Prohibition elections were held in Eastland and McCulloch counties last Saturday and the prohibitionist were successful in each county by a good majority. These counties have been in the dry column the past several years.

The second trial of Cal Woodward at Burnet last week resulted in a verdict of 5 years in the penitentiary. E. W. Yardley was next tried and the jury returned a verdict against him for 2 years in the penitentiary. Whether the cases will be appealed or not we have not learned. The witnesses who were held for two weeks at Burnet all returned home Sunday and they all seemed glad to get back.—San Saba Star.

A deputy collector of internal revenue says that he had received analysis of some of the smoking tobacco in bags put up by some factories. The analysis was made by the government and show that the tobacco only contains 27 per cent real tobacco, while the other is alfalfa, arsenic and fluids. The exact proportion given in the analysis is 27 per cent tobacco, 93 per cent alfalfa, 6 per cent arsenic, 1 per cent and a per cent fluids.—San Antonio Express.

A young lady of Baltimore, Md., pleaded guilty in the United States court to note raising and was sentenced to five years in the jail at hard labor. Miss Bond was treasurer of the conference of the Union Central Methodist Episcopal church, South, of Baltimore. She raised a \$10 bank note to \$100 with diphers cut from other notes, and turned over the bill to the pastor of the church as part of the conference fund. The imposition was detected when the pastor attempted to deposit the money.

A rich find of asphaltum been unearthed at Zephyr in a very accidental manner. A well was being bored on the place of G. W. Hill and the drill encountered a vein of asphaltum which is now believed to be from eight to twelve feet in depth and its width has not yet been ascertained. The asphaltum is almost absolutely pure and is as good a sample as was ever found in the state. Messrs L. E. and J. L. Hill, who were boring the well, came to Brownwood this morning and brought samples of the find and were pronounced by several experts to be the finest specimens. The ore resembles tar and when a flame was applied it burned readily. Asphaltum is becoming a commercial commodity of rare importance and is used in the building of streets, roofing and many other enterprises.—Brownwood Bulletin.

A university of industry, science and art is to be established at Grand Junction, Colorado, and supported by the Carnegie foundation fund. The initial endowment, it is said, will be \$500,000 and the total cost will be \$1,500,000. The new university is to be known as the Western University.

Col. T. L. Johnston has removed to Seguin the old Alamo bell from San Antonio, owing to the marriage of Miss Florence Eagle, to whom, as custodian of the Alamo, he had lent the bell. The bell was found in the San Antonio river long ago, and reached Seguin over fifty years ago. It still retains that sweet, mellow sound, the secret of the old bell-makers.

A contract for the construction of 6,000 steel cars, aggregating a cost of \$6,500,000, has been placed within the past forty-eight hours by the United States Steel Corporation. This is one of the largest orders for steel products and the largest for steel cars that has been placed since steel car construction has been an industry of the Pittsburg district. To fill the orders about 90,000 tons of plates will be required.

A special from the city of Mexico says: Plans for the confederation of the five Central American republics have at last taken definite form. If the ideas of those most interested materialize a great congress will be held in the City of Mexico, which will be attended by over two hundred delegates. One hundred and fifty of these will be Central Americans, now resident in this republic, and the remainder will be regularly appointed delegates from each of the five republics.

Letter to Rev. J. S. Bowles, Goldthwaite, Texas.

Rev. Sir; We should like to ask your advice on a certain thing done; was it right or wrong? We shall have to state it, including the names.

D. F. Dreicorn is a painter in Holyoke, Mass. John J. Donohue is an architect, Springfield, near-by.

Donohue was building at Holyoke the Holy Family Institute, letting the work by bids, as usual. Dreicorn got the paint job: the paint was to be lead-and-oll.

But Dreicorn said to himself; "Lead-and-oll isn't half so good as Devoe and it costs most money, what shall I do?" He painted Devoe; and, after the work was done, told Donohue, saying "If that isn't better than any lead-and-oll job, I'll make it so."

Was Dreicorn right or wrong in painting a job Devoe?

You asked how it turned-out. This was six years ago. Now Donohue has another job there, a big addition to the Catholic Hospital; and he doesn't ask bids for the painting, but says to Dreicorn; "Go ahead Dreicorn and give me as good a job as you did on Institute. That's that best paint job I ever saw."

The question is "Was Dreicorn right in painting Devoe when he had agreed to paint lead-and-oll?"

That isn't quite all. Lead-and-oll is expected to last three years. If Dreicorn had used lead-and-oll, there would have been another job for him or somebody else in three years.

Was he right in losing that job for himself or somebody-else three years ago?

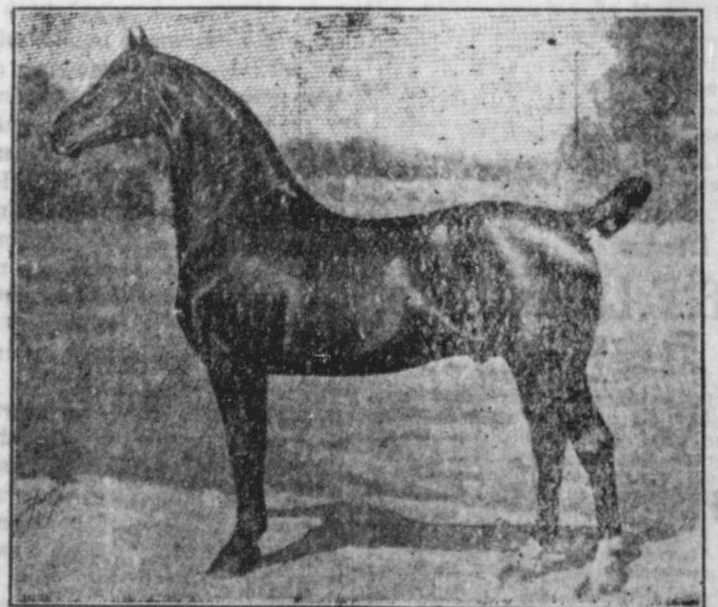
