CATTLE RAISERS' ASSOCIATION OF TEXAS.

Twenty Years of the Association's History From Its First Organization to the Present Time.

IMPORTANT ACTION OF EACH MEETING GIVEN IN FULL.

Each Year it Has Grown in Numbers and Wealth—Has Become a Power to Encourage and Protect Its Membership and to Promote Their Interests.

GREAT DETECTIVE AND PROTECTIVE WORK.

The Largest and Wealthiest Live Stock Organization Ever Known Has Always Acted Harmoniously in Developing and Protecting the Industry it Represents and Has Been of Incalculable Value to Each of Its Members—Its Influence on the Cattle Industry of the Southwest—Brief Biographies of Officers and Prominent Members.

The cattlemen of Northwest Texas owned but little if any land twenty-one years ago; neither were there any barbed-wire fences or mammoth pastures to control the herds or range of the ranchman. Those were the good old times of free grass that have passed into history, never to again be enjoyed by the ranchmen of Texas. A cattleman's range was then bounded by imaginary lines but in most instances respected by his neighbors. After a few years, however, as the country filled up and the range stocked to its full capacity, considerable confusion and occasional misunderstandings, that sometimes engendered ill feeling, was caused by the inability of those interested to control the round-ups or prevent their herds from being unnecessarily worked, jammed and otherwise abused by neighboring ranchmen in their efforts to collect together their scattering cattle.

It was with the hope of being able to control these evils and adopt a system of round-ups by which the ranchmen all over the country would be able to again possess themselves of their scattering cattle without doing injustice to

Col. Carter was one of the pioneer ranchmen of Northwest Texas, he having settled on the Brazos river in Palo Pinto county some time in the '50's, where he continued to make his home until the time of his death, in July, 1888. He was one of the prime movers in the organization of the Cattle Raisers' association and was elected its first president February, 1877, which position he continued to fill with the exception of one term, during the remainder of his life. He was one of God's noblemen and lived and died loved and respected by all who knew him.

anyone, that brought about the organization of the Cattle Raisers' association of Northwest Texas.

Early in 1877 a consultation was held by such prominent cattlemen of that day and time as Col. C. L. Carter, now deceased; Col. J. N. Simpson, now of Dallas; J. C. Loving, the present secretary of the association; Col. C. C. Slaughter, now of Dallas; S. B. Burnett, of Fort Worth, and others equally prominent, which resulted in publishing a call asking for a convention of all the cattlemen of the northwestern part of the state, at Graham, on the 15th and 16th of February, 1877.

In this connection it may here be

stated that the Panhandle of Texas and that part of the state lying west of what is now known as "the Abilene country," was then practically an unexplored district, consequently, the town of Graham, Young county, was then considered about the center of the populated part of Northwest Texas. Texas could not then boast of her cattle kings who number their cattle from 25,000 to 100,000 head, the largest herds at that time located in the Territory; then known as Northwest Texas, probably did not exceed in but few, if any instances, over 5000 head, 10,000 probably being the outside limit.

The first meeting of the stockmen, which resulted in the permanent organization of this association, was largely attended by the prominent and best class of stockmen and was considered a rousing success.

The meeting was called to order by Col. J. N. Simpson, on whose motion Col. C. L. Carter of Palo Pinto county, was made chairman, and J. C. Loving was elected secretary.

A committee of seventeen, consisting of Joseph Graham, Sam Glasgow, Roland Johnson and A. B. Medlin, all of Young county; S. B. Burnett of Fort Worth, J. T. Webb of Archer county, George Wright of Young, J. N. Simpson of Parker, J. C. Loving of Jack, H. G. Bedford of Archer, Tom Merrill of Haskell, Jno. D. Smith of Shackelford, W. B. Slaughter of Palo Pinto, R. E. Mabry of Young, D. O. Gardner of Shackelford, and J. C. Lindsay of Jack, was appointed to draft resolutions expressive of the objects and purposes of the convention.

The next day this committee reported as follows: "To the Stock Raisers of Northwest Texas in convention assembled: Your committee appointed for drafting resolutions expressive of the objects and purposes of this convention, would respectfully submit the following report, viz: That this association shall be known as the Stock Raisers' association of Northwest Texas; the officers of the association shall consist of a president, vice president, secretary and assistant secretary, who shall hold their offices for one year.

The following resolutions are submitted for the government of the association:

1. The members of this association shall work together for the good and common interest of the stock raisers of Northwest Texas and do all in their power or the promotion of the stock interest.

2. That the territory represented at this convention be divided into districts and that men be allotted to each district whose duty it shall be to gather all cattle in their districts and notify the owners of same and hold them until the owners call for them."

In compliance with the second resolution, this committee then proceeded to divide the territory covered by the association into six different districts, after which the report continued as follows:

"Resolved, that the stock raisers of each district shall appoint their own time to commence to gather the stock in their districts, provided, however, that no cattle shall be put under herd until grass is sufficient to sustain the stock and improve their condition.

"That all stockmen are requested not to drive, gather or in any way interfere with the cattle in any district except their own, until they are rounded up by the persons allotted for that purpose.

"That representatives from each district shall be chosen by the stock rais-

ers to meet at Graham on the 10th of April, 1877, for the purpose of appointing a time and place in each district, when and where the stockmen may meet and get their cattle.

"That all stockmen not embraced in the foregoing districts be, and they are respectfully requested to co-operate with the members of this association by gathering all cattle in their respective ranges and giving notice of same and that they be requested to

Col. C. C. Slaughter was one of the pioneers of Palo Pinto, he having located in that county while quite a young man some time about the year 1855. Col. Slaughter has resided in the city of Dallas for quite a number of years. He owns one of the largest and best bred herds in the state, located on the Plains in the Southern Panhandle country and is also largely interested in cattle in Kansas, Nebraska, Wyoming and Montana. He has not only been a successful cattleman but a useful, big hearted citizen, a man who commands the respect, confidence and esteem of all who know him. He was one of the originators and prime movers of the organization of the Cattle Raisers' association, has served almost continuously on the executive committee and was president of the association from March, 1885, to March, 1886, declining re-election, preferring to yield the gavel to his old friend, Col. C. L. Carter.

send delegates to the meeting to be held at Graham on the 10th of April next.

"Resolved, that before any person shall drive a herd from his range, he is requested to give notice to three of the nearest stockmen in the district and that said stockmen so notified be authorized to examine said herd and if they find any animal in the herd belonging to any member of this association or any other stock raiser, they shall be authorized to cut out and hold same, giving the owner thereof notice at the earliest practical moment.

"Resolved, that all stockmen not already members of this association, be requested to send their names to the secretary and become members of the association and co-operate with it in its work."

The above report of the committee of seventeen seems to have formed the foundation, or rather the basis, for the work of the association.

Up to that time the stock business of Texas had not been represented by a newspaper published in its special interest. It seems, however, that even at that early date the cattlemen realized

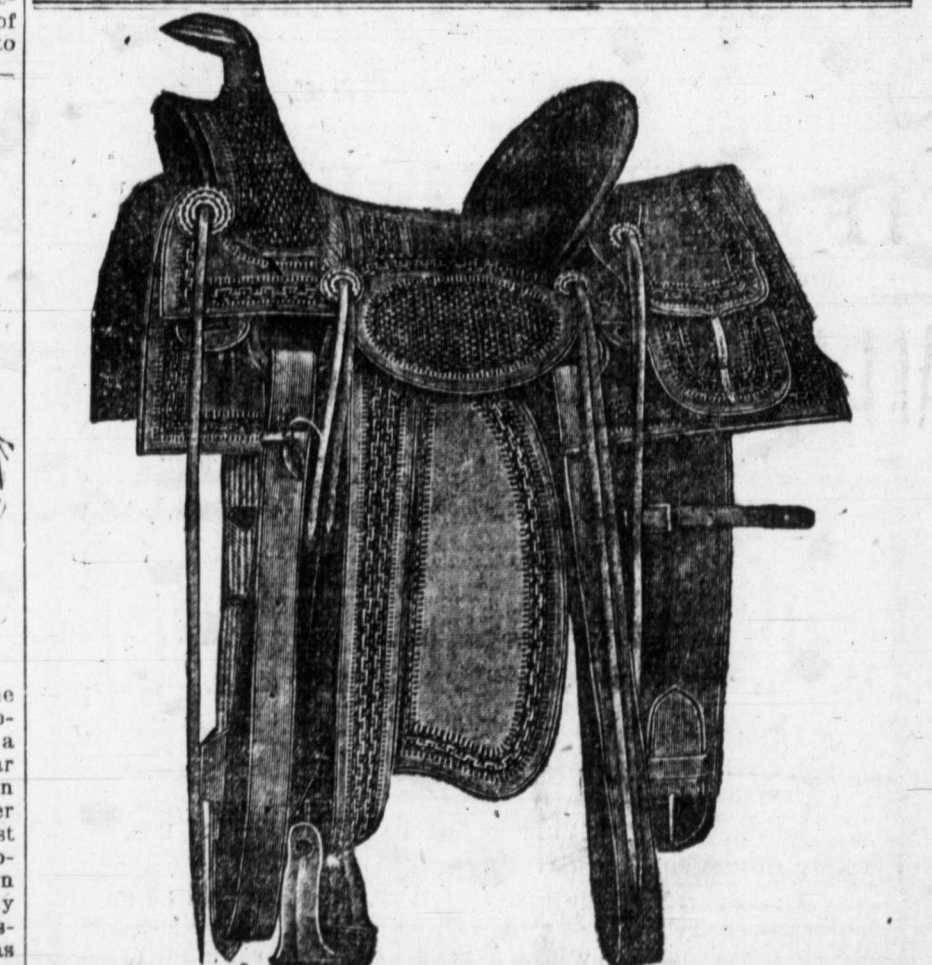

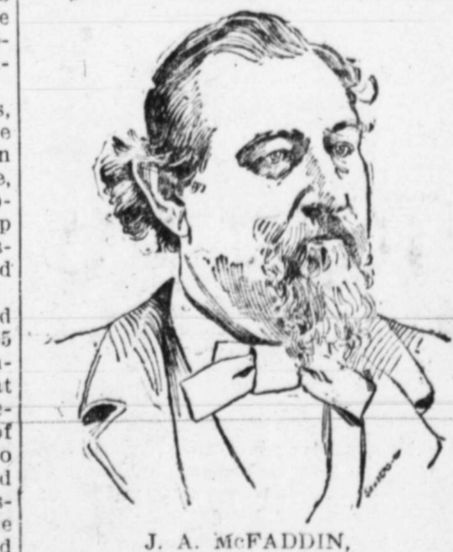

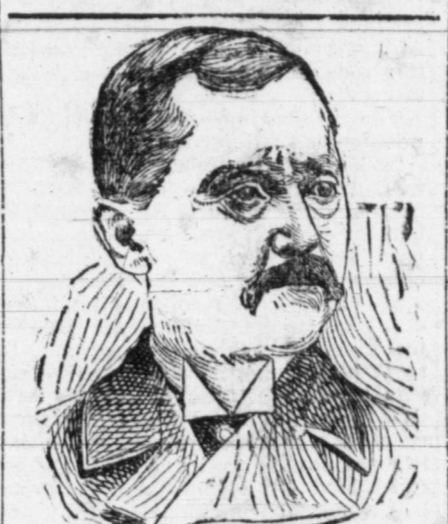
