Lynn County's four cities all show population increases over Census totals 10 years ago, but the total county population is showing a 10.5 per cent decline. Those were findings in preliminary Census figures released this week, subject to change and also subject to controversy, at least as far as the City of Tahoka is concerned. Tahoka's population is

given as 3,030, or a 2.5 per cent gain over the 2,956 counted in 1970. City officials believe the total should be at least 200 more than that, and plan to protest the preliminary findings.

Figures released by the Census Bureau indicate that there are 8,151 persons in Lynn County, compared to 9,107 in the 1970 Census. The apparent paradox in city and county figures suggests that more Lynn County residents have moved from the county into the towns.

The Lynn County commissioners court has not met since the figures were announced, and County Judge Melvin Burks was out of town this week, so there was no indication as to whether the county would dispute the bureau's findings regarding the total Lynn population.

The Census Bureau broke its report down into its own divisions within the county, and the "O'Donnell division" showed a decrease in population of more than 18

per cent, although the City of O'Donnell is indicated to have a very small growth of 7 persons.

Wilson is shown as having the greatest percentage of increase in the decade, with 541 persons compared to 433 in 1970, a gain of nearly 25 percent. New Home is listed with 263 persons, 11 more than in 1970. Tahoka shows 74 more persons. Tahoka Mayor Mel Leslie said Wednesday morning that the city would contest the preliminary figure for the city.

"I think they missed some people...and I don't think we have 107 vacant housing units in Tahoka, either, as the Census report indicates." He noted that counting residential water meters and using a formula which has proved accurate in

the past indicates the city has at least 200 more persons than counted.

Other observers in the city pointed out that the Census count "was messed up from the start," noting that a large quantity of forms was sent down to the Tahoka Post Office with street addresses but no names on them. Tahoka does not have house-to-house postal service, so those forms had to be sent back to the Census Bureau. Whether workers managed to contact everyone in all the houses remained a question in the minds of some.

Leslie's comment about housing units referred to a table supplied by the Census agency showing Tahoka to have 1,237 housing units, with 107 of these vacant.

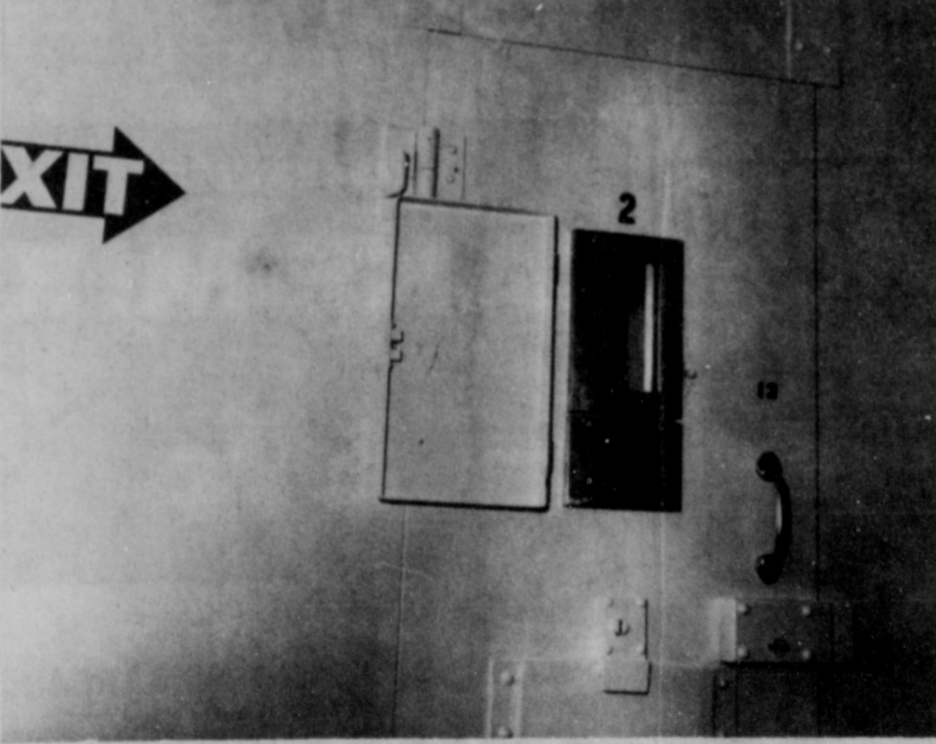

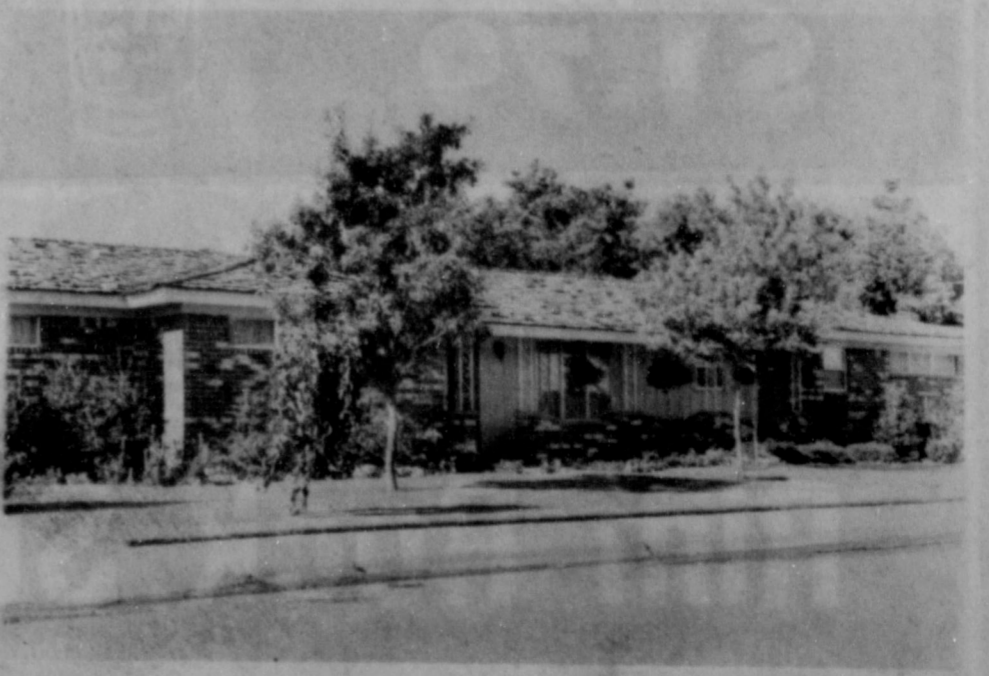
### Football Physicals

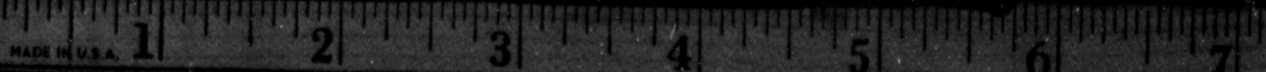

### Jimmie Williamson

Burial was in Green Memorial Cemetery in Wilson.

Mrs. Williamson died at 9 p.m. Monday in Mercy Hospital in Slaton after a lengthy illness.

She was born in Thorndale and had been a resident of the Wilson community for 54 years.

Survivors include two sons, Harold of Wilson and George

of Pearce, Ariz.; two daughters, Eva Pearl Williamson of Wilson and Mrs. Ralph Milliken of Wofforth; a sister, Mrs. E.D. Lanmon of Elgin; five grandchildren; and ten great-grandchildren.

### Mrs. "Rob" Thomas

Mrs. W.O. (Robbie Laura Chism) Thomas, 80 of Lubbock, a pioneer of Lynn County, died in a Lubbock nursing home last Thursday noon following an illness.

Funeral services were held Friday at 2 p.m. in Sanders Memorial Chapel in Lubbock with Dr. Carlton Thompson of St. Luke's United Methodist Church officiating.

Mrs. Thomas was born in Paris, Texas, and came to Lynn County in 1905 with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert C. Chism, who ranched south of Tahoka. The Chisms started their farmer-stockman operation from a half dugout until a home could be built. Mrs. Chism died in 1911 and Mr. Chism in about 1930.

"Rob" attended school in Tahoka. She was married on October 19, 1917, in Goodnight to W.O. Thomas, partner in Thomas Bros. Drug Store with his brother, C.A. Thomas. The brothers sold the store March 1, 1936, to their nephew, Wynne Collier, and retired. W.O. Thomas died in 1956.

Mrs. Thomas was a member of Tahoka Methodist Church, and for many years was active in church affairs. She was the first Worthy Matron of Tahoka Order of the Eastern Star.

According to a niece, Mrs. Thomas was a niece of the famed John Simpson Chism, Texas frontiersman and cattle rancher near Lincoln, N.M., who was considered the largest cattle owner in the country at the time of his death in 1884.

A few years ago, Mrs. Thomas moved to Lubbock to be close to a great-niece, Camille Hill.

Mr. and Mrs. Thomas had no children. Alene McCubbin of Washington, D.C., Tony Clark of Amarillo and Doris McCubbin of Oklahoma City are nieces. Mrs. Coye Collier of Tahoka is a niece by marriage.

Callie Massey was hostess to the Past Noble Grand Club on Thursday night with 6 members present. Study, fellowship, and a meal was enjoyed.

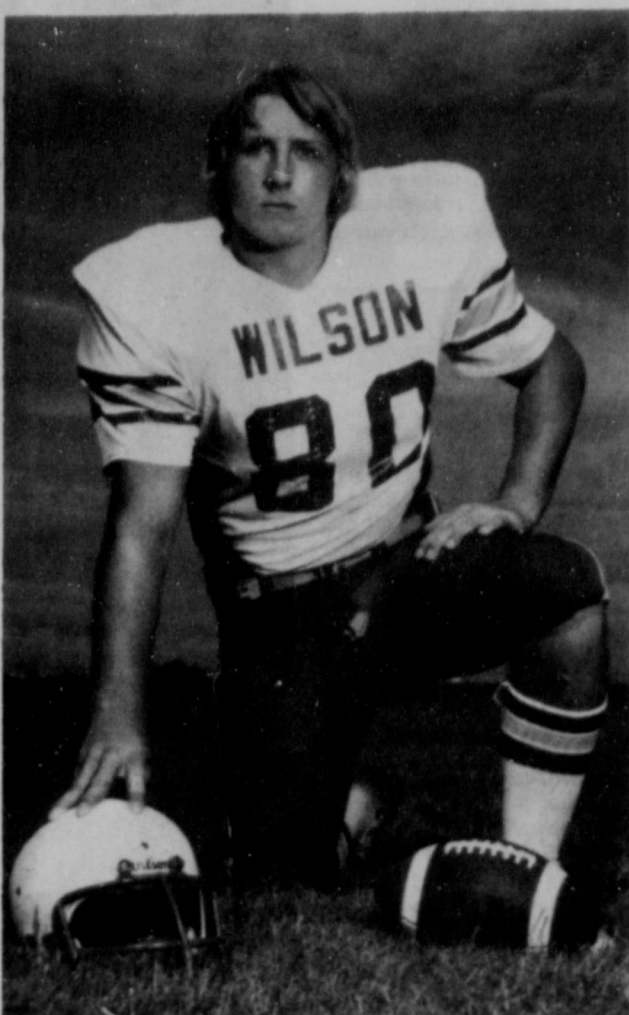

### INSUR-MATION

How can I give a gift of a life insurance policy to my children without losing my annual gift tax exclusion?

You lose your \$3,000 annual gift tax exclusion when a policy is written where restrictions are placed upon the donee's right to receive benefits or to exercise ownership... making the policy a gift of future interest. If a parent disposed of all rights to a policy by making it a gift to his three children: Minnie, Mary and Joe (all adults), "Share and Share Alike... Survivors or Survivor," he has given a gift of future interest. Joe can't borrow on his one-third of the policy without the written consent of his sisters... restricting his right to receive benefits and to exercise ownership. This problem can be avoided by writing three equal and separate policies... one for each of the children. An existing policy can be re-written, using the original date of issue... applying the same solution.

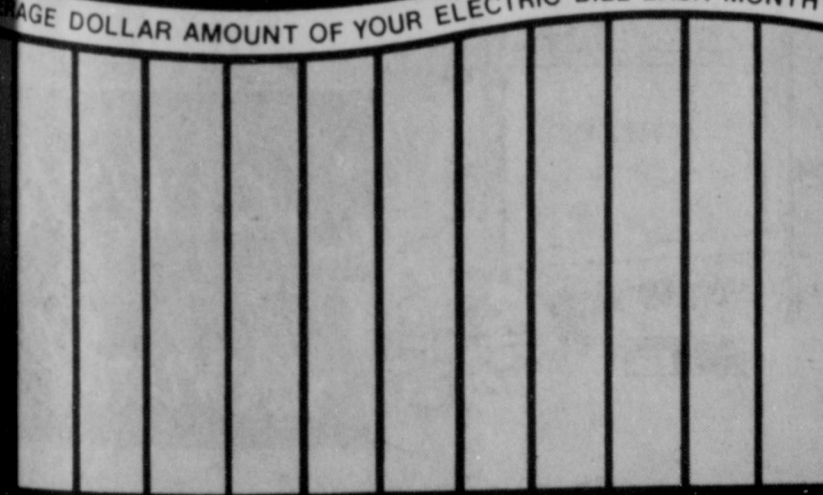

**Museum Visitors Pass 2,000**

Visitors signing the registration book passed the 2,000 mark Tuesday of last week, and through Sunday the total had reached 2,036, according to records kept by Mrs. Annie Bell Stice. She estimates that fully one-fourth of the visitors fail to register, and at least one-third of all visitors are from out of Lynn County. The 2,000th visitor registering was Katy Barone, 6302 Elgin, No. 243, Lubbock. In addition to local visitors signing the register, there have been visitors from 30 states of this nation and from seven foreign countries. Visitors have come from Canada, Colombia, England and Wales, Mexico, Nigeria, Union of South Africa, and West Germany. From the United States, California surprisingly leads the list with the most visitors, but followed closely by New Mexico and Oklahoma. Others have been from Maine and Florida to Washington, Oregon and Alaska. Approximately 200 visitors registering have come from out of the state of Texas. **Bill Sewell Is Speaker for Rotary Club**

Sewell, a retired banker, began his banking career in the early 1930's in Tahoka under the late Walter Slaton of First National Bank, was married here to Miss Mary

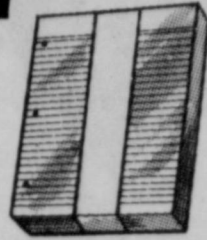

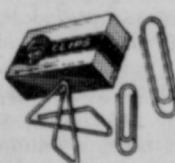

Keynote speaker was John T. Montford, Lubbock County Criminal District Attorney.

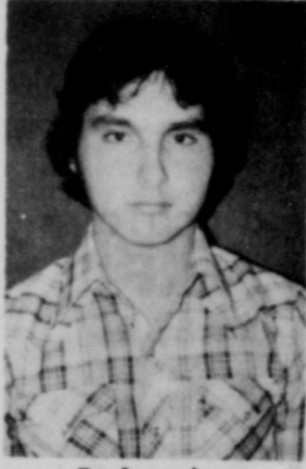

To LVN'S**

**A VISIT WITH YOUR  
County Agent**

By STANLEY YOUNG

Trees, shrubs and vines that were transplanted in recent months need a little extra care to make it through the long, hot summer.

The most critical problem for newly moved plants is providing adequate moisture. Wind damage and excess fertilization also take their toll on transplanted trees, shrubs and vines.

Mulches can help conserve soil moisture and are effective in controlling weeds. Apply the mulch several inches deep over the new plant's roots. Pine needles or bark, oak leaves, bagasse, gin trash or grass clippings can be used as mulch.

Some organic mulches decompose rapidly, taking nitrogen from the soil in the process and causing plants to yellow. This may be corrected by adding small doses of nitrogen fertilizer.

Young cautions against adding fertilizer at planting time. Only small amounts, if any, should be applied during the first growing season. Over fertilization is one of the major causes of plants dying the first season.

Homeowners are advised to protect new plants against wind damage. This is especially true for trees or shrubs that are several feet tall. High winds can break limbs and damage newly forming roots as well as dehydrate the plant. So plants should be pruned or staked for support.

Homeowners also need to remember their plants before leaving for summer vacations by arranging for someone to water them regularly.
