Four members of the local K of P Lodge attended the meeting of the Pythian Round-Up held in Electric Monday evening.

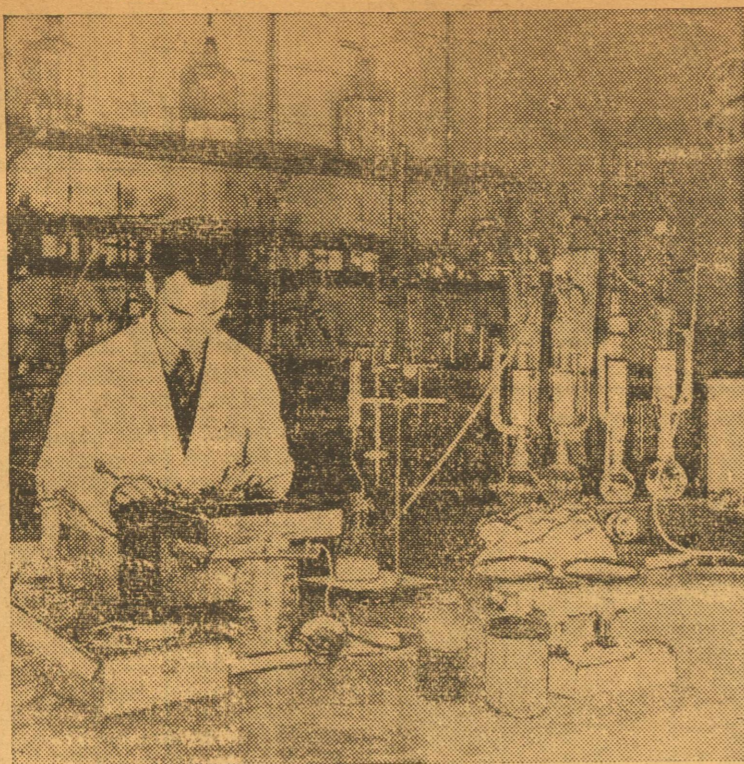
An appropriate and entertaining program was presented after which a social hour with refreshments, was enjoyed.

Navy Programs Are Outlined

Most people are familiar with the Navy's V-1 program, which was inaugurated to allow college men to continue in school and for transfer to V-5 and V-7.

Applicant must be unmarried, not less than 19 and under 28 years of age, as of date of enlistment.

Must possess one of the following degrees from an accredited University or College: Bachelor of Arts, Bachelor of Science, Any Engineering Degree, Bachelor of Education, Bachelor of Philosophy, Bachelor of Business Administration, Bachelor of Journalism, Bachelor of Laws, providing the applicants law course was preceded by at least two years of pre-law work at an accredited institution.

Transcript of college record must be submitted to substantiate the degree, which must show two one-semester courses in mathematics of college grade. Any applicant who has taken Plane Trigonometry in high school must have two courses of three semester hours each in two major Maths, such as Analytical Geometry or College Algebra.

Candidate must be of good repute, agree not to marry before completion of Reserve Midshipman training, be able to furnish birth certificate, and three letters of recommendation from responsible citizens. Application must be made at Nearest Navy Recruiting Station—N O W.

Navy Enlistments Wanted by Uncle Sam

Men who have recently been reclassified for selective may enlist in Naval Reserve provided application made before is mailed, Navy recruiting officers at Wichita Falls, said today.

Qualified men are needed for operation of Naval ships and stations. Petty officer ratings are now open to aviation and auto mechanics, bakers, cooks, carpenters, electricians, machinists, metalworkers, painters, pattern makers, pharmacists and hospital attendants, radio technicians, and practically all types of experienced construction workers.

Unskilled men, and those skilled in trades, are open for enlistment, have opportunity to attend Navy Trade Schools and win promotion in the service.

Chevrolet Truck Program Explained

Practical exhaustion of the supply of heavy-duty trucks, upon which hinge the major hauling operations in the country, focuses attention upon the necessity for truck dealers to convert so-called "medium" trucks to take over the big-haul operations which must be done of the nation's transportation system.

Such conversion and expansion is no new development in the truck field, Mr. Fish pointed out. Responsible manufacturers have produced conversion equipment for many years. The present war emergency highlights the necessity for producing trucks of expanded capacity.

More than 69 per cent of all the trucks require some form of special equipment, Mr. Fish pointed out, for the truck has become a highly specialized transport unit.

Citing an example of a medium truck conversion job, Fish pointed to a highway tanker, a mammoth unit whose original capacity was 14,000 lbs. gross weight.

Mrs. C. G. McKinney was a gracious hostess to members of the Wednesday Afternoon Bridge Club at her home Wednesday, June 17th.

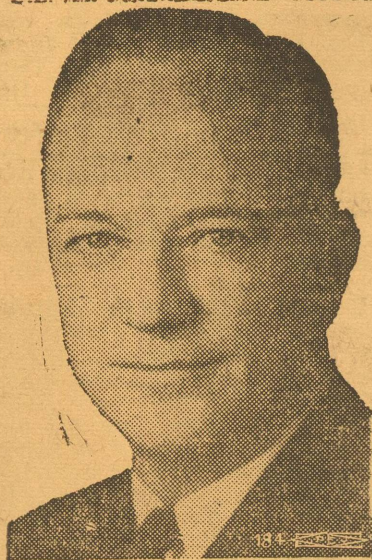

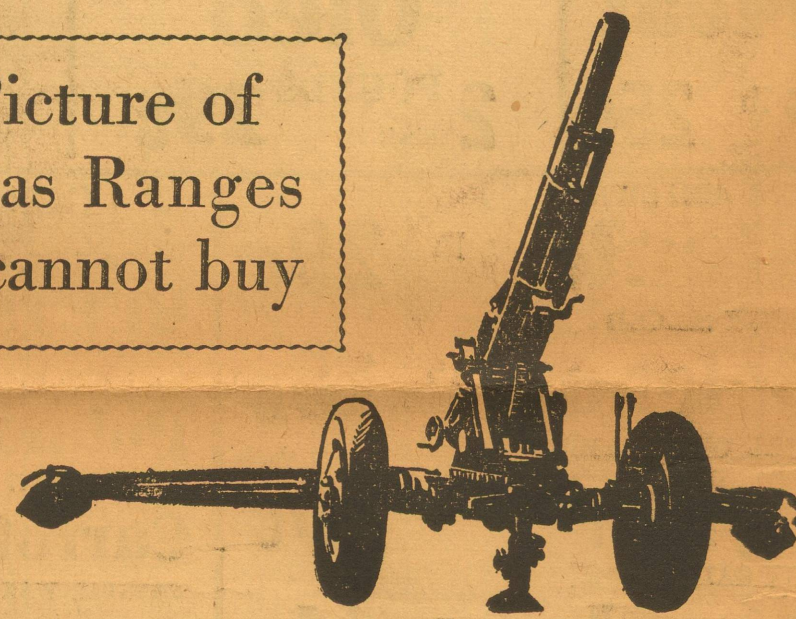

I. ROOM HEATERS: To store for the summer, remove dust inside and out; wrap in newspapers and keep in a dry enclosed place.

II. RANGES: Do not let food spill over (in top cooking, the simmer-burner heat prevents this; in oven-cooking, careful handling does it). Do not set hot vessels on the bare porcelain surface. (Use cork mats.) Do not use the oven to heat the kitchen in cold weather (prolonged heat will cut down the life of the oven walls). Do not clean up the range while the enamel is warm. When it cools, remove crumbs and spatters with a damp cloth. Do not over-cook foods. It means wear and tear on the range, as well as on the groceries.
