The court of criminal appeals of Texas has decided that it is lawful to solicit orders for whisky in a local option precinct.

It is reported that when the Japanese attacked and defeated the Russians Feb. 23 at Tanikeshell twenty-five miles north of Simashion, on the extreme Japanese right, the Russians numbered 12,000 men; losses estimated at 2,000. The Japanese losses were slight.

ALLEN & FAULKNER.

A petition, signed by practically every citizen of Fremont county, Wyoming, has been forwarded to the secretary of the interior, requesting that the reclamation service be instructed to investigate a project to divert water from the north fork of the Wind river, carry it through the Owl Creek mountains and down on 200,000 acres of land in the Owl Creek valley. A. J. Parrish, reclamation service hydrographer, has recommended to the department that this be done, and the petition is to strengthen the recommendation. A large part of the land, which it is proposed to reclaim lies within the Wind river Indian reservation, which is to be thrown open to settlement next summer.—Tulsa.

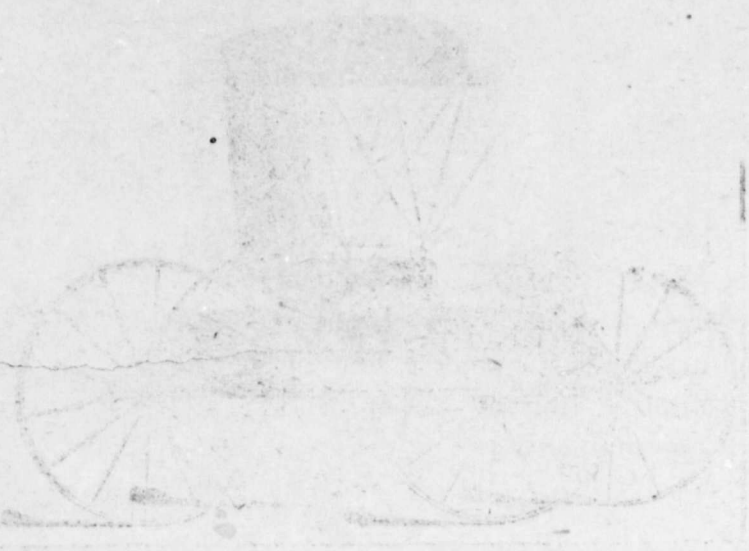

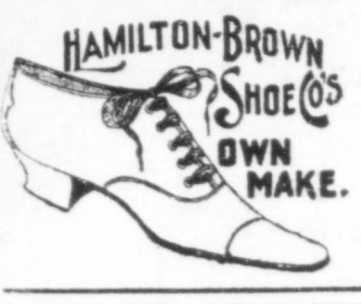

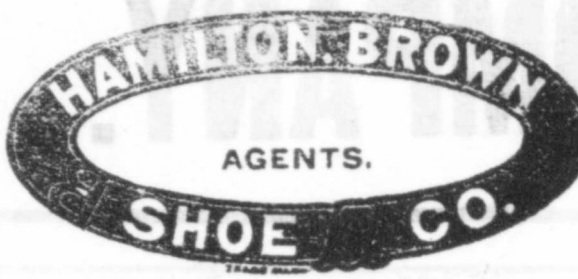

AUSTIN LETTER.

Austin, Texas, Feb. 25, 1905. The question of raising the revenue for the support of the state and to pay the present deficit is far from being settled, although the Williams bill has been passed up to the senate by the house, and no doubt other bills will be there before this is printed.

Senator Davidson has formulated a table showing the average number of students, patients, etc., in the asylums, university and Agricultural and Mechanical college to each teacher or other employe. There is one employe in the university to every ten students; in the Agricultural and Mechanical college there is one employe to each eight students. The asylums require one employe to about five or six patients.

The senate bill prohibiting any officer, county or state, from appointing any relative to a position under him has been killed by the house committee.

There are a number of bills pending having for their object the increase of the compensation of various county officers.

President Roosevelt has been officially invited to visit Texas. He is expected here about the first of April.

Out in Ochiltree county a state of rebellion against the payment of state taxes on lands bought from the state, but not yet paid for, exists. The citizens refuse to pay and the county officials back them up. To meet this particular case, a drastic measure was passed by the house and sent to the senate.

Senator Glasscock will tomorrow introduce a bill providing that where a citizen is summoned as a juror and attends, either at county or district court, he shall receive his pay as a juror even though he was not sworn in. He says as it is now, large numbers of citizens are made to go long distances and lose much time and are not sworn in and receive no pay. Mr. Glasscock says his bill, if passed, will prevent this and will make the citizens use more discretion in summoning jurors and will stop so much indiscriminate exousing of jurors.

The senate has adopted a bill prohibiting minors from entering ten pin alleys and billiard halls. This is a good bill and ought to become a law.

The house had much fun Friday out of a north Texas member, who, when the session first convened, returned with much ado the railroad passes sent him; but when the Laredo excursion came along, he got passes for himself and family, but while watching the bull fights he was "touched" by a thief, who not only got his passes but his money as well.

The proposed amendments to the Terrell election law propose to hold the primaries in May. An effort will be made to put them in July.
