FIRE WORKS LAW.

Art. 336 of the Penal Code of the State of Texas, Acts of the 27th Legislature: "If any person shall discharge any gun or pistol or firearms of any description, or shall discharge any cannon or torpedó on or near any public square, street or way in any city, town or village, or on any street or within one hundred feet of any business house in this state, he shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred dollars."

County Attorney Pribble states that he expects to strictly enforce this law and all parties are placed on notice of his intention.
