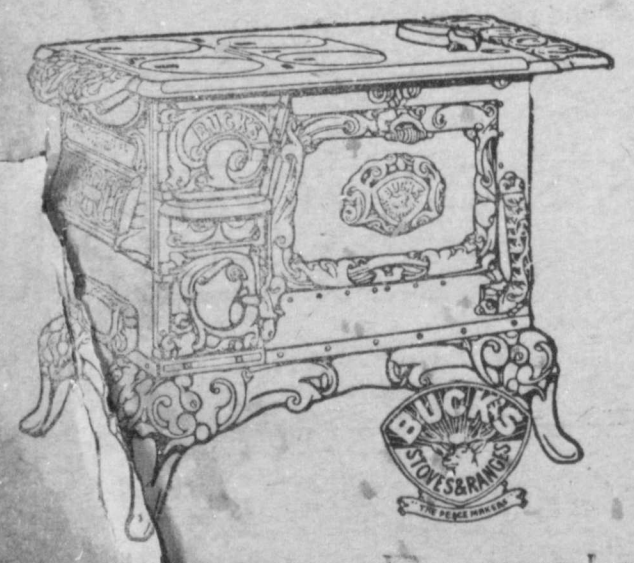

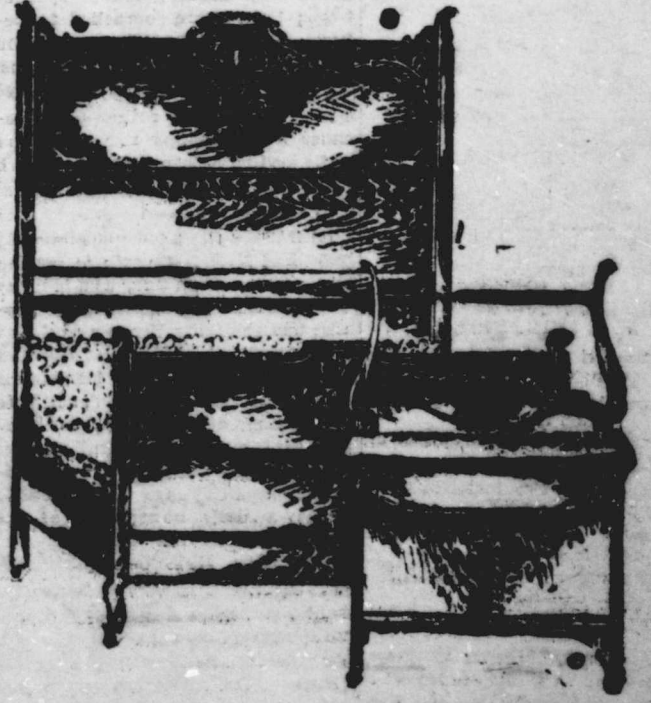

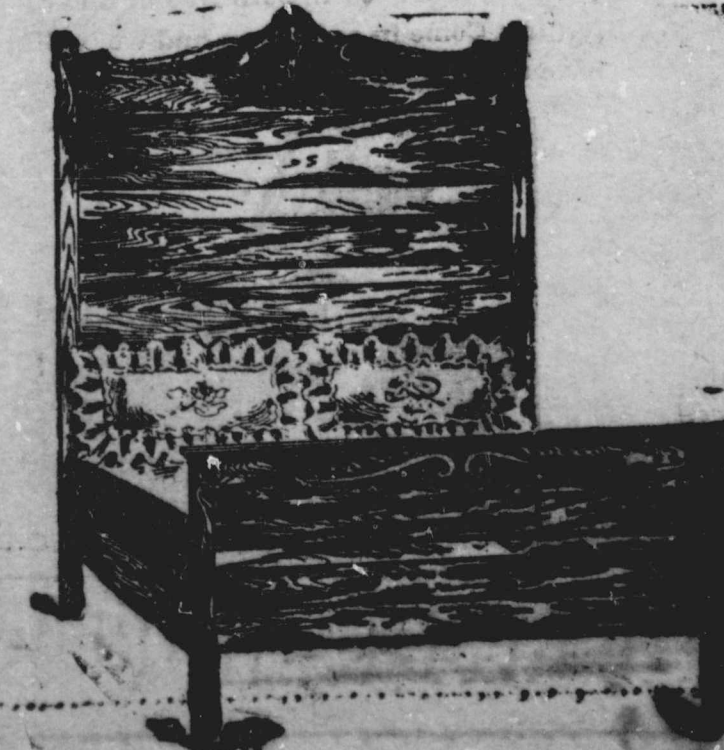

### BURNED TO DEATH.

A most distressing calamity befell the family of J. S. Evans of Teacross on Monday of this week in the burning to death of two of their three children and the loss by fire of their home and contents.

It was about 8 o'clock in the afternoon, Mr. Evans had gone with his wagon and team to the spring half a mile away after a barrel of water. When he left home his three little children, a girl of three years, a boy of two and the baby ten months old were playing in the house—a one room half dug-out—and his wife was picking cotton about two hundred yards from the house. Mr. Evans went to the spring, filled his barrel and started home. As he reached the brow of a hill and his home came in sight he saw to his horror that the house was on fire. He lashed his horses to their utmost speed and got there as soon as possible, but when he arrived it seemed too late. His wife was cowering wildly for her children and making frantic efforts to find them. He got her out of the way then rushed into the burning building. The smoke was so thick and the heat so intense that he could see nothing, he groped about the room for a few seconds then grabbed the burning bed and ran out with it in the hope that perhaps the children might have taken refuge there. He was right, the boy and the girl were in the bed, but they were tragically burned. But the baby, who was in the room for a few minutes then crawled behind the door when frightened, he reached behind the door and there was the child. He grabbed it and crawled out.

Before morning the two older children were dead, but the baby having been protected by the door was the least burned.

Neither the father nor mother were severely burned in their efforts to save their children.

The house and household goods were totally destroyed. The neighbors have been very kind to the unfortunate family, expressed deepest sympathy and have donated liberally to their assistance, and have done everything in their power to lessen their great sorrow.

The Evans home is one mile north of Teacross.

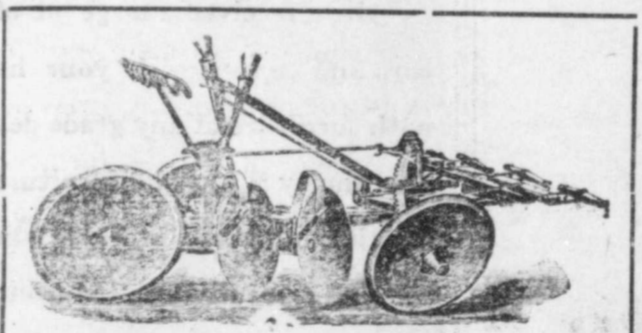
The only way the fire can be accounted for is that the box of matches had fallen from the top of the safe when the wind storm came up—Mangum, Okla., Sun Monitor.

J. S. Evans was mostly raised in the Payne Gap neighborhood and his wife on South Bennett. They have many friends and relatives in Mills county who will read with sorrow this account of their great calamity. The youngest child is in a very serious condition, and at this time Oct. 29, is not expected to live.—N. H. E.

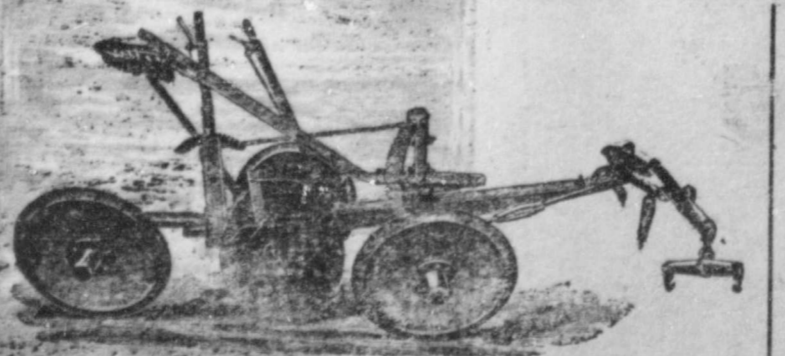
