One of the newest AAA amendments, Mr. Williams said ,specifies that acreage from which peanuts are harvested for oil purposes and followed by an approved Cover crop next fall will qualify as erosion-resisting under the 1912 AAA program. However, only one-half of the erosion-resisting acreage may be met by this practice. Under AAA regulations, cooperators in Clay county must devote at least 25 percent of their cropland to specified erosion-resisting crops or land uses.
