New Yorkers Don't "Chew."

New York tobacconists are following the European custom of discouraging tobacco chewing by not keeping the article on sale. It is not a matter of morals, but of profits. Between Twenty-third and Forty-second street on Broadway a dozen dealers have dropped plug and finecut from their stocks. "When you cut off a man's chewing you increase his smoking capacity," sad one dealer the other day. "Besides, chewing is everywhere conceded to be a disgusting vice, while smoking is generally held to be legitimate. In Berlin and Paris no first-class tobacconist has the stuff on his counters. Tobacco chewing is almost exclusively an American vice. While there is a marked decrease in the demand for the weed in this form, regret to say that the paper-covered cgarette is gaining ground. Of course there is money in it, and there is no danger that it will all under the ban placed on chewng tobacco."

Big immigration of Italians.

In thirty years 1,391,076 Italians have come to this country. This immigration has a very peculiar character. Until 1890 the percentage of women was less than 15, but now it has increased to 39. This indicates that the immigration has a marked tendency to become permanent. Thirty per cent or more of Italian adults who have been in this country more than ten years went back at least once to Italy, and So per cent of these came to this country again, bringing their families with them. 
