## Lightening Kills Scotland Youth

Walter J. Peyson, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. John N. Peysen, of the Scotland community was killed instantly Thursday afternoon, June 22nd, when a flash of lightning struck him while he and a brother-in-law, Joe Simmons, were walking through a field near Scotland.

When the cloud first accumulated the two watched the display of lightning for a while then, deciding that the storm might be bad, started toward the Simmons home. When about a quarter of a mile from the house a crash of lightning seemed to come toward them from every direction, Simmons said, the bolt rendering both unconscious. When he came to his senses, they were lying side by side, and after failing in his attempt to arouse Peyson he rushed for his car and picking the youth up, took him to a doctor in Archer City where he was pronounced dead.

The boys body was not marred by the huge electric shock but there was a slight singed spot on his head and a few burned spots over his body.

Funeral services were held at St. Boniface church at Scotland with Father Martin of Scotland and Father Peter Moley of Wichita Falls officiating. Interment was in the Scotland Cemetery.

Survivors include the parents, six brothers and six sisters.

### "Tax Troubles"

In a study of taxes and tax units, the following facts have been found to exist in this great United States.

In Illinois there are 17,336 different taxing units. In Missouri there are 11,626; in New York state, 11,184; in Texas, 9,184 and in Michigan, 8,905, and on and on in the other states of the Union which are not mentioned. This great duplication of government taxing units means only waste to the Taxpayer.

At the present time it takes approximately 8 per cent of the income of this grand old United States to care for Federal taxes, and in our great Lone Star state it requires approximately 12 per cent of the income to take care of the agglomeration of state and local government. The major part of this even extends to things like mosquito abatement districts.

The number of overlapping taxing units in this country creates an inefficiency on a grand scale, which makes our taxing system a jigsaw puzzle of which local and state affairs are run. We who have studied government and taxation for the past thirty years have seen taxes skyrocketed almost to the moon. Only a short time ago there was no unemployment compared to that of today, no relief employment agencies. Today the federal government is spending billions for Court Houses, parks, sewer disposal plants and for relief commodities. Only a short time ago unemployment was taken care of by local authorities. Charitable organizations took care of the poor and needy. But nevertheless taxes have skyrocketed with all the federal aid which has been poured into our coffers.

Today we pay taxes both state and federal on almost everything—gasoline, liquor, tobacco, death bequests and automobiles, as well as many other things. We are doubly taxed, for both federal and state taxes, in fact there is that hidden tax on almost everything which the human race consumes.

The lack of uniformity of taxes in Texas may best be illustrated by using the valuation of the lowly Jersey cow. In deep East Texas, a valuation of \$4.00 is placed as the valuation for taxation; in North and Central Texas, that same cow has reached a valuation of \$12.00, and in the far West or the wide open spaces we find that same old cow who gives to us that lacteal fluid, with a valuation of \$15.00.

The unequal distribution of taxes may well be illustrated by the manner in which the old age pension is being distributed. We find some citizen who is receiving the sum of \$26.00 per month, and then a near neighbor, who happens to be a poor widow, who has served almost three score and ten, with no one to care for her, no one to minister to her in illness and distress, receiving the magnumous sum of \$7.00 per month. "Procrastination The Ruination of The Soul," Discrimination in Pensions, will soon destroy the confidence of the old.

Overlapping taxing units are sapping the nation of its wealth, discrimination in taxation might be

remedied if there was a system of the present system. If there was set up a rate of taxation of a certain percent of all gross incomes, the citizen who might have an income of 50.00 with the same rate used would pay the same prorated tax as the man who had a million dollar income, and then each would be left with their ingenuity and incentive to save, which would probably revive that faith of future peace and prosperity.

Remember the future of Texas depends upon Clay County as much as it depends on any other county. If we may be able to revise, rewrite and return to equal distribution of taxation, by proper valuation and rate, economize the distribution of taxes in Clay county, other counties will soon follow in the footsteps of economical administration.

### OIL NOTES

M. T. McLaughlen and associates have staked location on the A. C. Shipley land, block 12, Lindsey subdivision, to drill deep test to 5,000 feet in the event pay sand is not encountered at a lesser depth. This test is on an assembled block of some 3,500 acres, about 10 miles east of Henrietta and about three miles northwest of Ringgold.

Ramsey Petroleum Corporation of Oklahoma City has staked location on the R. F. Wynn ranch lands for a deep test to be known as the Wynn No. 1, located about 10 miles southeast of Henrietta.

The consolidated Oil Company is staking a wildcat 2,970 feet north and 330 feet west of the southeast corner of block 9 in the B. B. B & Co. survey, abstract No. 69. It is an assembled block of some 2,000 acres in blocks 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11. The well will be known as the No. 1 A. H. Bevering, with a contract depth of 3,600 feet. This site is a mile and a half north of Charlie, and drilling will begin before the 1st of August.

The J. E. Farrell No. 1 Malone, four miles east of Henrietta, are drilling below 5,000 feet and if pay sand is not encountered before 6,000 feet is reached, expect to drill to that depth. They have some showing but the examination some time ago of the core, did not show to be pay sand.

Major Oil companies are still purchasing protective acreage in and around these tests now drilling and the new locations, and geophysical companies are running blocks in various parts of the county with prospects of development later.

A representative of lease holders near the Wood well on Kemper Ranch lands, about seven miles NW of Henrietta, were in Henrietta Monday, checking acreage transfers with a view to re-assembling the lease block for further deepening of this Wood test. Several of the large independent companies have secured tracts near the recent Wood well, and are interested in seeing this test drilled to the Woodbine sands.

#### OFFICIAL MAPS BEING ISSUED BY HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Julian Montgomery, State Highway Engineer, announced that the Spring Edition of the 1939 Official Map of the Texas Highway System is being issued this week.

New features include the designation of National Forests in light green, reproduction of colored photographs of the Main Building of the University of Texas and a scene of a citrus grove in the Rio Grande Valley to make up the frontispiece, reproduction of a colored photograph of forest fire to serve as a warning and to help prevent forest fires, and a list of all State Highway Patrol Stations with their locations and telephone numbers.

The back of the map has been arranged in artistic form and is printed in two colors. Photographs of the various activities, industries, recreational spots, maritimes shipping, roads and bridges arranged in symmetric form to present a composite representative picture of Texas as a whole.

As an aid in the use of a map system of indicating mileages has been used which shows the distance between the larger cities or more important points in accumulated figures printed in red, while the mileage between the towns is shown in black.

**GAME, FISH AND OYSTER COMMISSION WRITES LETTER**

Austin, Texas, June 27.—Quail once thrived in practically every section of Texas, but clean and perhaps unwise farming has done much to destroy the bobwhite's food and cover. However, quail are still hunted by five times as many sportsmen as those seeking any other kind of game in the Lone Star State, it is estimated by Will J. Tucker, Executive Secretary of the Game, Fish & Oyster Commission. Land owners, realizing this, and visualizing additional income from the leasing of hunting rights on their lands, are leaving more and more of their acreage, much of the part set aside being of little other use, in plots suitable for the raising of bobwhites. To assist in this habitat planting by land owners, Phil D. Goodrum, Director of Research for the Game Department has announced that the planting of Korean lopedoza seed is proving one of the most beneficial moves tending to aid quail in their fight along the road back.

Goodrum also pointed out that landowners clearing forested areas should leave gum elastic, prickly ash, blackberry, sumac, wildplum, black gum, beech and black rawks standing, due to the fact they provide excellent shelter and food for In a national poll among nobbies of men, the favorite seemed to be the followers of Ike Walton, who tramped the fields and woods with the old blunderbuss on their arm.

According to a statement credited to Jim Haines, member of the firm of Haines & Garrison, melon growers and shippers at Salmon, the outlook for watermelons in this area is fine at this time. Mr. Haines is reported to have said a few days ago that there are in sight now 100 cars of melons in the Elkhart, Salmon and Grapeland district. This is if nothing happens to "blind the sight" mentioned, good news. Lack of rain and insect infection can and may reduce the present prospects to practically nothing. However, it is encouraging to have the outlook bright, as reported by Mr. Haines, who is a recognized expert.

The city's traffic police had placed a warning sign there. Autoists were supposed to look each way before coming into this street.

But a young motorist, intent upon reaching an unimportant objective further down the street, thoughtlessly entered this intersection—at the wrong moment—and without looking.

His automobile felled the innocent little girl. A tragic death ensued, a family was thrown into mourning—and all because a young motorist was not safety conscious.

In public school he had not received an auxiliary course in safe driving—and the golden rule of conduct had not been properly impressed upon him. His own life was blighted with the dreadful memory of his thoughtless accident.

"Driver's license laws must be strengthened," Pierce Brooks of

Dallas, President of the Texas Safety Council, said in discussing this tragedy. "Responsibility of drivers must be impressed upon the young man and woman of high school age. The great responsibility that is theirs when they are behind the wheel of the modern powerful automobile must be impressed, vividly upon them. This year 2,000 Texans will die from automobile accidents. All these could be averted. A large proportion of them will be innocent children."

Driver's license laws should be uniform in all the States and their revocation should be for thoughtless driving, speeding, drinking or operating cars without adequate brakes, tires and lights.

## JUST CRUISING

(By The Captain)

Governor W. Lee O'Daniel used his entire thirty minute broadcast time Sunday morning from the Mansion in Austin to berate the "now famous" 56 representatives who withstood the strongest and most insistent lobby ever assembled in the state capital, and voted down "the sales tax constitutional amendment resolution" known as Senate Joint Resolution No. 12, and which had for its purpose the submitting of the question to a vote of the people on whether or not they wanted to vote into the state constitution a 2% sales and natural resource tax. The ordinary run of citizens of Texas,—those who out-number the larger tax-payers by a ratio of something like 95 to 5 or better, will never be able to pay their debt of gratitude to the "immortal 56" as they will, in time become known. Even those old pioneers who are now on the pension rolls and have given their best to their state and its welfare would have had to pay back,—in the form of this 2% sales tax, a large amount of what little they would have received, had this senate resolution passed the House by the necessary 100 votes for submission and then it had been passed by a vote of the people. We would like to ask just why the governor and the senators who passed SJR No. 12 were so insistent upon passing this form of taxation, and that too by a vote of the people themselves, when the House had passed two statutory Bills and sent them to the senate, either of which would have raised enough money to pay the pensions? The people are being hoodwinked into believing the "56" and the other members of the House who passed the two bills mentioned are the cause of the failure of the old folk possibly not receiving their full pensions in days to come, when the real fact in this case is that the senators who refused to "bring either of the House Bills out of committee" but let both of them die there without any senate consideration whatever, are the ones on whose shoulders the blame for any cut-in pensions should be placed. The governor knows this to be the truth,—but, rather than face the true situation, he is willing,—and perhaps has been urged by the senators themselves,—to go on his radio broadcast and try to belittle the "56" who stood by their guns and withstood the onslaughts of a lobby the like of which "the 56" say has never before been seen in Texas. The governor said in his campaign last summer that he was "unalterably" opposed to the sales tax method of raising the necessary money, but when he saw what a terrible mess he had made of things by submitting his "transactions tax" he was quickly "taken into camp" by the sales tax supporters,—if he had to be taken in,—and immediately right-about-faced and said that he favored the sales tax plan, in order to pay the old people their pensions. He, too, never mentioned the two House Bills which were passed by the House and sent to the Senate to die there in committee. Right now,—we venture the assertion that if the governor is "sincere" about really wanting to pay the old people their full pensions, and add the liberalized list, too,—he could call the legislature back and present the tax question in the form of a statutory measure, which could be improved upon if needed later, he would find the "56" would join in passing it within the few days required,—but, to do this, he would "work over" many of the

senators who favor the constitutional sales tax method because it would place a "top" on this tax for all those who seek to dodge the real issue. It is really silly, we think, for the governor to pretend so strongly over the radio that the "56" alone are responsible for the present condition which exists with reference to the pension matter. Trouble is, we also believe, that the governor will wake up some of these fine mornings to learn that the "56" are stronger in the minds of a majority of our people now than they were before they fought this battle to its bitter end. We think the governor has been "used" by those desiring SJR and will wake up "at the polls" to find he is the one who has been misled. Time will tell.

With Japan continually seeking to end the reign of power of England in China, and with their blockade of Tientsin, Swatow, and other Chinese ports where British and French concessions are located, it begins to look like Japan and not the Polish country will be the starting scene of another conflict which might reach world-wide proportions. Britain can hardly back up from Japan regardless of what might be the situation arising later in continental Europe. They simply have to stop this Japanese drive to run them completely out of China, and unless Britain does roll up her sleeves and put an end to Japanese insults, they can hardly ever expect to again hold the respect of other countries, even the respect of their worst enemies. The next few days will likely see something really happening in the Old World, for already Russia is giving Japan something to think about and this, too right when the Japanese are in a state of economic trouble at home and in China. Of course, Propaganda Minister Goebbels of the Hitler regime is "at it again" saying Britain won't fight, but there is such a thing as going too far. They did that very thing in the World War and looks like they'll soon get to that point again. It is a settled fact that should Britain's enemies ever "scare" the U. S. into "staying out of it" while they "licked" Britain,—then they'd be on us,—and that singled handed on our part,—before the sun went down the day after England had been conquered. If the U. 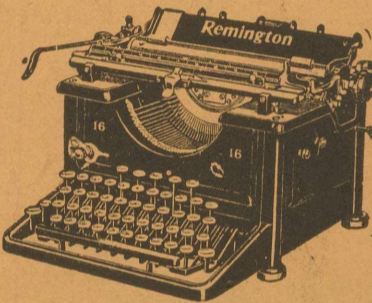
