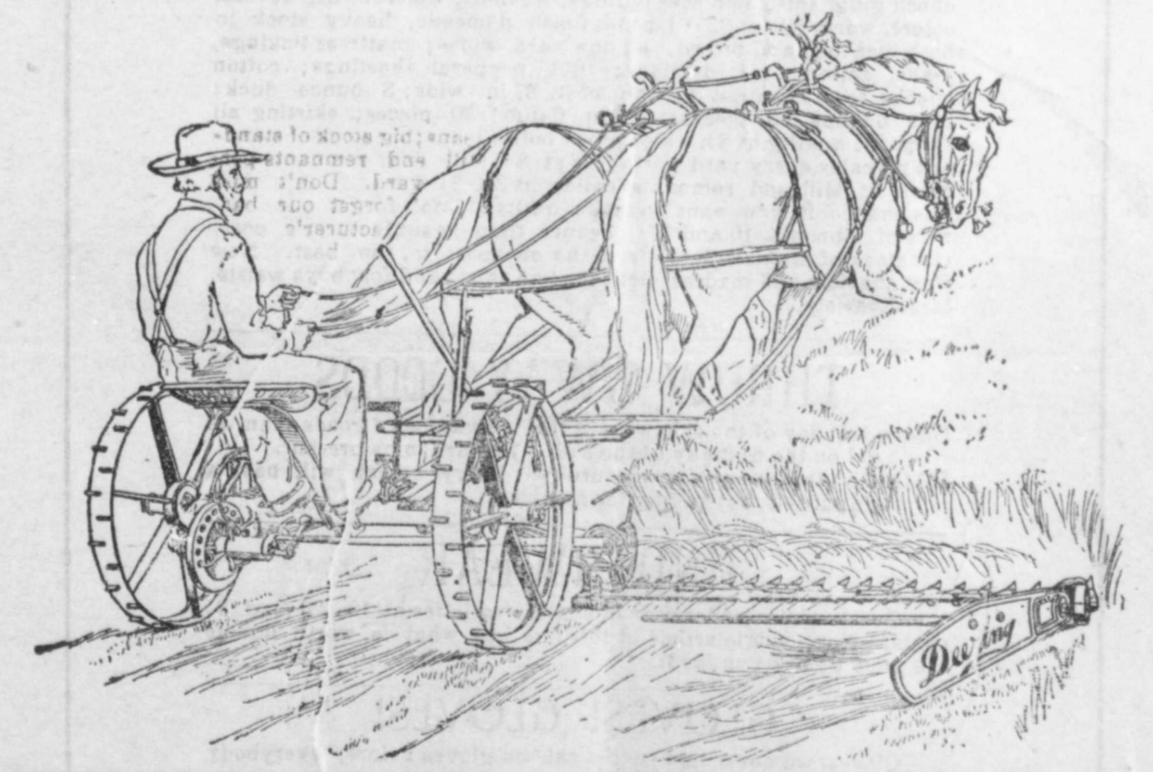

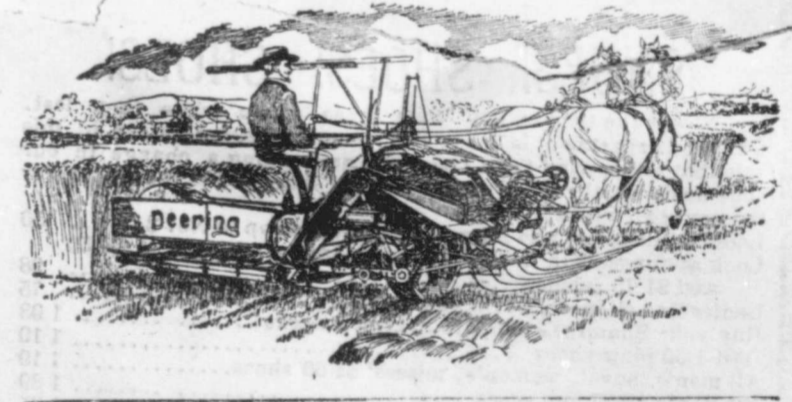

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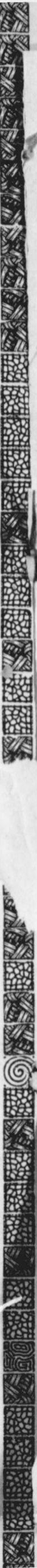

Whittie of Austin have made application to the controller of the currency for a charter to establish the First National Bank of San Saba with a capital stock of \$35,000. The above named gentleman will be the directors for the first year. Several others have small blocks of stock in the enterprise. As soon as the charter is granted and returned organization will be perfected. These men are all substantial citizens and conservative business men, and we predict success for their new enterprise. The vaults will likely be built in the Ray stone building now occupied by L. W. Rantor & Co., and the bank opened for business by April 15.—San Saba News.

A member of the Fort Worth police force arrested a man in a flat on Jackson and Lamar at an early hour Wednesday morning whom the police believe to be B. S. Wettermark, who wrecked a bank at Nacogdoches some two and a half years ago and escaped with a heavy shortage. The man got into the flat in some unknown manner. He was found by a negro employed on the place, who held the man while an officer was coming. When searched at the police station there was found on his person papers indicating that he is either W. E. Wettermark, "Winfred Wettermark" or "B. Milmo." He also had in his possession a newspaper clipping giving an account of the defalcation.

MR. STOCKBRIDGE DEAD.

After a long continued illness with dropsy Mr. J. J. Stockbridge died in this city Monday about noon and was buried Tuesday afternoon with the honors of the Odd Fellows lodge. Mr. Stockbridge was about 67 years of age and had resided here since 1835. He came to this town from San Saba, at which place he and his brother located in 1876, having moved there from Washington county. He was originally from Scranton, Pa., and moved to Texas with his mother and her family in the early days. He was district clerk of Washington county at one time and it is stated by one who knew him intimately that he was engaged to be married many years ago and that the young lady was accidentally burned to death. He was an upright man and held the respect and esteem of all who knew him. He served as postmaster here four years during President Harrison's administration and afterward located at Big Valley, where he was merchant and postmaster. He emigrated to the state of Washington a few years ago and remained there for a short time.

and when he returned he held a position in the district and county clerk's office for a long time. He was an enthusiastic lodge man and was a charter member of the Odd Fellows lodge of San Saba and later of the lodge at this place, and he also held membership in the Knights of Pythias and Red Men lodges, and was a consistent member of the Methodist church.

Everybody liked Mr. Stockbridge and it is believed to be true that not an unkind remembrance of him is entertained among all of his acquaintances. He had no relatives in this county, but his niece, Mrs. Bev. Burleson, lives at Brenham and it is understood he has some relatives living at Comanche.

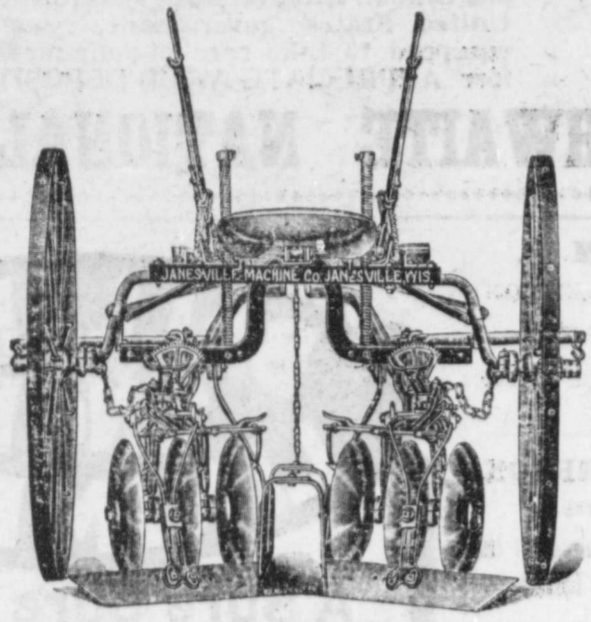

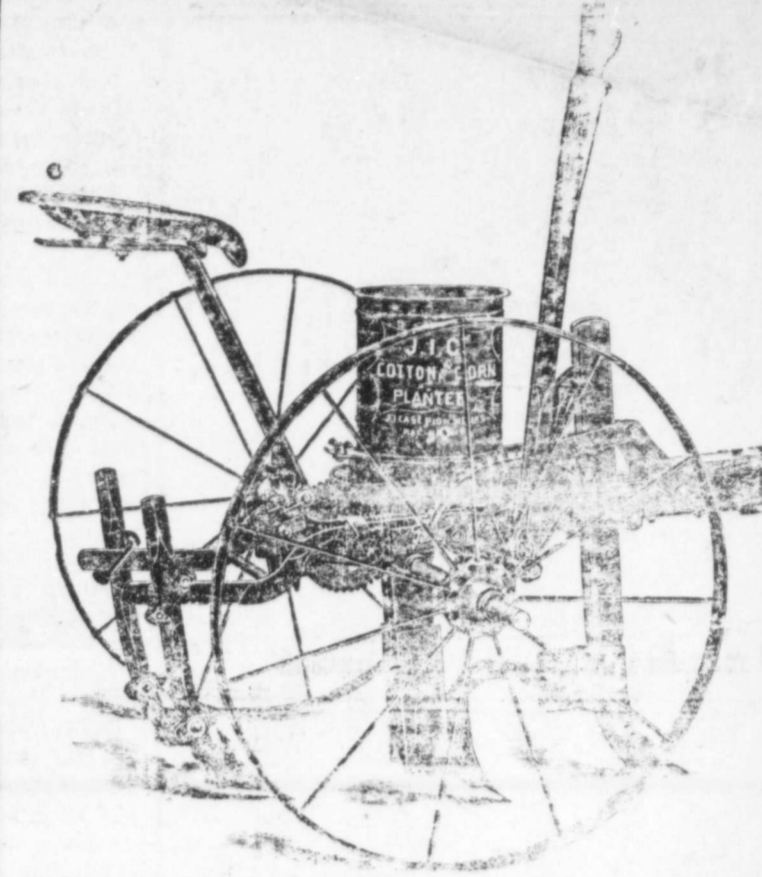
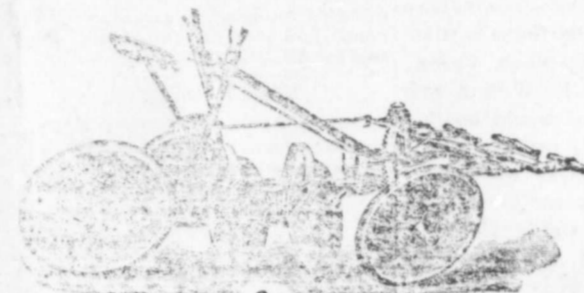
