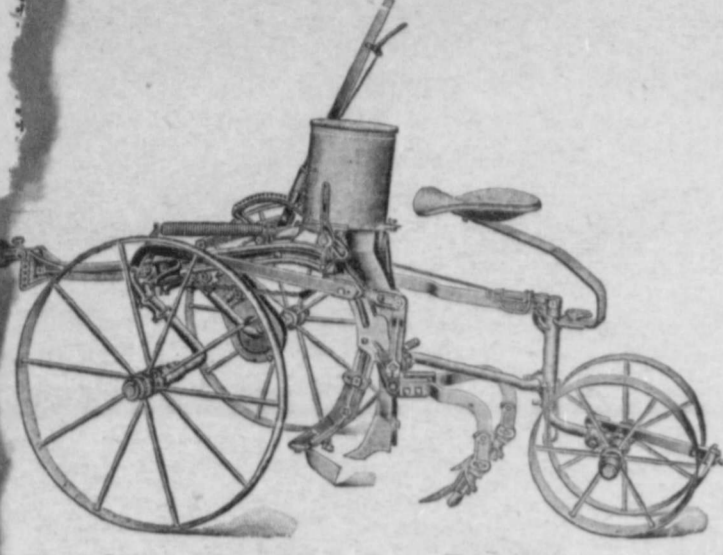

EDUCATIONAL RALLY.

The Educational Rally at Center City was a decided success. Bro. J. H. Smith and the writer met a fine crowd of young people Friday night, and Bro. Smith sang with them and the writer talked to them upon the "Importance of seeking the Lord now."

Saturday morning Brethren Wilson Fielder and Thad Carter of Brownwood and Bro. J. F. Jackson of Goldthwaite arrived upon the scene of action. Many Christian young men and young women who were not active Christian workers before they went there, became active in the work of the Lord. The teachers are Christ-ians, the Bible is taught, and a religious atmosphere surrounds and pervades the schools. This must surely have an influence over the lives of the students who come into it.
 4. That these schools are all crowded to their fullest capacity, and in order to do the work required of them they must have more room, better equipments for the comfort and convenience of the students, and more dormitories. All of these things will be provided, and then our schools, will later on be endowed, because they have behind them the Baptists of Texas, who are a mighty and determined host, and have struck the word "fail" out of their vocabulary.
- The Sunday services were well attended and enjoyed by all. At 10 o'clock Bro. Fielder made a very earnest talk on the Sunday school work. At 11 o'clock we had a talk on "Christian Education" followed by an offering for the schools. Amount raised \$210. There were services in the afternoon and at night. Center City is a fine place for rallies.

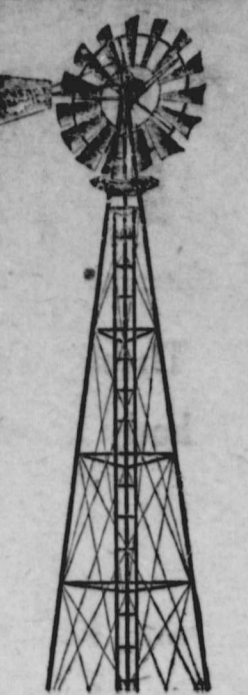

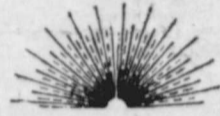
