D. 1907, in a suit numbered on the docket of said court No. wherein Mrs. Martha Ann Merrill is plaintiff and Charles M. Merrill is defendant, said petition alleging that plaintiff and defendant were legally married in Hamilton county, Texas, on or about the 2nd day of September, 1883, and continued to live together as husband and wife until about the 2nd day of April, 1903; that as the fruits of said marriage the plaintiff and defendant had five children to-wit: Rosie Ellen Merrill, a girl aged fourteen years; John F. Merrill, a boy thirteen years of age; Brown J. Merrill, a boy eleven years of age; Charlie E. Merrill, a boy seven years of age and Nellie Ellen Merrill, a girl five years of age; that on or about the 2nd day of April, 1903, defendant without any provocation or cause whatever, and without the procurement or consent of the plaintiff voluntarily left and abandoned the plaintiff with the intention of finally separating and living apart from her and that he has continued so to do up to the filing of this petition. The plaintiff and defendant have no property except the plaintiff is the owner of one cow and calf, and two horses and a wagon.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays for judgment, dissolving the bonds of matrimony and that she be awarded the care, custody and control of said children and the title to said property, and for costs of suit.

Herein fail not, but have before said court, at its aforesaid term this writ, with your return thereon, showing how you have executed the same.

School Census.

Judge Patterson has completed the work of compiling the scholastic census for the county and it shows a consideration increase over last year. The total for the county is 1953, of which number 1021 are boys and 932 girls. Last year there were 971 boys and 928 girls, making a total of 1899. In Goldthwaite there are 163 boys and 176 girls in the scholastic age, a total of 339; against a total last year of 331, of which number 153 were boys and 178 girls. In Mullin there are 193 scholastics. Of these 96 are boys and 97 are girls. Last year there were 88 boys and 79 girls in that district.

Some time ago the figures were given as they came from the enumerator in Goldthwaite district, but in compiling the list Judge Patterson finds several doubles in the summary, and these errors cause the changing of the figures.

A Trade Excursion.

Some of the leading business men of this city are discussing the feasibility of a trade excursion into the territory tributary to this place. The idea is to organize regular excursions of business men and advertise their coming to the community and then arrange for a meeting with the people of the community visited, and in this way induce people to come to this town to trade, who now go elsewhere. The suggestion is worthy of careful consideration and the hearty co-operation of all who desire the advancement of Goldthwaite.

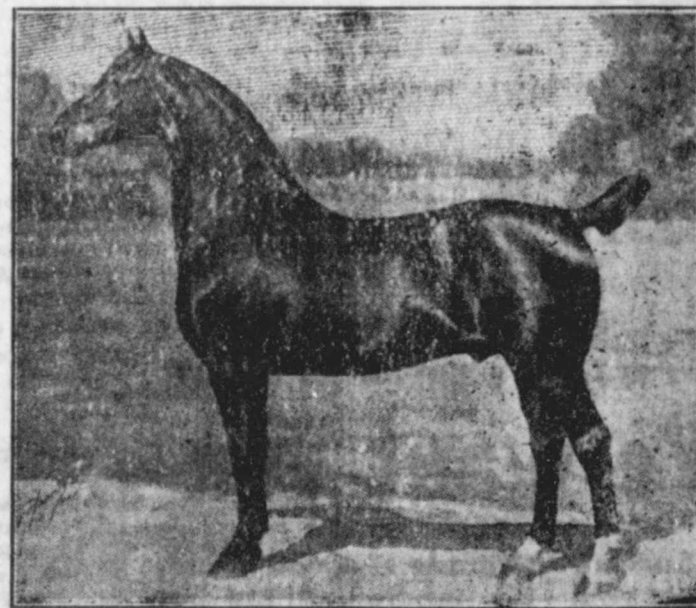
