PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION FIXING THE SALARY OF MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE.

An Act to amend Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the state of Texas, relating to the compensation of members of the legislature

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the Constitution of the state of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 24. The members of the legislature shall receive from the public treasury such compensation for their services as may from time to time be provided by law, not to exceed one thousand dollars for each year in which a biennial session of the legislature is held under the provisions of this constitution, and five dollars for each day of any special session held during the subsequent year, and in addition thereto, they shall receive mileage in going to and returning from the state capitol, not to exceed three cents per mile; the distance to be computed by the nearest railroad route, and the comptroller shall prepare and preserve a table of distances for each county sent now or hereafter to be established, and by such table the mileage of each member shall be paid; no member shall be entitled to mileage for any extra session that may be called within one day after the adjournment of a regular or called session.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday in August, 1907, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words: "For the amendment to Section 24 of article III of the constitution, relating to the salary of the members of the legislature," and all those opposed, shall have written or printed on their ballots, the words, "Against the amendment to Section 24 of article III of the constitution, relating to the salary of the members of the legislature."

Sec. 3. The governor of the state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of the state, and the sum of \$1000 or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the general revenue of the state not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election. L. T. DASHIELL, Secretary of State.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A STATE PRINTING PLANT.

Joint resolution authorizing the submission to a vote of the people of the state of Texas of a proposed amendment of Section 21, Article XVI, of the constitution of the state of Texas, relating to printing, publishing, stationery, paper and fuel, and making an appropriation therefor.

Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 21 of Article XVI of the constitution of the state of Texas be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 21. All printing and publications, and all stationery, paper and fuel for the various departments, and for all offices, whether created by this constitution or by law, shall be done and supplied as may be provided by law, and for the accomplishment of these objects and purposes the legislature may provide and establish all requisite means and agencies, invested with such powers as may be deemed adequate and advisable.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words, "For the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel," and all those opposed shall write or have printed on their ballots the words "Against the amendment to Section 21 of Article XVI of the constitution, relating to stationery, printing, paper and fuel."

Sec. 3. The governor of the state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and to have the same published as required by the constitution and existing laws of the state.

Sec. 4. That the sum of two thousand (\$2000) dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election. L. T. DASHIELL, Secretary of State.

Meeting of Medical Examiners.

The last meeting of the board of medical examiners for the state of Texas (regular) for examination will be held in Austin, Texas, June 25th, 26th and 27th, 1907. This examination will be held in accordance with the old medical law of Texas and will be the last meeting of this board for examination, as the new medical law of Texas, the one board bill, becomes effective on the 13th day of July and under the provisions of this law applicants will only be permitted to appear for examination who are graduates from medical colleges of not less than four terms of five months each.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF IMPROVEMENT DISTRICTS IN CERTAIN CITIES.

Joint resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the constitution of the state of Texas, providing for the creation of improvement districts in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants, and charging the cost of certain improvements made therein against the abutting property.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of Texas: That Section 9 of Article 8 of the constitution of the state of Texas, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 9. The state tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy more than twenty-five cents for city or county purposes, and not exceeding fifteen cents for roads and bridges and not exceeding fifteen cents to pay jurors, on the one hundred dollars valuation, except for payment of debts incurred prior to the adoption of the amendment September 25, A. D. 1883, and for the erection of public buildings, streets, sewers, water works and other permanent improvements, not to exceed twenty-five cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, in any one year, and except as in this constitution otherwise provided; and the legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation, of the property subject to taxation in such county. And the legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws.

In addition to the foregoing, cities of more than five thousand inhabitants may lay out within their corporate limits, improvement districts in which they, by and with the consent of a majority of the tax payers owning real estate therein, may build sidewalks and charge the cost thereof against the abutting property, and may build sewers and pave streets and charge one-third of the cost thereof against the abutting property on either side of the streets upon which such improvements are made in such district, and the amount charged against all such abutting property, shall be deemed and held to be a tax against and a lien upon such abutting property, and the legislature is required to enact laws prescribing the means for ascertaining the amount properly chargeable against each parcel of abutting property, and providing for the enforcement of its collection.

Sec. 2. The governor is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for submitting this amendment to the constitution to the qualified voters of the state of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, A. D. 1907, at which election all voters favoring this amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots: "For the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street." And the voters opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots the following: "Against the amendment to Section 9 of Article 8 of the constitution, permitting property owners in cities of more than five thousand inhabitants to create improvement districts, one-third the cost of which to be charged against abutting property on either side of the street."

Sec. 3. The lateness in the session, the crowded condition of the calendars of both houses, and the importance of this proposed amendment, create an emergency and an imperative public necessity demanding that the constitutional rule, and Senate Rule No. 37, requiring bills to be read on three several days be suspended, and the same are hereby suspended. PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A HOME FOR CONFEDERATE WIDOWS.

Joint resolution to amend Section 51 of Article 3 of the constitution of the state of Texas, as amended in 1903, so as to authorize the grant of aid in the establishment and maintenance of a home for the disabled and dependent wives and widows of Confederate soldiers and sailors and such women as aided the Confederacy, and making an appropriation.

Section 1. Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of Texas: That Section 51 of Article 3 of the constitution of the state of Texas, as amended in 1903, be so amended as to hereafter read as follows:

Article 3. Section 51. The legislature shall have no power to make any grant or authorize the making of any grant of public money to any individual, associations or individuals, municipal or other corporations whatsoever; provided, however, the legislature may grant aid to indigent and disabled Confederate soldiers and sailors who came to Texas prior to January 1, 1880, and who are either over sixty years of age or whose disability is the proximate result of actual service in the Confederate army for a period of at least three months, their widows in indigent circumstances who have never remarried and who have been bona fide residents of the state of Texas since March 1, 1880, and who were married to such soldiers anterior to March 1, 1880; provided said aid shall not exceed eight dollars per month and provided further, that no appropriations shall ever be made for the purpose hereinbefore specified in excess of five hundred thousand dollars for any one year. And also grant aid to the establishment and maintenance of a home for said soldiers and sailors, their wives and widows and women who aided in the Confederacy, under such regulations and limitations as may be provided by law; provided the grant to aid said home shall not exceed one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for any one year, and no inmate of said home shall be entitled to any other aid from the state; the legislature may provide for husband and wife to remain together in the home; and provided further, that the provisions of this section shall not be construed to prevent the grant of aid in case of public calamity.

Sec. 2. The governor of the state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for the submission of this amendment to the qualified voters of the state of Texas on the first Tuesday in August, 1907.

The sum of \$5000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated to pay the expenses of carrying out the provisions of this resolution. L. T. DASHIELL, Secretary of State.

City Council.

The Goldthwaite city council met in regular session Monday night and transacted considerable important business.

City Attorney Doughty was employed to pass on the legality of all ordinances heretofore adopted by the council. He was also instructed to draw up an ordinance prohibiting the feeding of stock along the sidewalks in the business portion of town and one to prohibit the burning of paper and other waste in the streets and alleys of the business district.

The city marshal was instructed to warn out the hands subject to road duty for work on the streets of the city.

It was decided to make passable the crossing of the branch near the Presbyterian church on Reynolds street.

A contract was made for the purchase of 50 acres of land out of section 53, between the South Bennett and Payne roads, to be used for a dumping ground for the city. The price paid was \$10 per acre.

The street committee was instructed to arrange with E. L. Martin for the use of his lot south of the Catholic church, for impounding stock found at large in the city.

It was decided to open Parker street from J. D. Urquhart's place to the city limits.

The account of John Burrows for \$2 50 and that of Frank Melton for 35 cents were approved and ordered paid.

The council decided to meet hereafter on the first and third Monday nights in each month.

Irrigation Meeting.

The San Saba-Colorado Irrigation association met at the court house Saturday evening, with a small attendance and several subjects were discussed with interest and benefit to all present. Some of the subjects discussed were celery growing for market, does it pay to transplant onions with our present labor conditions, growing pepper for market, the produce market, and are we living up to our opportunities.

At the next meeting will be discussed Irish potatoes as a money crop, the possibilities of corn growing under irrigation, alfalfa as the solution of the feed problem, and how much water is an irrigation. There are some experiments under way on some of the subjects mentioned above, and one on how much water do we use at each irrigation. The results will be given at our next meeting. The Eagle this week received a card announcing the approaching marriage of Miss Mattie Leah McDonald to Mr. A. S. Burger at the Baptist church in Pidcoke Wednesday afternoon, June 12. The bride-to-be is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. O. McDonald of Pidcoke and has a number of friends and acquaintances in Mullin. Mr. Burger is the well-known, talented and popular editor of the Mullin Enterprise and is one of the best of men. The Eagle extends hearty congratulations and good wishes to the young people.

County Court Results.

The business disposed of at the last term of the County Court was quite surprising. It being the first term ever held by the officers, it was naturally supposed that it would come rather awkward. But instead there were fourteen cases tried which were contested, and five acquittals and five convictions and four hung juries. There were eight pleas of guilty, and the amount of fines imposed, which go into the County treasury, less 20 per cent., was \$220.00.

The acquittals were all in local option cases, except one, which after hearing the evidence, was dismissed because no guilt was shown.

There were eight of the local option cases tried, four of which resulted in acquittals, and four were hung juries and one conviction, one of the cases was tried twice and resulted in a hung jury both times. The conviction was set aside by the court with the consent of Mr. Rice, who was employed by the prohibitionists to prosecute. The new trial granted in this case was on account of a mistake in the special charge prepared for the court by Mr. Rice. When the defendant's motion for a new trial was presented, Mr. Rice very frankly admitted that the mistake was his, and that the motion must be granted.

There were eight of the local option cases dismissed by Mr. Rice on account of the indictments being drawn under the county election instead of the Goldthwaite precinct election; four others were dismissed by Mr. Rice on account of the lack of evidence; it being generally conceded that the county election will not stand the test in the courts prior to the publication of an order by the judge last March. All these eight indictments were found by the grand jury in the district court in 1905 under the county election. A new indictment for the same offense was found by the last grand jury in only one of the cases; and by common consent of all parties interested, Mr. Pribble and Mr. Rice dismissed them, no attempt being made to prove the county election to be in force in any of the cases prior to last March.

Mullin.

From the Enterprise.

A slow rain fell throughout this section Thursday. This rain will do a lot of good, as it fell at right time for corn and cotton, and will put the finishing touches to the oats.

Mullin is to have a nine months term of school this year. Where there is a will there is a way. One day this week several of our "get up and hustle" business men figured what a nine months school would cost Mullin and found that they were short \$700. A petition was drawn up and circulated, and the required sum was subscribed in less than three hours.

Business Men Coming.

The trade excursion of the Waco business men will pass through Goldthwaite about 1 o'clock June 6 enroute to San Angelo and will take dinner here. Returning they will eat supper here on the evening of the 7th and it is proposed by Mayor Smith and others to provide some entertainment for them at this time. The matter will be brought before the Goldthwaite board of trade Monday afternoon and plans will then be formulated. All the business men of the town should be present at this meeting.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION CREATING THE OFFICE OF COMMISSIONER OF AGRICULTURE.

Joint resolution proposing an amendment to Article four (4) of the constitution of the state of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 27, providing for a department of Agriculture, with a bureau of labor.

Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of Texas:

Section 1. That Article four (4) of the constitution of the state of Texas, be amended by adding thereto Section 27, when a majority of the qualified electors for members of the legislature of Texas at an election for that purpose shall vote in favor of the amendment, shall read as follows: Section 27. The legislature shall provide for the office of commissioner of agriculture, who shall be either elected by the qualified voters of the state, or appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the senate, as the legislature may provide; whose term of office, duties and salary shall be prescribed by law; in which department there shall be established by the legislature a bureau of labor, when required by the public interest.

Sec. 2. The governor of this state is hereby directed to issue and have published the necessary proclamation for the submission of this resolution to the qualified voters for members of the legislature of the state of Texas, as an amendment to the constitution of Texas, to be voted upon on the first Tuesday in August, 1907. All persons favoring said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "For the amendment to the constitution, providing for a department of agriculture and a bureau of labor." And those opposed to said amendment shall have written or printed on their ballots, as follows: "Against the amendment to the constitution, providing for a department of agriculture and a bureau of labor." And the sum of (\$2000) two thousand dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state of Texas, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publications, proclamation and election.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION AUTHORIZING THE LEVY OF A ROAD TAX.

Joint resolution amending Section 9, of Article 8, of the constitution of the state of Texas, by adding thereto a section to be known as Section 9a, increasing the amount of tax that may be voted for the purpose of improving public roads, and to allow counties or political subdivisions of counties by a majority vote of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county, or subdivision thereof, voting at all elections, to be held for that purpose, to adopt same.

Be it resolved by the legislature of the state of Texas:

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article 8 of the constitution of the state of Texas be amended by adding thereto Section 9a, which shall read as follows:

Section 9a. A majority of the property tax paying voters in any county or one or more political subdivisions thereof, in this state, voting at an election held for that purpose may vote a tax for road and bridge purposes not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 valuation of property subject to taxation in such county or political subdivision of such county, or may issue bonds not to exceed 20 per cent of the assessed value of the real property in such district, for such road and bridge purposes, provided that such tax, or proceeds of such bonds, shall be expended in the territory in which it is voted, and no other, and this provision of the constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation.

Sec. 2. The governor of this state is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation submitting this amendment to the qualified voters of Texas at the next general election held in this state, or in case any previous election shall be had in the state for other purposes, then this proposed amendment shall be submitted to the qualified tax paying voters. And the sum of \$2000, or so much thereof as shall be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of the treasury of the state of Texas for the purpose of submitting this proposition to a vote of the people of the state of Texas.

Dr. A. D. Nelson was here from Richland Springs the first of the week visiting relatives and friends and made it convenient to renew for the Eagle.

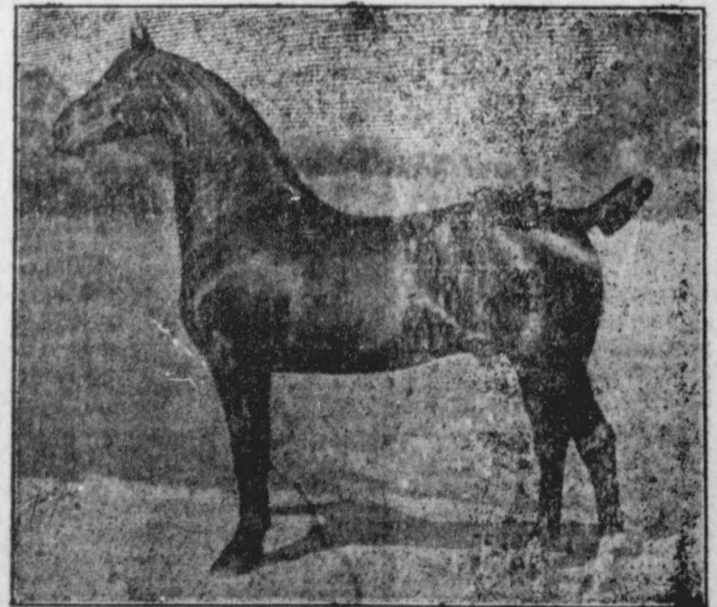
Allen W. Bulay writes to have the Eagle sent to him at Huntville, where he will attend the summer school and remain for the regular session of the Sam Houston Normal.
