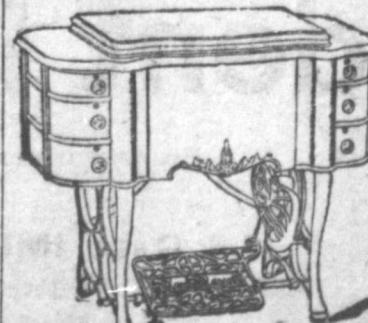

CAPT. ASHLEY DEAD. In the death of Capt. D. C. Ashley, which occurred at his home in this city Wednesday afternoon, the county lost one of its most valuable and upright citizens.

Capt. Ashley suffered with a chronic trouble similar to Bright's disease for about three years, but was not confined to his bed until the last week of his life and his friends and the members of his family had no thought of the end being so near until the last few days. His devoted wife and all of his children were at his bedside, except Mrs. G. E. Brown of Bristow, who could not come on account of the serious sickness of one of her children. Kind friends and neighbors and those who had known and been associated with the good man were also there to offer assistance and consolation to the grief-stricken family.

Capt. Ashley was held in high esteem in the town and everywhere that he was known. He was a man of many virtues and pure motives. One of the many commendable traits of his character was that he never intentionally wounded the feelings of any man and he was ever kind and courteous to those with whom he was associated, and with his family he was most affectionate and indulgent. He was a citizen of this town for fifteen years, having moved here from San Saba, where he was engaged in mercantile business for many years. He was born in Kentucky Dec. 25, 1842. In childhood he moved to Arkansas, where he grew to manhood and married. From Arkansas he moved to San Saba county in 1877. He left a widow and seven grown children and four small ones. They all have the sympathy of the people who knew and appreciated the one whom they loved so dearly.

The funeral services were held at the family residence Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and the burial in the Odd Fellows cemetery took place at 4 o'clock. From the time the services were begun until the last sad rite had been performed the business houses of the city remained closed as a mark of respect to the memory of Capt. Ashley. The services were conducted by Rev. John Hudson, who had been a friend of the Ashley family for thirty years or longer and was a neighbor in San Saba county in the long ago.

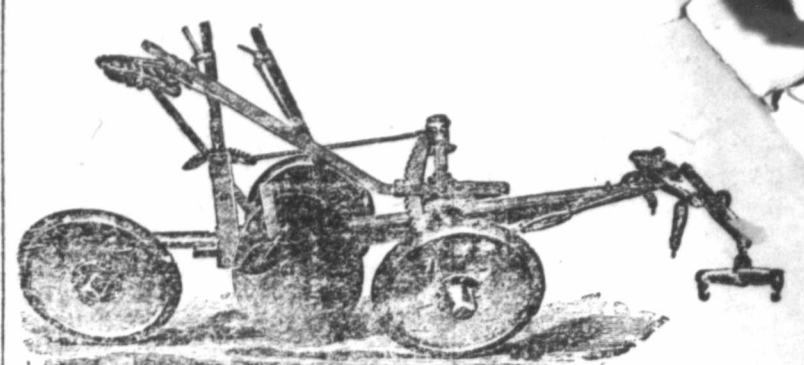

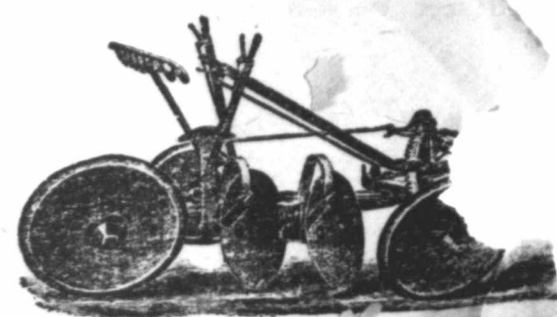

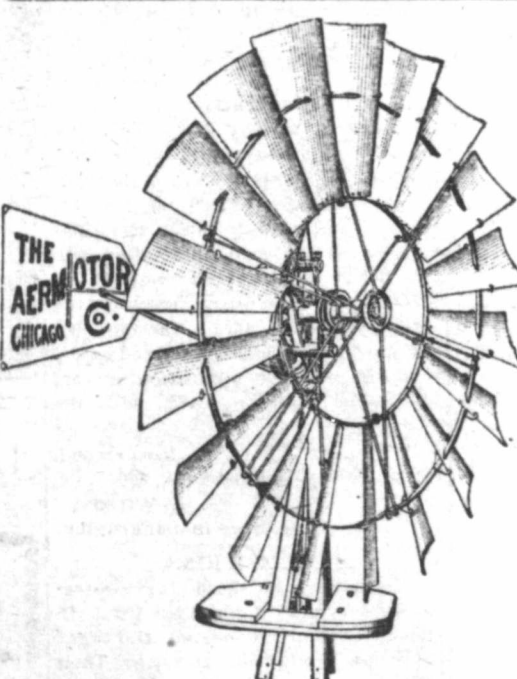
