It is well for us to bear in mind the effect the monopolies have on the prices the farmer receives for his crop and the price he pays for what he buys and how these results are brought about. In 1929 over 49 per cent of the assets of non-financial corporations were controlled by 200 huge enterprises--railroads, utilities, manufacturing enterprises, distributing enterprises, and a few enterprises supplying services. By 1933 this concentration had markedly increased, something like 56 per cent of the assets of non-financial corporations being in the control of 200 companies. While these figures only apply to that proportion of the national economy that is carried on by corporations, the big corporations constitute a very important element in our national economy. Somewhere in the vicinity of a quarter of the wealth of the country must be in their hands.
