Tuesday morning while work-
ing with some stock at his farm
in the Slide neighborhood, J. A.
Cannon was kicked by a mule,
receiving quite severe injuries.
He was struck on the chin and
mouth, a gash was cut in his
chin two or three inches long
which necessitated several stitch-
es to bring it together again. The
top of his mouth was also badly
injured and five of his upper
teeth knocked out. Dr. Overton
was called to treat the injuries,
and reports the injured man
resting nicely. The injuries are
not fatal, but exceedingly pain-
ful.

The protracted meeting at the
Methodist Church, which was
continued for two weeks closed
last Sunday night. Rev. Hunt
did some splendid preaching and
though there were no conversions
the church was greatly benefited.

Some of as fine onions as we
have ever seen grow in any man's
country have been sold on the lo-

still his home, not withstanding
reports to the effect that he was
going to move away permanent-
ly.

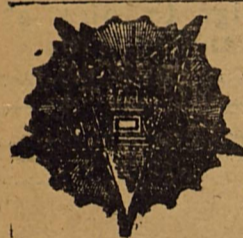

W. T. Dixon

It has been anticipated for some time by many persons that W. T. Dixon would come before the voters of Terry county as a candidate for the office of District and County Clerk, and in this issue of the Herald he relieves them of any doubts or anxiety that they may have had on that question.

Mr. Dixon comes before the people asking them for the office because he wants it, and is conscience of his ability to fill it. As is well known he was elected District and County Clerk at the organization of the county, and re-elected at the general election soon following, both terms covering a period of about twenty-seven months. So in this instance the two terms claim does not touch his case. Mr. Dixon's proficiency as clerk is well known by all who ever had business transactions with the office during the time he held it. His genial manners and his readiness to serve and oblige everyone are no less admirable traits than his proficiency. He was an industrious and painstaking clerk, and always had his work up and was ready for the courts to proceed with their business when they convened, and again coming before the voters of the county, he promises, if elected, to use the same diligence that characterized his former official conduct, and to give the duties of the office his time and undivided attention. Should any desire a change in the office of clerk they can rest assured that a more competent man can not be found in the country to fill it than Mr. Dixon, and this paper asks that his candidacy have the consideration that his qualifications and personal worth deserve.

District Court in Yoakum Co.

The editor of the Herald visited Plains the first of the week, and was present during the term of District Court. It was the first term held in the county, and consequently, there was very little business before the court.

Judge L. S. Kinder presided, and the state was represented by District Attorney L. C. Penry; Lum Hudson, the sheriff, was on hand with a clear voice, and F. L. Boyd exercised the functions of his office as clerk.

A grand jury composed of twelve of the best men in the was empanelled, with J. J. Kendrick as foreman, and after two days labor returned three indictments. They were all against the same party, who had fled the country, for an assault, carrying a pistol and carrying brass knucks. The jury was then discharged, after receiving some complimentary remarks from the court.

There were only two cases on the docket, and they were disposed of, and the next term will commence with new business, and will probably be held in a new court house. Yoakum is a good county, and now that more than one hundred sections of school land is to soon come on market, we may expect a rapid growth of its county site, and permanent improvements all over the county.
