Glad To See Neighbor Tom O'Bryan Up

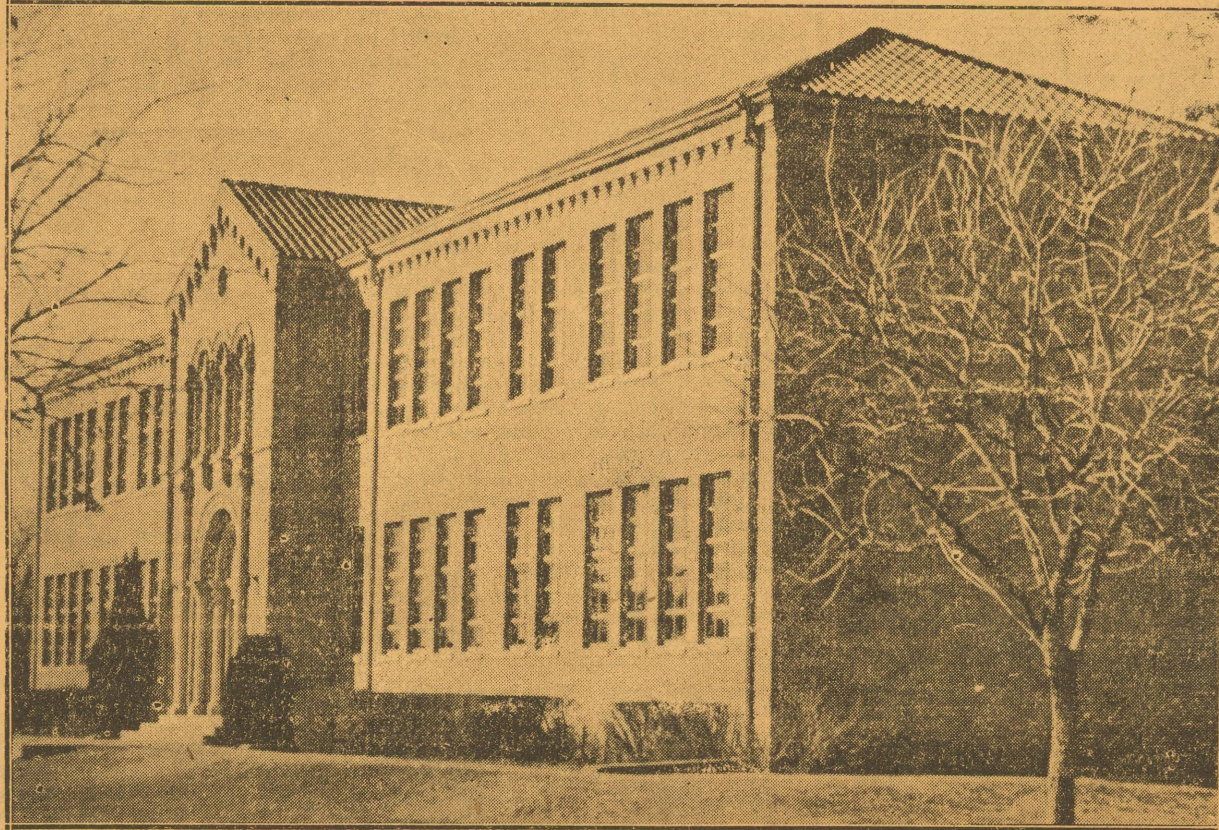

Mr. A. J. Ogle, chairman of the Rationing Board for Clay County, announces that there will be a Registration of all dealers and industrial users of sugar at the Henrietta high school building on April 28 - 29 that such quotas may be arrived at due each user in such business as he or she operates.

This is an important program

coming under defense conservation of sugar through the Rationing Board and should receive the prompt cooperation of all dealers, and industrial users.

The registration of each industrial user of sugar will be held at the same place at a later date, which will be announced by the board. The sugar rationing pro-

gram will allow each individual in the home just so many ounces of sugar each week, presumably 12 ounces each. Some of the sweets we have liberally enjoyed will be cut to a minimum as a part of our defense war effort.

We should all cooperate willingly to do our bit to aid Uncle Sam in winning this war.

Farmers Vote On Quota on May 2nd

Uncle Sam already has his hands full and should not have to worry about aprom farmers an decide for themselves. E. W. Williams, chairman, Clay County AAA committee, pointed out today.

Solution of the problem is marketing quotas which will be decided at community ballot boxes, Saturday, May 2, when wheat farmers vote in a national referendum.

"We must produce the feed, and feed it will take to help whip international gangsterism instead of spending time, labor and money-raising crops we don't need," the chairman said in explaining that a 2-year supply of wheat is in sight and the United Nations are in desperate need of meat, milk, vegetables, eggs, fats and oils.

"Just as there must be no more 'business as usual', there must be no more 'farming as usual'. Wheat is no exception and we must fit it into our war program," he continued.

Wheat marketing quotas, which divide a limited market equally among all wheat producers, give farmers opportunity to continue as masters of their own wheat production and reserves.

Also at stake in the referendum is the 85 percent of parity loan program which is one of the principal reasons for present fair prices of wheat, the chairman said and added that with abnormal supplies, wheat quotas are essential to maintenance of fair prices.

"We've done a good job of producing wheat, we have adequate reserves, and we're getting a fair price. Wheat marketing quotas is just another method we have of keeping our business—house in order," the AAA official said.

The United States Department of Agriculture advises that manufacturers are to supply 3,600 new peanut pickers above the original quotas to enable peanut producers to adequately harvest the crop we are producing under the 1942 Food for Freedom Program.

The manufacture of Nails and Bale Ties is to be increased also.

Producers in Clay county desiring to grow peanuts for oil incorporation with the war effort should secure a certificate to secure seed from Cooperative Peanut Associations from the County Committee in the County office of the ACA.

Two Clay county boys, Thomas Flynn of Bellevue and James Albert King of Route B, Henrietta, left Tuesday of this week for Dallas for induction into the U.S. Army.

This entire county was drenched Tuesday and Tuesday night when the rainfall exceeded three inches. The precipitation being 3.61. Sunday night was .42 inches, and Monday night .61 making a total of 4.65 from Sunday to Wednesday morning. Breaking all records for the year. Flood waters covered both railroads East of Henrietta, making all trains late Wednesday.

Traffic was held up early Tuesday morning when waters were over the Highway between Henrietta and Wichita Falls and it continued to mist through Wednesday but the downpour that had continued for 24 hours had let up. Little Wichita river north of Henrietta was out of banks and all nearby creeks, and the slue were overflowed.

Traffic was resumed before noon Wednesday on the Wichita - Fort Worth Highway.

It is hoped that the greenbug menace which was threatening to destroy the corn and even the pasture range will be checked as the heavy rains will result in giving the growing plants greater vigor to resist ravages of the pests which have already wiped out the spring oats and the greater portion of the wheat over the entire county. Not since 1907 has there been such serious damage to the grain from greenbugs.

No romance and fun to getting on a weekly paper?

I remember when I used to write all the news for the daily paper in Eastland, then take off most of one day each week to go over to Ranger and help Rip Galloway get out a small weekly he was issuing in competition with the Ranger daily.

Never will I forget the night when we put out an "extra" on the second Dempsey-Tunney fight — (the battle of the long count). That afternoon, Rip had gone through the "poster paper" by hand—the extra was to be printed on colored paper, and removed all the yellow sheets as he didn't want to be called "yellow journalist".

Government Wants Peanuts Planted

Peanuts went to war after Pearl Harbor, according to E. W. Williams chairman, Clay county USDA War Board. New goal for Clay County in the Food for Freedom program this year is 170 acres, while Texas' goal is 1,056,000 acres, or approximately 300 percent increase over the 1941 crop. Peanuts are in war for the duration, because we need fats, and oils we formerly imported from the Far East where the Japs are now, Mr. Williams said. At the same time farmers are being asked to increase peanuts, they are not being asked to produce them at a financial loss, the War Board chairman said in explaining that farmers would receive a fair price for the peanuts produced.

Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard has announced that the price of U. S. No. 1 White Spanish type peanuts will be supported at not less than \$82 per ton with differentials for grades and location.

"This doesn't mean all peanut farmer will receive a flat \$82 per ton but it does mean they'll receive a fair price for what they raise," he said. Peanut seed to produce peanut to county farmers on cash or loan basis. Farmers will be advised where the seed may be obtained as soon as arrangements are completed. If a farmer wants credit in buying peanut seed to produce peanuts for oil, he'll sign a promissory note can be satisfied with cash or peanuts from his 1942 production".

America is today engaged in an all-out general war mobilization, and it behooves everyone to do his or her bit to aid Uncle Sam in his efforts to win this war.

Mid-Continent Oil Co. Doing Their Bit to Aid

Industrial leaders here were asked to co-operate in a southwest-wide industrial scrap collection campaign to help the War Production Board to "Get in the scrap."

Announcement of the co-ordination of all southwestern industrial scrap collection activities and appointment of George C. Gibbons of Dallas as the regional director was received here today from George T. Weymouth, chief of the WPB's industrial salvage section in Washington. The southwestern industrial scrap program will use chambers of commerce, trade associations and other bodies already prepared to help their members collect and move the scrap metals and rubber now needed for the nation's war program.

Mr. Gibbons is executive vice-president of the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association which has just sponsored a Texas petroleum industry scrap drive which netted over 65,000,000 pound of scrap. Serving the government as a dollar-a-year man, he will continue his association duties in addition.

The campaign of local industries to collect the scrap from their own plants supplements the general domestic salvage drive now under way. Mr. Gibbons emphasized in a statement accompanying the announcement.

"The shortage of scrap is so acute we must get in more of it immediately if we are to keep the stream of tanks, ships and planes moving."

Mr. Gibbons said, "For that reason, the war Production Board is asking Texas industrial leaders to co-ordinate the collection of their own scrap iron, steel, aluminum and other metals and rubber in a southwestern drive conducted by them."

"In many places, this work is already well under way. In others, it will be organized at once through the chambers of commerce, trade bodies and other groups. The campaign does not conflict in any way with the general domestic scrap drives. In fact, it will supplement these so as to get large quantities of scrap back to the mills needing it, in the shortest possible time."

Included in Mr. Gibbons' region are Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, Arkansas, New Mexico, Mississippi, and Colorado. Shelterbelts Suggested By Miss Mary Branch

Because of the personnel, now engaged in planting shelterbelts, is being transferred to the Emergency Rubber Project in California, the farm people of north and west Texas have an opportunity to get the surplus stock of trees free of charge except for transportation from the Shelterbelt nurseries at Childress, Texas and Chickasha, Oklahoma.

The three major uses to which the trees may be put are: (a) field of shelterbelts; (b) farm windbreaks, and (c) establishment of post lots or woodlots. The trees cannot under any circumstances be used as ornamentals, which restriction will prohibit their use in group of two or three, or as single specimens.

The following stocks are available now and must be removed before April 15th this year. All will be shipped bare-rooted: Desert Willow vitex, apricot, soapberry, western walnut, ailanthus, Chinese elm, hackberry, green ash, mulberry, black walnut, black locust, honeylocust, and plum. Farmers needing trees should see the County Agents and make arrangements to pool all orders from the county into one order so as to save transportation costs.

Those securing trees must bring their own packing material to dampen and put around roots.
