
The supreme court of the United States Monday affirmed with costs the case of the Gulf, Colorado & Santa Fe railway against the State of Texas, appealed by the plaintiff from the supreme court of Texas. The suit was instituted by the state to recover a penalty upon the allegation that the railway company had charged a higher rate than that fixed by the railroad commission on car of corn from Texarkana to Goldthwaite. The sole defense was that the shipment was interstate and not subject to the commission. Judgment and penalty of \$100 was adjudged against plaintiff on the finding of the fact that the shipment was entirely within the state.

Thursday morning at or near 4 o'clock W. P. Cook's dwelling house was torn to pieces by an explosion, supposed to have been from dynamite.

Mrs. M. Ray, wife of Rev. M. Ray who was for a long time Baptist county missionary, died at Shive in Hamilton county last week. Mrs. Ray had been an invalid for a number of years.

G. A. Chilton informs us that he has bought from J. N. Farmer a lot 200x900 feet for the McFadden Bros. to build a compression on. This land is just west of the blue gin on the north side of the Frisco track.

J. F. Albin died Wednesday at Terrell and his remains reached Comanche Thursday morning for interment. Mr. Albin had stomach trouble and could get no relief at home and requested that he be sent off for treatment.

Rob E. Downey, editor of the Gustine Gazette called to see us Tuesday. Mr. Downey has lately bought the Gazette and has moved it into a home of his own. He is very much pleased with the Gustine country and people and sees a bright future for the Gazette, here's hoping. —Chief Brownwood.

Ed Green, one of the oldest citizens of Brownwood, died Wednesday morning at his home. The farm house of Mr. Gimble near the county poor farm was destroyed by fire Sunday night.

At the home of the bride in Richland Springs Tuesday Mr. Theo. Schumann and Miss Roxy Taylor were quietly married in the presence of a few friends and relatives.

Chas. Price, a young man just about grown, who lives eight miles out on the Salt creek road, was quite seriously wounded on Sunday morning by the accidental discharge of a shot gun in the hands of a companion.

Rev. Sterling Park of Jacksonville, Texas, preached at the Austin avenue church Sunday, and at a meeting of the elders Rev. Park was called to the pastorate of that church. The call has been accepted.

Tuesday afternoon at about 2

o'clock a bridge across Adams road and one end dropped about three feet. A loaded wagon had just passed over when the bridge fell, but there was no one on the bridge at the time.

It will be sad news to the many friends of the excellent young man, Hayter Martin, to learn of his death which occurred at Tulla, Texas, on last Friday. Hayter Martin formerly lived in Brown county where he was known and liked by many.

Fire causing a loss of \$10,000 or more occurred at the Farmers Union gin Monday morning between 11 and 12 o'clock. The gin house, cotton seed house and a storage shed for bagging and ties were destroyed almost in the twinkling of an eye. The fire caught from friction in the gin stand and despite the efforts of the crew spread rapidly until the entire building was a mass of flames. —Bulletin.

L. A. Reed and son Charles, recently of Llano country, and Dick B. Taylor, of San Saba, have leased the store room of the Masonic building and in a few days will open in it a stock of groceries.

The valuable surry horse belonging to J. D. Eslop strayed away from home last Sunday night and was found Monday in the San Saba river above the Beveridge bridge at which point he, by some means or other, got in a deep hole of water and was drowned. —News.

THINGS IN GENERAL.

Elma Dare, charged with kidnapping George Rhodus, a millionaire who is said to be feeble-minded, at Indianapolis Jan 21, and marrying him in Louisville, Ky., has been arrested at the Todd's sanitarium, Cambridge Springs, Pa.

A citizen of Bangs was saved from being robbed in Brownwood Friday night by the timely appearance of officers. Two men discovered he had money and one pretended to fight him while the other went into his pockets and took a purse containing \$146 Deputy Marshal Champion happened up in time to get the purse and money.

Four Greek section hands were fined in the recorder's court in Corsicana for playing cards in a public place. The men, who seemed ignorant of our gaming laws, spread out a blanket on the sidewalk of one of the main residence streets and in the glare of the noonday sun proceeded to play a game of poker.

J. A. Williams & Co., have sold for J. B. Murrah of San Angelo, to W. W. and J. H. O'Harrow of Stratford, Texas, 7700 acres of land, situated in Schleicher county, and known as the J. B. Murrah ranch, for a consideration of \$4 per acre. Included in the deal is the sale of 500 head of stock cattle, being all cattle owned by J. B. Murrah, at \$16 around, and eight registered Red Poll bulls at \$70 per head. Also included is the sale of 1100 sheep at \$4 per head. The items making up the sale of this property total \$44,300.—San Angelo Standard.

A log wagon and a four mule team fell through the Walters bridge over Sabine river, two miles south of Big Sandy Saturday. The wagon was loaded with heavy gum logs. The forty foot span in the middle of the bridge gave way and the wagon and four mules with the driver, all fell a distance of thirty-five feet and plunged into water twelve to fifteen feet deep. The driver's foot hung in the saddle and harness of the mule he was riding and he had to struggle in the water for ten minutes before disentangling himself. The strange feature in this accident is that the rider and all the mules escaped alive and even, no mule badly hurt.

To the Unknown Owners, Greeting: Whereas, The State of Texas, through its County Attorney, did, on the 21st day of February 1907, file in the district court of Mills County, in the State of Texas, its petition in suit No. 950 on the civil docket of said court, being suit brought by said State of Texas, as plaintiff, against the unknown owners of Lot No. 10 in block No. 37 in the city of Goldthwaite, Mills County, Texas, as defendants, and the nature of the plaintiff's demand as stated in the said petition being an action to recover of the defendants as the owners of the lands returned delinquent (or reported delinquent to the State for the taxes due thereon for the years 1896, 1897, 1898, 1899, 1900, 1901, 1902, 1903, 1904, and 1905, and, whereas, the said owners are non-residents of the State of Texas (or the names of said owners are unknown), and upon the affidavit of A. T. Pribble, County Attorney, having been made, setting forth that said owners are non-residents of the State of Texas (or the names of said owners are unknown to the affiant, as the Attorney for the State of Texas, and after inquiry not ascertained).

There are, therefore, to cite all interested parties and to make parties defendant by notice, in the name of the State of Texas, and the County of Mills, directed to all persons owning or being in any way interested in the lands delinquent to the State and County for taxes, to be published in a newspaper in said County one time a week for three consecutive weeks, in the manner and style following:


