#### SAN SABA.

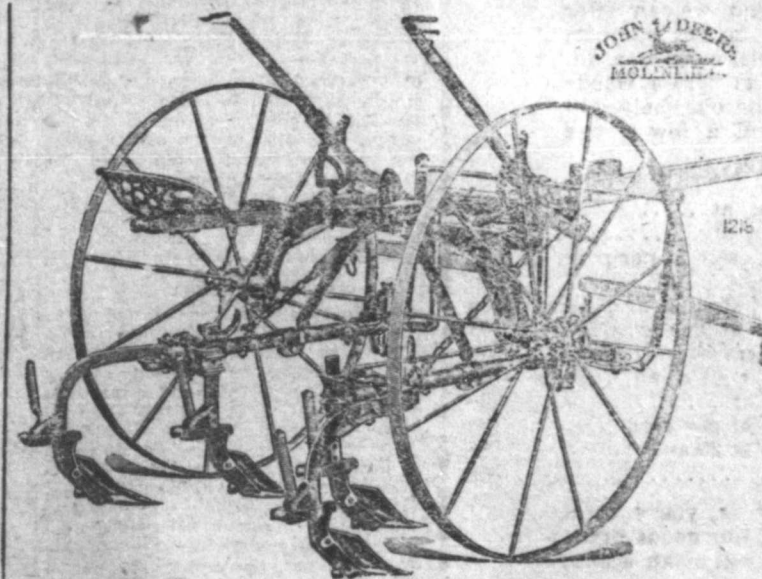
Neal Brown made a business

Every orchardist, whether on  
a large commercial scale, or for  
family use only, should prepare  
for smothering when the fruit crop  
is threatened by late frosts. Saw-  
dust or small chips from a wood  
pile are the best material for  
this purpose. "Cow-chips" or  
dry lot manure are good. Any-  
thing that will burn slowly with-  
out flame and produce much  
smoke will answer the purpose.  
Thirty years ago at the old home  
place there was an orchard of  
two square acres that cornered  
together like the dark square on  
a checker-board. Some help was  
secured and chips, bark and  
some wood was carried to the  
place and a row of fires built im-  
mediately south of the north row  
of trees. This was at the begin-  
ning of a fresh norther, when  
peaches were as large as mar-  
bles. The score of trees thus pro-  
tected was severely damaged  
by over bearing and breaking  
branches. The other acre was  
unhurt, but bore no fruit what-  
ever. The mercury as is re-  
membered went down to 16 de-  
grees, the lowest in that section  
for twenty years—Farm and  
Ranch.

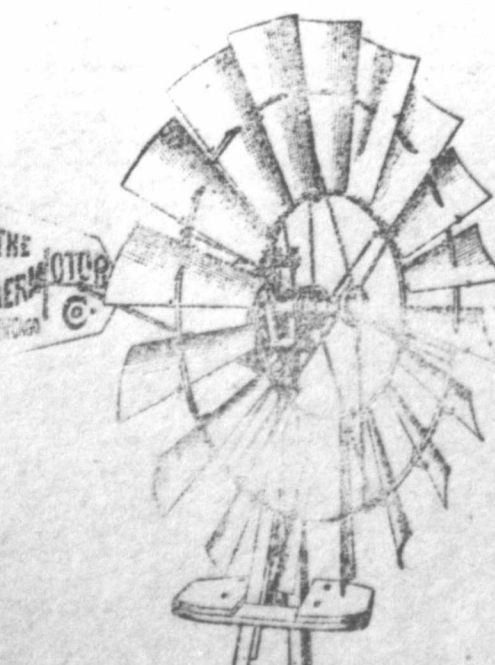

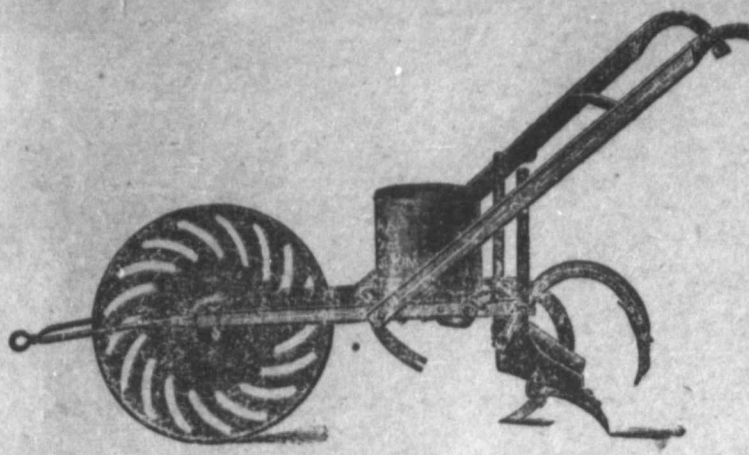

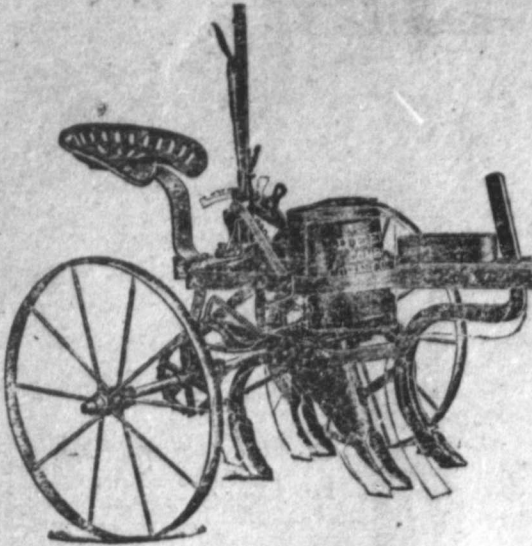
