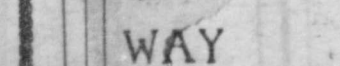

The surveying party, headed by Capt. McKewen Johnson, will move their camp this week to the Leon and will get into Hamilton likely some time next week. The work of grading is being pushed right along and everything is being adjusted to the new conditions that will soon take the place of the old order of things.—Herald.

#### LOMETA.

Miss Lou Patterson was burned to death at Nix, February 26. It seems that she had set fire to some grass in a pasture and before she could get out of reach of the flames her clothing caught fire with the above result. She ceased to breathe at 60 and 70 years old.—Reporter.

The negro women in Brownwood have formed a washer-woman's union and raised the price of washing.

#### THINGS IN GENERAL.

Alvia Strickland, a workman employed in the cement works in West Dallas, met a horrible death Monday morning while attempting to start a huge stone-crushing machine. His arms became entangled in a rope attached to the belt of the machine and both arms were pulled from the body at the shoulders. The victim's chest was crushed in and the body was otherwise mutilated.

Knoxville, Tenn., by a majority of nearly 3,000 votes decided Monday that the saloons must go. Under a state law granting incorporated cities the right to say whether or not they desire saloons, an election was held as an expression of sentiment. The legislature re-convenes this week following a recess and a bill will be introduced abolishing the present charter and re-incorporating without saloons. Five thousand women and children paraded the streets before the polls.

Is the matter of the Sonnen-thell-Holbrook company vs. the four express companies doing business in Texas, which is better known as the "C. O. D." case, now pending in the United States court in Dallas Judge Meek states that he can not render his final opinion in the case and will await the action taken in similar cases in New Orleans and Kansas City, also that he may further delay an opinion until he knows what action the Texas legislature may take.

Northern Wyoming is threatened with another range war between the cattle and sheepmen. Closely following the attack on the Wigner camp last week, in which 400 head of sheep were killed and the camps burned, comes the report of a greater outrage in Owl Creek county. The Hugh Duckey sheep camp was attacked by a band of twelve masked men supposed to be in the employ of the cattlemen. The raiders drove off the sheep herders with threats of death, fired the camp outfit and then began shooting sheep. Out of a total of 6,000 sheep in the band 4,000 have disappeared, supposed to have been killed.

**PUBLIC LANDS.**  
 Following is a copy of a letter Capt. D. T. Bush has written to Hon. P. H. Clements regarding the condition of the public lands in Texas:

GOLDTHWAITE, March 13, 1907.  
 Hon. P. H. Clements, Austin, Texas.  
 DEAR SIR— I have watched with a great deal of concern the acts of the 30th legislature, but have failed to notice so far what, if anything, has been done in regard to the public land laws. Having made this matter a study and having made a trip to the school land district, as you will no doubt remember, and while here learned in a general way how the public lands are being gobbled up by the big cattle men and others with means. I thought it would not be amiss to write you concerning the situation as I see it. The men who hold leases hire Mexicans, negroes or white men—any one whom they can get, to take up lands in their pastures and make them sign written agreements to live on the lands the required time, three years, and then prove up and relinquish their claims to them, the government or the lease holders. But you say the man who takes up public land must take an oath that he wants land for a home and is not in collusion with any one else. So he does, and right there is where the big man gets his great advantage, for if at the expiration of the required time Mr. Settler does not do as per agreement with his employer, he is informed that he will be sent up for false swearing, which invariably brings him to terms, as you see the big man has all the advantage. Everything to gain and nothing to lose. This is not all nor the worst part. But before I proceed further, I will give you the parties above mentioned as land grabbers and dupes. Land grabber dictates where dupe shall take his lands, designates certain fractions of sections, within five miles of the one designated as the home section, having him to take one-fourth of one section, one-eighth of another and one-half of another and so on until he gets the allowed four sections, but in so doing cuts and haggles it up so as to make the balance of the sections that he has out parts off of undesirable for other actual settlers. An actual settler prefers his land as near in a body as possible, and also land grabber makes the impression with the land department that the best part of the land is taken up, and that is exactly what he wants, as he can re-lease what is not taken up at a lower price.

Another matter that I believe should be attended to, is to lower the amount of improvements required by law, to be put on lands while it is to the settlers interest I mean the bonafide settler not the dupe, to put as much improvements on the land as he is able, yet a great number are not able. I think \$150 for four sections is all that should be required, and also the settler should be allowed to be off of land without forfeiting his claim, when necessary for the maintenance of his family. If you have any doubts about the conditions being as stated, go or send a man and investigate, but don't let the land grabber know your business. There have been hundreds of thousands of acres gobbled up as above stated. I think it should be investigated, and land recovered for those it was intended for the homeless.

There is yet another matter I would call your attention to that as before stated an actual settler wants his land as near in one body as possible. As the law now is you bid by sections, and may not get but one, other bidders getting the other three, and probably all of the other public lands in the required five miles limit, and so out you off with only one section, which is not enough in that arid country.

Four sections is not too much. If you will get a list of the lands as they come on the market, and notice where land has been taken, there being only parts of sections left in certain leases close together, you will see that I have given you the facts. There has never been in any county, a worse condition of affairs, a greater graft or steal, than has been going on and is still going on, and if something is not done, will continue to go on, until the last acre of the public lands, which was intended for the homeless is gone from state control. If the legislature would pass a law exempting dupes from punishment, where he has gone into an agreement, with the land grabber, then it would be easier to correct this evil.
