### **Petrolia Plant Makes Great Saftey Record**

Petrolia, Texas, June 21.-Working one million hours without a disabling injury, the men of the Petrolia compresser have established an all time safety record for the Lone Star Gas System. From January 1931 through May 11, 1939, more than eight years, this plant, which boosts gas from Texas Pan-handle and Oklahoma fields to Ft. Worth and Dallas and intervening points, has operated without a single lost time accident.

Through the heavy demands of winter, when the huge compressors pump day and night and chances for accidents could be numerous as well as the slack days of summer when the laxity also must be guarded against, the fifty men at the plant have operated all these years with scarcely anything greater than a scratch.

Lone Star officials, whose sefety experts trained these men and representatives of the U. S. Bureau of Mines who trained every man in 100 per cent safety work, declare this to be one of the most remarkable records ever atttoined in the southwest. It is considered one of the factors in maintaining dependable fuel service of this section.

The men were awarded a bronze trophy and honored at a barbecue supper on the plant grounds Thursday night. 

Dallas, June 20.—Burden of ex-Texas farm families during May by lege Station. county debt adjustment committees it was announced today by Guion Gregg, of the Farm Security Administration.

Mr. Gregg said that of the 12 FSA administrative districts in the state, 24-county area in northwest Texas, including Clay county, had the greatest adjustment. M. B. Oates, Wichita Falls, is district FSA super-

Debts are adjusted by county, committees which act as mediator between debt - distressed farmers and their creditors in working out agreements for extensions of time and reduction in interest and principal. Most of these families whose debts were adjusted here were in danger of losing their land or farming equipment.

"Creditors are not willing to grant these concessions," Mr. Gregg said, "when they realize that by so doing they will be ahead in the long When an orderly repayment schedule that a farmer can meet has been worked out, the FSA will asist him with its loan and advisiory service to farm profitably."

The committee, which is composed of local men, meets regularly. It has no money to lend, but its services are free and confidential. Meeting notices will appear from time to time in this paper.
