## GENERAL NEWS

War is now feared between the United States and Japan.

Senator Bailey, wife and son have returned to their home in Gainsville.

Over 200 Bankers left on a special train last week, for a three weeks tour of northern Cities.

Harry Orchard has confessed in detail the plot and assassination of Frank Steunenberg in Idaho.

Prof. A.D. Ellis of Sweet-water was elected Superintendent of the Big Springs public school.

An earthquake shock lasting about 10 seconds was felt in San Francisco on June 5th.

Mrs. Sol Half and two sons have donated \$40,000.00 to the San Antonio school board to be used in erecting an industrial and commercial school.

A hanging break-beam derailed a Santa Fe freight train near Beaumont last Thursday, killing one man and injuring five others.

Two 14 year old lassies of Ft. Worth appropriated a horse and buggy to their own use without the consent of the owner and were arrested and placed in Jail.

A negro was hanged April 19 at Columbus Texas, and his remains shipped to Sealy for burial. But when he reached Sealy, he had revived and was given medical attention.

The 18 months old baby of Mr. and Mrs. B. L. King of Roby died Thursday in about 30 minutes from the time it was supposed to have been bitten by some poisonous insect.

One hundred Confederate veterans armed and dressed in the Civil War uniform, marched to the Capitol at Washington, but were refused admittance unless they would disarm and break ranks which they finally did, and were admitted and shown thru the Capitol. This same incident was objected to over 40 years ago.

Fairbanks spoke at Chattanooga, Tenn. last week, and like he usually is, making reference to McKinley. A man running for office on dead mens works is as bad or worse than getting rich on dead mens property.

President Murray of the Oklahoma Constitutional Convention, issued a call for an election to ratify the recent constitution, despite the fact that the Courts have granted restraining orders for so doing.

### BLOOD FLOWS IN RUSSIA.

Lodz, Russia, June 4. - Two detectives and two soldiers and three other persons wounded in street here today by a bomb thrown at the police officials by the terrorists.

A patrol of infantry was attracted by the explosion and opened fire upon the crowd wounding 13 persons.

### FAMILY POISONED.

The entire family of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Fore were quite seriously poisoned Wednesday night from eating canned chili. They were taken sick at 8 o'clock at night and it was noon yesterday before they secured any relief whatever from sick stomach, the oldest and youngest children almost being thrown into convulsions. It is thought that they will recover now without any serious difficulty. -Ex.

Run down by a negro on a bicycle this morning at 11 o'clock on Broadway an unknown Mexican died shortly after 1 o'clock at the police station, where he was taken after the accident. Concussion of the brain is given as the cause of the death by Dr. George Prunner, who attended the injured man at the city jail.

The negro is unknown to the police, but according to the story they heard upon arriving at the scene the negro was going at a lively rate when he struck the Mexican. The negro was thrown from the wheel by the force of the blow, but it is said that after picking up the wheel he mounted it and made good his escape without investigating the injury of the man he had run over. -El Paso Herald.

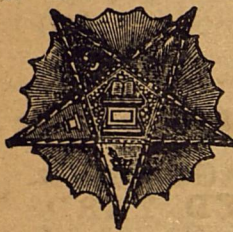

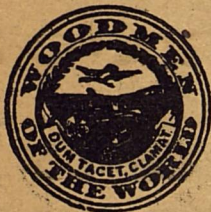

Bowdoin college (pronounced Bod'n) was founded at Brunswick, Me., in 1794. It was named in honor of James Bowdoin, an American statesman in high standing, who died in 1790. His son, James Bowdoin, a gentleman of wealth, who later served in diplomatic circles, being United States minister to Spain, 1805-08, gave to the college at its founding 1,000 acres of land and \$5,000 in money. At his death in 1811 he willed to the institution a number of valuable gifts—6,000 acres of land, a library of several thousand books, a collection of fine paintings and an assortment of scientific apparatus. This institution, where the poet Longfellow taught for five years, has preserved its high standing from the first.
