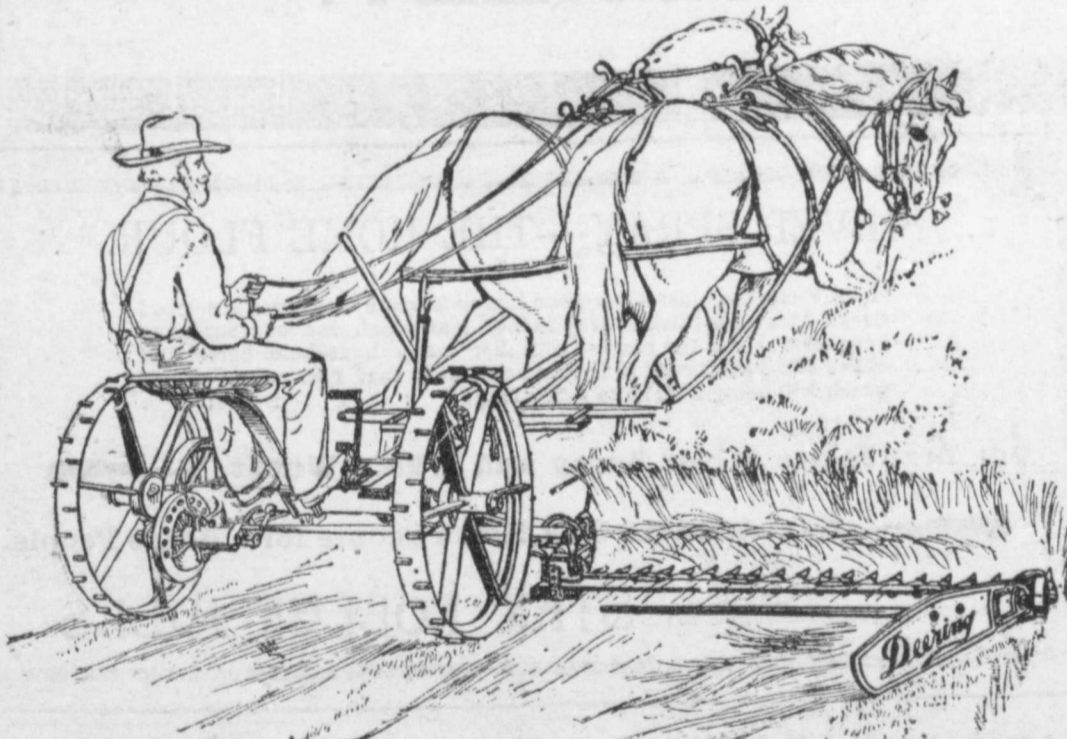

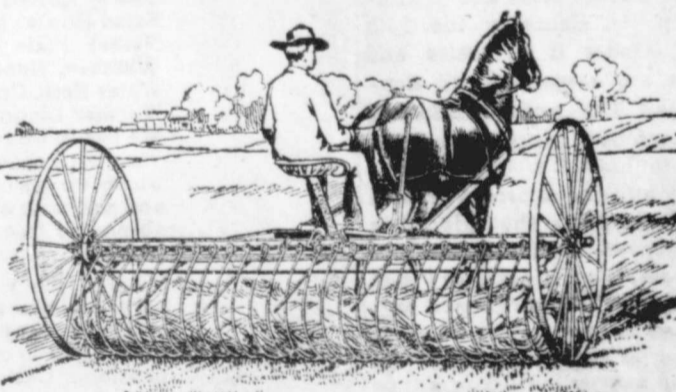

The new residence of Mr. B. R. Brown is nearing completion.

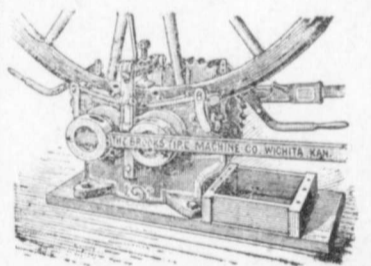
There was a heavy hail storm in the neighborhood of Zephyr last Sunday. J. L. King's fruit crop was badly damaged.
