based on the annual family income. Example: A family would pay no less than 15 percent not more than 25 percent of adjusted gross family income.

To become certified in the Section 8 Program, an applicant must first make an application with the South Plains Regional Housing Authority to become certified for a period of 60 days during which time they can participate in the program. Applicants on other public housing waiting lists must apply to be Certified in this program. An applicant with this program will not jeopardize his position on any other waiting list.

This program places the choice of housing in the hands of the Certified Family and encourages the family to shop wisely, investigating a wide range of housing opportunities. The Certified Family negotiates directly with the landlord to secure rental accommodations suited to their needs, this unit may be already occupied by the Family. The Family negotiates for the best Lease terms, for not less than one year, that meet rental requirements. The Authority is responsible for informing both the Certified Family and the Landlord as to what standards are required.

The Section 8 Housing Assistance Payment, added to the payment which the low-income family can afford to pay, will assure a participating Owner of an approved unit a fair market rent. The Fair Market rent (maximum rent level) for each size unit is established by HUD. The Certified Family cannot enter into a Lease in which the gross rent, INCLUDING UTILITIES, exceeds the fair market rent. This program introduces a shopping incentive to credit to reward families who secure acceptable housing below the Fair Market Rent. Fair Market Rents are: 0 Br. - \$89, 1 Br. - \$103, 2 Br. - \$122, 3 Br. - \$141, and 4 Br. - \$155.

A Certified Family can, by abiding by the rules of the program, participate in the program as long as funds are available and the family remains eligible. Since family housing needs change, in family size, job location and the like, the program is designed to facilitate moves by the family without loss of assistance as long as the family terminates its existing Lease within the provisions and finds alternative housing within the jurisdiction of the Authority.

The Landlord (Owner) in the Section 8 Program is to provide decent, safe and sanitary housing to tenants at a reasonable rent. His dwelling unit must pass the housing quality standards and must be maintained up to those standards as long as the Owner receives assistance payments. South Plains Regional Housing Authority will also assist unit to assure compliance with standards.

The Landlord Contract begins after the Authority approves the Tenant/Landlord lease terms and determines that the dwelling unit complies with program standards.

Applications will be accepted beginning June 1976, at the Lynn County Community Action Center, 1404 South Third, Tahoka, Texas. No application will be accepted until June 1976. Red Cross Donations Are Needed

Early reports from Red Cross field directors and disaster staff in Truk Islands and Guam indicate at least 1,000 people homeless, ten dead and most of Guam 110,000 population are affected by the storm. First estimates from Red Cross staff, 20 of who arrived in Guam over the weekend to assist the Guam chapter in relief operations, say up to 85 percent of residential commercial and agricultural buildings on the island were destroyed or damaged. The Egg And You: Another Look

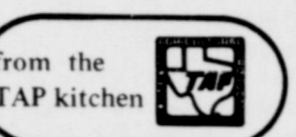
AUSTIN-Chicken Little couldn't have put it any better - the sky has fallen down on the egg industry in recent years.

Consumers, frightened by early test results showing that eggs and other foods with a high cholesterol content increased the danger of heart attacks, stopped buying eggs.

But it may be time to take a second look at eggs. Current research shows that dietary cholesterol does not have as much effect on cholesterol levels in blood as had been believed. Many medical experts now believe that eating moderate amounts of eggs will not appreciably affect the level of cholesterol in the blood.

"Even at today's prices, eggs are still one of the best nutritional buys," says the Texas Department of Agriculture home economist. She points out eggs are one of the few foods that can support life entirely on their own.

A serving of two eggs contains approximately 14 grams of the highest-quality protein, only 176 calories, 12 grams of fat, 1 gram of carbohydrate and at least 13 minerals and vitamins.



EASY FRESH PEACH COBBLER

- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 2 cups peeled, sliced peaches
- 1/3 cup sugar
- 1/2 tsp. cinnamon

Combine butter, 1/2 cup sugar, milk, flour and baking powder in a 2-quart baking dish. Put peaches on top. Combine 1/3 cup sugar and cinnamon. Sprinkle on top of peaches. Bake in preheated 375-degree oven for 40-45 minutes. Best when served warm. Yield: 4-5 servings.

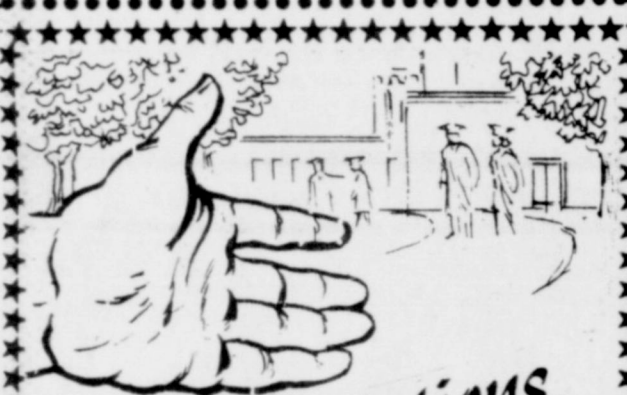

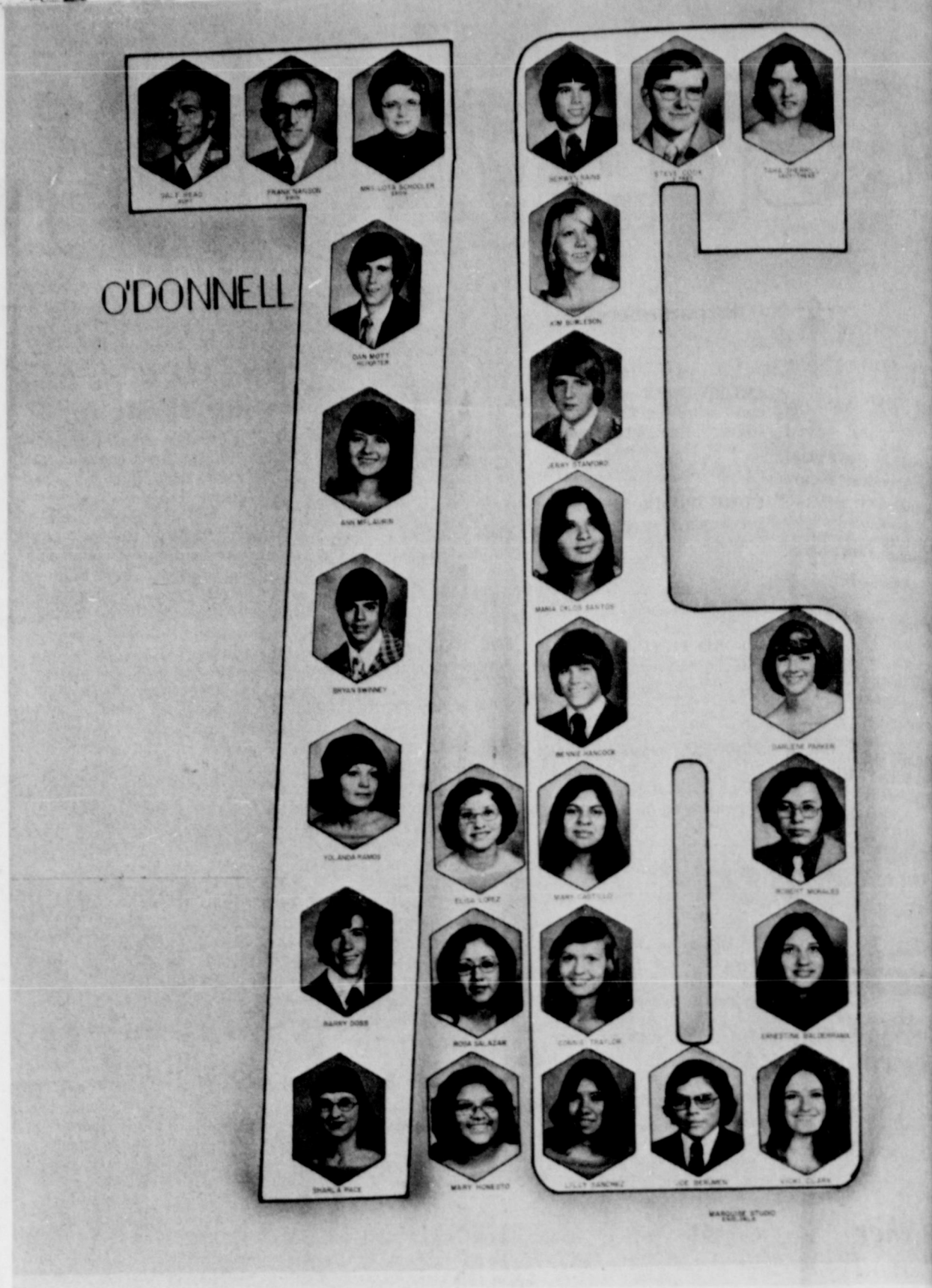
Brodren County Celebration
