Funeral services for Rev. C. H. Edinger, 56, of the German Baptist church at Hurnville, were held at his home in Henrietta Sunday afternoon at 2 P. Gossen of Crawford, Rev. D. Kuchenbacher, and Rev. A. Becher of Dallas, Rev. C. C. Laborne of Denton, and Rev. E. L. Moody of Henrietta. Rev. Edinger died in a Wichita Falls hospital about 10 P. M. Friday after a short illness.

## New York City Well Commenced Drilling

J. E. Farrell and associates of Ft. Worth have erected a derrick and spudded in about 5 o'clock Monday afternoon in the northeast corner of section 12 T. & N. O. Railway survey, about four miles southeast of Henrietta near the Ft. Worth Highway, on a 3,000 acre assembled block. The well is located on a seismograph shot high, formerly leased by the Superior Oil Company of Houston, who released the block to H. M. Horton of Indianapolis, Ind., who leased to J. E. Farrell.

Frank Gillespie of Ft. Worth is manager of the drilling company, and has about twenty men employed. He has four shifts of six men each, beside those who do odd jobs. They are drilling under a 5,000 foot contract. The well is known as the Malone No. 1. They have a Deisel Electric Motor, thought to be the only one in the county and a fine rig. They will be closely watched by the Oil fraternity.

Mr. Milton Calvin Johnson, 78, pioneer of Jolly in Clay county died at his home there last Friday morning.

He was the son of Caleb and Maranda Johnson and was born in Yazoo, Mississippi, January 6, 1861. While still a small boy, he came to Texas with his parents.

He spent his boyhood days in Rusk County, Texas, and after he was grown moved to Rockwall and then later to Clay County, where he lived until his death.

He was saved and joined the Baptist church at the age of 23 and was a member of the Jolly Baptist church at the time of his death.

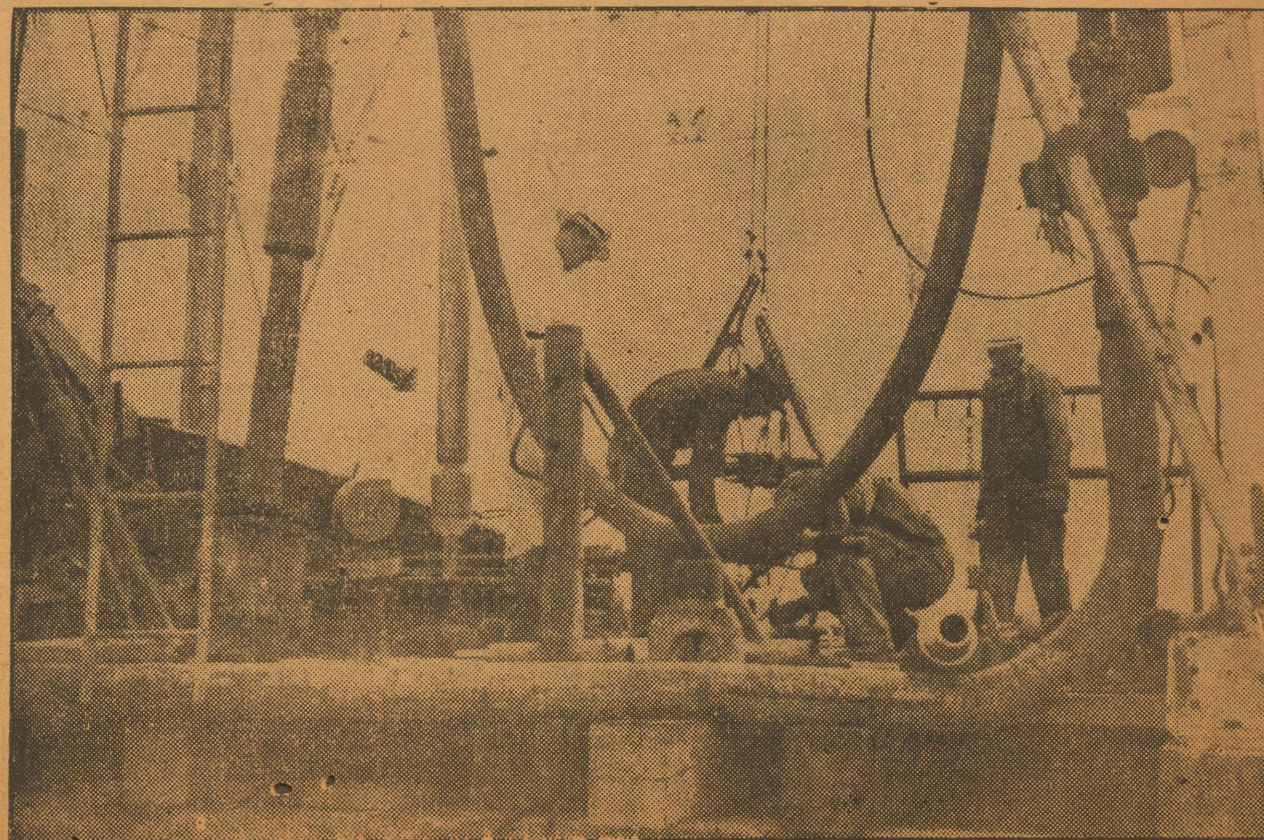

The drillers work in 4 six-hour shifts, working day and night to complete the well to its required depth, 5000 feet. It can be seen from the Fort Worth Highway. **Rooted Cuttings**  
Home Demonstration Woman, 4-H Club Girls rooted 129 cuttings in 1938-cuttings of prunings, and so on that by now are making their contribution to the home surroundings of rural

The success of the work in previous years has resulted in a gradual increase in the number of cuttings, and Sadie Hatfield, specialist in landscape gardening with Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, has several suggestions for helping the cuttings survive the light and heat of the summer. A mulch of partially decayed leaves or straw, applied to the top of the soil, will also hold moisture. Miss Hatfield warns that fresh straw should not be used, as this reflects the sun's heat. If such materials are lacking, the top of the ground should be kept very loose so as to decrease the loss of moisture.

Almost all successful candidates in 1938, from Justice of the Peace to Congressman, advocated the payment of Old Age Pensions to all men and women over 65 years of age. This was the major issue of the campaign.

So when the 46th session of the Texas Legislature convened and heard the new Governor make his inaugural speech, the aged fathers and mothers of Texas breathed a sigh of relief, feeling reasonably certain that the pledges on the stump would be properly and promptly met and that bread and beans would be a welcome change from the hardships of the past. Out of the 150 members of the house, 72 were brand new legislators. They had, in the most cases, defeated former members who had done nothing for the old folk.

Now this whole episode reminds me of a story about Bishop Warren A. Candler. The great Methodist prelate was preaching one day to an annual conference. His text called for a reading of the chapter on Anninias and Sapphira. The Bishop said: "God did not strike down Annanias and Sapphira for lying. God does not strike down people for lying. If he did, then where would I be?" The congregation laughed loudly, thinking that the venerable Bishop was referring to himself when he asked, "If God struck people down for lying where would I be?" Immediately after the question he answered it. "If God struck down people for lying, where would I be? I'll tell you where I'd be. I'll tell you where I'd be. I'd be speaking to a bunch of corpses."

The State of Texas is paying out something like \$112,000 annually in rentals in Austin for bureaus and boards created in recent years. Some new buildings have been built to take care of the needs, and these owners will receive enough money in four or five years to defray the cost of same.

Congress has approved a measure which it was said, would give Southern carriers "freedom to reduce freight rates." Another step in the west-south campaign for lower transportation charges, this provision would authorize railroads, water carriers and truck lines to reduce rates so long as a compensatory return was maintained. The plan was written into the Wheeler-Truman transportation bill as an amendment.

## JUST CRUISING

(By the Captain)

Congressman Martin Dies used plain old every day English in his address to the high school graduates of Fort Worth, assembled in an early morning gathering in T. C. stadium, at which time the thousands of Shriners attending the three-day state conclave and which order sponsored the coming of the nationally known congressional investigator, were also assembled along with many thousands of visitors from the city and other points heard him deliver their class message. Mr. Dies is chairman of the House Investigating committee which is looking into the "isms" now infesting much of this great country. He told those young graduates that they were just now ready to get out and take their stand for their country, and urged them, in all else, to not let our country be entangled in the workings of the foreign and said it is up to you to save America for America. His address, which was delivered at 7 o'clock Sunday morning, was broadcast over a national hookup and heard from coast to coast.

W. Lee O'Daniel "took the floor" Sunday morning to lambast the stalwarts of the House who thus far, prevented a sales tax from being submitted to the people in the form of a constitutional amendment for the purpose of raising money with which to pay pensions. The governor seems determined to have a sales tax as a method of raising these funds, and that too in the form of an amendment, and once it is ever put in the constitution, it will never be removed. An amendment to the constitution is about the hardest thing in the world to ever overcome, and this fact is best known to those who are seeking to have the sales tax submitted, for in this method they will be securing a top limit to all future natural resources taxes. This one feature is what is making those few representatives who have kept this tax off the backs of even the old age pensioners themselves from becoming the law fight so earnestly against this method of securing the funds. In

stead the House has submitted what they term the omnibus bill, and it is now before the senate for consideration. What our old-age pensioners and even our teachers should remember and bear in mind is that if a general sales tax is submitted in the form of a constitutional amendment and voted, they will pay their proportionate part of the taxes out of the small amounts they
