American Physical Type High.

It appears from the report of the surgeon general of the United States army that the total number of candidates examined for enlistment was 45,218, and that of this number about two-thirds, or 30,176, were accepted. This is a large proportion when the fact is taken into account that the standard of excellence required is very high, none but physically perfect men being accepted. Of the 45,218 applicants for enlistment, 42,183 were white men and 3,035 were negroes. O the white men, 37,790 were accept ed, and of the negroes 2,386. Out of every 1,000 men accepted, 781.05 on the average were born in the United States, 64.76 in British territory, 42.25 in Germany and 8.79 in Sweden and Norway.
