Mr. Lee Sexton died Monday at noon in Terrell, where he had been carried for treatment a few days before. He did not regain his reason and continued to refuse food and water until death.

His case was an especially sad one and his attending physician, Dr. Gregory of Terrell, stated in the certificate that death was caused by "exhaustion, acute mania," which he further declares was neither contagious or infectious. It was undoubtedly a case of dethroned reason, caused by grief because of his wife's illness and the thought that she was soon to die.

Lee Sexton grew to manhood here and was a good citizen and an upright, honorable gentleman. He was 33 years of age and leaves a wife and four children, besides other relatives and many friends to mourn his death. He was a member of the Woodmen of the World, and his funeral service here Wednesday was under the auspices of that order and was attended by one of the largest congregations ever in attendance upon a similar service in this town. His remains were laid to rest in the Odd Fellows Cemetery at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning.

A Remarkable Record.

Goldthwaite camp of Woodman of the World was organized here April 14, 1896, and has never lost a member by death until this week, when Mr. Lee Sexton died.

The camp was organized with 18 members and now has 228 members and a large number of applicants. At no time in the last ten years has the lodge membership been below 50 and it is likely 100 would be nearer the lowest number during that time.

This is indeed a remarkable record for the organization, which is one of the most popular orders in existence. Mr. Sexton had only been a member five months and five days,

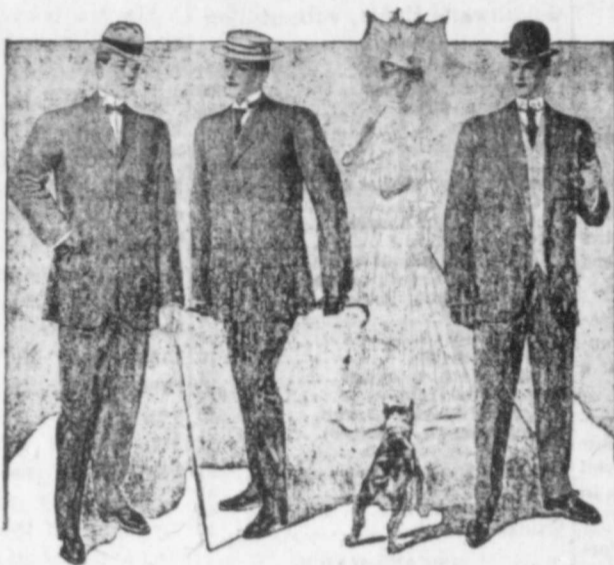

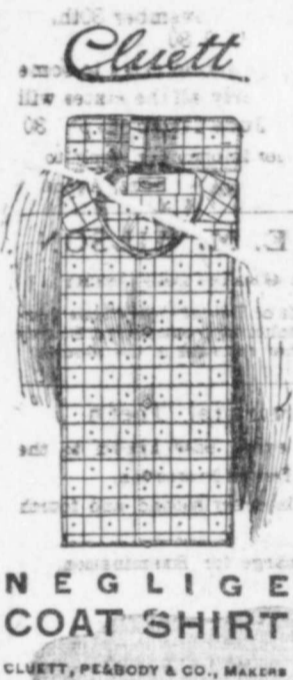
