# MORE RAIN AND SNOW

This Week. Cold Wave and Fair Weather Prevails at Present.

Sunday was a beautiful day, the most beautiful and pleasant since early November. The sun rose in a cloudless sky and long before noon the day bid fair to be the prettiest in many. The people thoroughly enjoyed it too, because "a nice day" was invaribly the first friendly greeting from those one met, but it was a regular weather breeder for just as the great king of day was sending his last lingering rays back in a beckoning goodnight one could easily distinguish a mass of inky black clouds just peering over the horizon.

A heavy fog greeted our inhabitants on Monday morning as they arose, which little by little got heavier and heavier until it turned into a slow drizzling rain. We were not a little surprised to find a two inch snow on the ground Tuescay morning, which many declared would have easily measured six if the ground had been dry instead of soaking wet. A light snow kept falling nearly all day.

Tonight (Tuesday) it is almost fair and the wind is whizzing from the cold, cold North and promises to be real cold by morning, but we have had another good season and the farmer and ranchman alike is rejoicing

In conversation with H. H. Longbreak, an old time Terryite, and at present one of our hustling hardware men; he said:

'This winter reminds me very much of the first few I spent in Terry some nine years ago and such crops as followed for a few years, you would hardly believe if I told you. All a man had to do was to plant and when he harvested he was blessed with a yield much larger than it was possible to gather. This almost ruined the country when a dry year did come, for the people had gotton in such a habit of just planting a crop then visiting their wife's kinfolks back East till harvest time that they firmly believed that no cultivation was necessary, so that the dry years almost proved disasterous. But I don't believe such will occur again, as the people have learned by experience-many to their sorrow—that cultivation is a big factor here, the same as "back East, and these who come here to stay with it, believe in thoro cultivation and invaribly make crops, wet or dry. I look for a bumper crop of the finist quality next year."

We believe Mr. Longbreak is right and we believe 1912 will be a banner year in Terry.

# CONDITIONS OF THE CONTEST.

List of Premiums, etc. Get Busy Correspondents.

With the 1st issue of the new year, 1912, the contest starts and will be waged throughout the year 1912, and we are expecting the Herald to lead all other papers in west Texas in the diversity of its news. Your efforts will not only be seen by the people of Terry County but will be read by hundreds of readers in nearly every state in the Union, in Canada and Central America

In selecting Judges for this contest, one aim has been to secure those that read closely, unprejudiced and are therefore willing to give an unbiased opin ion in the matter. Should any of the judges remove or any way become disqualified for service another judge will be selected to fill their place. Thethree selected are: Mesdames J. L. Randal and E. B. Wright and Dr. Madux of Gomez, and they will be furnished with blank weekly reports, which will enable them to make quick work of their weekly findings which will be totaled at the end of the year and turned into the Herald office. Also each judge is to be absolutely ignorant of the others report. The letters will be judged on two merits only. Promptness and general news. Promptness will be classed as "A" or 50 points, if perfect, and general news "B" or 50 points.

To explain promptness, if a letter is received at the Herald office between Monday and Wednesday, it will be given 50 points or perfect, and if received later than Wednesday or after of course it will decend in points each day. All letters will be dated the day received at the Herald office.

In judging news, we only wish to call the attention to the difference between just two locals, thus:

"Mrs. Henry Smith took dinner with Mrs. Paul Jones last Sunday."

"John Thompson took a fine load of swine to market last week for which he received a fancy price."

Now nearly everybody would give the latter a high point and the former a very low scale in grading as one is a local that attracts the attention of many while the other only concerns the two ladies directly mentioned, Mrs. Smith and Jones. Of course the Judges are expected to grade the whole letter at once and not a single local, but they are expected to judge news by its interest to the many. They will also take into consideration the difference in population of given localities; for instance Gomez has a greater population by several hundred than Needmore, and therefore has many

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



OREGON out special permission.] SOME POST FIGURES. The United States department of

agriculture has recently been collect-Ing some interesting statistics on posts -the cost, durability and use of them. Iowa was selected as an average agricultural state, and the data presented is the result of inquiries sent to a great many Hawkeye farmers. It is estimated that about 10,000,000 posts are used annually in the building and repairing of the fences on the 209,163 farms of the state, which have an average size of 1581/2 acres. The replies received indicated that about 70 per cent of the posts used were home grown or produced and that only 30 per cent were bought of lumber deal-The average life of the posts in the state was given as fourteen years and their average cost as 13.7 cents. alone the post material used ranked as follows: Osage orange, red cedar, locust, white oak, arbor vitae, catalpa, black walnut, butternut, red oak and willow. In the matter of cost alone the red cedar post heads the list at 26% cents, while willow is the cheapest at 6 cents. When the two factors of both durability and cost are taken For prompt attention and queik into account the post material ranks as follows, the first named being the most economical: Osage orange, white oak, locust, catalpa, red cedar, black walnut, butternut, willow, white cedar

and red oak. Experiments made along the line of giving posts preservative treatment showed that this materially increased the life of all kinds of wooden posts and more than doubled the life of the round sapwood posts. The cost of treatment was found to be considerably less than buying new posts and setting them in the ground. The department has conducted special fenceposts and will send those desiring them bulletins and pamphlets bearing on the subject.

used to fly in flocks of millions, literally shading the sun, is closing her life in the Cincinnati zoo, at present aged eighteen years, her mate dying a short time ago at twenty-four years of age. Although diligent search has been made by officials of the National Association of Audubon Societies for other specimens of this once plentiful bird and in spite of the fact that a reward of \$1,500 has been offered to any persons finding a nest of them, the search has been thus far unsuccessful and the reward is still unclaimed. As late as 1877 a nesting place of these birds was known in Michigan, which was twentyeight miles long and four miles wide. Audubon is quoted as observing a nesting place of the pigeons in Kentucky early in the last century which was forty miles long and three miles wide. Hither boys and men gathered and slaughtered the birds with clubs, guns and nets, a bag of 500 birds in one day being a common thing for one person. If more were killed than could be carried off, droves of hogs were turned in to fatten on what were left. treatment greatly and gradually reduced the number of the pigeons until some three years ago but seven specimens of the beautiful bird could be found in the country. This ruthless slaughter and its tragic ending may well serve to enforce the importance of preserving the useful birds not yet extinct, but which are slaughtered wan tonly in their roosting places in the south during the winter months.

## STAR ROUTE INSPECTOR HERE

Look Over The Proposed Route From Lubbock To Bronco.

Mr. Kingsil, route inspector for Texas, in company with Messrs. #### OILMEAL FOR LIVE STOCK.

May Be Fed With Good Results to All Farm Animals.

"Oil cake or oilmeal in proper quantities is considered by our best stockmen to be one of the most healthful foods that is on the market," states Professor G. C. Humphrey of the animal husbandry department of the college of agriculture of the University of Wisconsin. "Its value is that it keeps the animal in the most healthy condition, no other feed having such a beneficial effect on the digestive

"The price of the feed is considered prohibitive by many farmers; but, considering the fact that it contains nearly 30 per cent digestible protein, the stockman can well afford to pay the market price in order to have at least a small quantity of this feed availa-

"Old process rather than new proc ess oilmeal should be secured so far as possible for the reason that 94 per cent of the protein in old process oilmeal is digestible as compared with only 84 per cent of the new process

"Oilmeal may be fed to all classes of farm stock," continues Professor Humphrey. "Fattening steers will use to great advantage from two to three pounds of oilmeal daily in connection with other feeds. Larger amounts can be used profitably when prices are not too high. Feeding oilmeal in the form of nut sized cakes is considered preferable to the loose meal by most of our steer feeders.

"Dairy cows will consume one or two pounds of oilmeal daily with their grain rations, and during the winter feeding period more or less oilmeal is almost indispensable in order to keep the cows in the best condition for producing milk and butter fat. For growing calves, sheep and hogs oilmeal can constitute about one-tenth of the grain ration fed and prove very beneficial. Horses may be fed small quantities, although its general use for horses is

There is one common bird that the small boy with slung shot or air rifle may appropriately put in his spare time exterminating, and that is the English sparrow. Exhaustive investigations have been made touching the habits and bill of fare of the bird, and he has been condemned as an all round nuisance. The only redeeming feature the little rascal has is that he is hardy and gives his monotonous chirp in midwinter when the thermometer southland. But this is not a sufficient virtue to justify saving him. The sparrow is good eating, and "four and twenty" sparrows would make a pretty good potpie.

A good share of the big white Bermuda onions weighing a pound or more apiece which are found in most all markets of the country are grown in Texas. The seed is sown rather thick in beds early in October, and early in December the little onions are transplanted in permanent fields, which are thoroughly pulverized and put in the finest possible tilth. In the work of transplanting Mexicans are largely employed—men, women and children. When the transplanting is finished the fields are irrigated. As soon as the soil is dry enough cultivation with special hand plows is begun, this being continued during the greater part of the growing season. Bermudas yield at the rate of about 20,000 pounds to the acre, and the net return runs from \$250 to \$500 per acre. It is estimated that the total area in onions in Texas this season will not be far from 10,000





SHOULD BE SWEETENED.

A friend who has put in 1,200 rods of tile and plans to put in still more has asked for a sure way of telling whether such land is acid or sour. While this sour condition of soil is often indicated by the failure of the tract to grow clover and its tendency to grow the sorrels, a better way is to test the soil with blue litmus paper, which can be got from or through most any druggist. Pieces of this paper cut 2 by 4 inches should be inserted into the soil in representative spots to a depth of five or six inches piece is placed being marked with a stick. After remaining in the soil three or four hours they should be exed red or red in spots the proof is conclusive that the soil is sour and that before it will give satisfactory results in crop production it must be sweettained in limited quantities in stable manure, but much more plentifully in common lime, which may be applied in the finely ground raw stone form or in the shape of slaked lime. plenty of manure is available, both it and lime (at the rate of two to three tons per acre) may be put on the land at the same dina





### Textile Mill for Post City


