BROWNWOOD.

The friends of Arthur Salley and Miss Annie Yeager will be surprised to learn of their marriage, which occurred last night at the home of the bride.

At a meeting of the library board held Saturday afternoon Miss Pinkie Noel was elected to succeed Miss Bess Roseborough as librarian at Carnegie library.

A deal was closed yesterday whereby Seth Nasworthy, recently of San Angelo, succeeds Maury Hall in the livery business at what is known as the Dupree stable.

After considering the application for new trial in the John Sharp murder case since Saturday Judge Goodwin today granted the motion and the case will come up at next term of court. The grounds on which the new trial was granted was the absence of material witnesses.

A deal was closed Saturday whereby D. S. Camp buys the Chas. Rogan business lot on Center Avenue, adjoining the Adams Grocery company building, which is owned by Mr. Camp. The price paid was \$3,000, or \$120 a front foot for the 25x120 lot. Mr. Camp is having plans drawn for a two-story business house to be erected on the lot, and at the same time will add a second story to the houses occupied by the Adams Grocery company.—Bulletin.

The sale includes the stock upon the place, the tools, the implements and growing crops for the current year. The price was about \$10,000 cash.—Leader.

COMANCHE

County court has been in session during this week.

Miss Maude Carlton and Sid Choate were married last Sunday.

The Comanche county Farmers Union Warehouse Company has been chartered with \$6,000 capital stock.

P. Moodie spent a few days at home this week. He is busy building an \$80,000 college at Stamford.

The valuation of the property in the corporate limits of Comanche as placed by the equalization board is \$1,837,016. Last year it was placed at \$1,262,806. The city rate is one per cent.

As stated last week the company has been organized, the stock fully subscribed, the necessary amount paid in and the charter has been filed at Austin. Grounds have been contracted for and the work will begin soon.

Edwin Dabney of DeLeon was appointed county judge by the commissioners Thursday morning to succeed J. H. McMillan, who recently resigned to accept the appointment of district attorney succeeding Mr. Eidson of Hamilton who resigned a few weeks ago.—Chief.

In the prohibition election in Limestone county last Saturday the county "went wet" by 46 majority.

The Democratic caucus at Montgomery, Ala., Wednesday unanimously endorsed Congressman Bankhead for the United States senate, to succeed the late Senator John T. Morgan.

Hurrah for Texas! The state legislature in solemn, deliberate session passed a bill requiring all hotels and boarding houses to furnish sheets nine feet long. We have always looked for great things from Texas. — Kansas City Posters.

A special grand jury was convened in San Saba this week and an indictment was returned against a man named Brown, who is charged with the murder of his wife. His trial is to begin at San Saba next Monday and a venire of 150 has been summoned for jurors.

The law imposing a high license upon cold storage saloons went into effect yesterday and the "club" business will not be very profitable hereafter for those who pay the tax, while it will be a very dangerous business to conduct a "club" without license.

The associated press says that the Japanese newspapers deprecate the evidence of excitement in the United States and express the conviction that all sources of trouble between the two countries will soon be removed, inasmuch as the Washington government, they think, is not less desirous of doing justice than the Japanese government.

A Japanese newspaper printed an alleged interview with one of the Japanese admirals a few days ago, in which he was quoted as saying that the United States navy officers were fine at balls and in society, but knew nothing of fighting and that the men would desert before they would fight Japan. The paper now "withdraws" the interview and says instead that a Japanese naval expert highly eulogizes the American navy.

The new law regulating the sale of liquor went into effect yesterday and the attorney general holds that under the provisions of the law saloons will have to be closed for twenty days, in order that new license may be issued. Most of the saloon men of the state have accepted his ruling as final and will close their places for the time required. Notably among those who will not sell whiskey during the next twenty days are the dealers in San Antonio, about 350 in number.

Messages received here from Killeen state that Lee Rowe shot and killed his mother Saturday night. The cause of the killing seems to have been that some 18 months ago Rowe married contrary to the wishes of his mother, and recently his wife has been sick with typhoid fever, and while she was sick the mother demanded that she be removed from the house. She was moved, and then Rowe returned to the house, shot his mother, returned to the place where he had located his wife, changed his clothes, told his wife he would be absent until next morning, mounted his horse and rode away. Kowe is 38 years of age, and is the only child of the mother whom he killed. The community is much wrought up over the deed. — Lampass Leader.

The lady became frightened and grabbing her son jumped from the auto and fell beneath the wheels of the cars.

We have seen readers who are awfully put out at times because we have made no notice of the arrival and departure of a friend visiting them, or the heaven sent babies that visit their home over night. The average newspaper man isn't a medium or a mind reader, but gets most of his news the way the milk man gets his milk—by pumping.—Taylor Texan.

An endless chain arrangement that appears to be most economical scheme has been invented by Prof. Oscar Erf of the Kansas City State Agricultural College. He takes the milk secured from the cows on the college farm, converts it into a powder and feeds it back to the cows, making what is declared to be the cheapest of all cow foods. He has perfected a system of drying buttermilk and then converting it into a powder. This dried buttermilk contains about 70 per cent of protein, twice as much as cotton seed meal contains, and can be manufactured for 1 1/2¢ a pound.

Constitution Amendments.

Caradan, Texas, July 9.

Editor Eagle:

Having been requested to discuss the amendments to be submitted to the people of the state August 6, and the time being near at hand when the election is to be held I will try to briefly give my ideas, but when I got through I imagine your readers will say that I should have left off the three first letters of the word discuss.

I will first take up the amendment as allowing a salary to members of the legislature and will say that from my observation and the best information I can get that the 30th legislature got more than they deserved, or at least a great many members did. My idea is that no member should receive pay for service not rendered. Some of the members, no doubt, were in their seats pretty near every day, but I will venture to say that half of them were not in their seats two-thirds of the time and that one-third of them not half the time. Consequently the average pay they received was a great deal over \$5 per day for the time they actually served. Everyone who reads the papers know that the wheels of legislation were often clogged on account of a quorum, yet each member absent, though perhaps they were at home attending to their private business, were drawing their per diem. I think the legislative members should have a fixed salary or per diem, and if absent from any cause except sickness, every day they are absent should be deducted from their pay. The state should no more pay for duty not performed than private individuals or corporations. Suppose Mr. Editor, your force should enough of them lay off to stop the work in the Eagle office; say each member on some excuse be absent one-third of the time, and then at the end of the month or on regular pay day present their account for full time, would you pay it? Not much, I think, and you would not be doing justice to your patrons because you could not get out as good paper under such circumstances. If a quorum could have been obtained every day during the regular session of the 30th legislature there would have been no cause for an extra session. It may be said that to increase the pay of members that they would attend to their duties. I think not. They knew when they went what the pay would be, they virtually contracted to serve at \$5 per day. So if their conscience will permit them to throw off at a low price they will do the same at a higher price, as it is the pay all the same to them. It is a matter of honor whether they are present or not. If there had been a little added to the amendment, that every day a member was absent, except in case of sickness, he

should not receive pay for such time then the voters might favorably consider their claim for higher pay.

The proposed amendment authorizing the levy of a road tax, I think all right, as it leaves the whole matter to a vote of the people who are interested, also the amendment providing for the improvements of districts in cities.

As to the amendment creating the office of commissioner of agriculture, I think we have had enough new offices created already, I have not been able to see where such office would be of benefit to the farmers. I do not like the wording of the resolution, as it says either to be elected or appointed. Of course, the commissioner would be appointed, as it is left to the legislature to say whether he is elected or appointed. I believe if such an office is to be created the people should elect the men to fill them, then the chance of getting good men would be much greater than to leave the matter to a set of men that probably not one-tenth of them would know anything about agriculture or the fitness of the man they would appoint.

The amendment referring to ex-Confederates and widows I will not discuss, as it seems self explanatory, though I was under the impression that ample provisions had been made heretofore for them. D. T. BUSH.

It is said that District Attorney Jerome of New York has agreed to ask that a new trial be given Harry K. Thaw, who murdered Stanford White.

Invitations are being sent out in St. Louis to the marriage of a couple aged 101 and 100 respectively and the guests are all to be above 90 years of age. The couple were sweethearts in 1822 and became separated.

Jesse Grant, son of Gen. U. S. Grant, is making a tour of the south, in company with one of his political advisers, to ascertain what chance he would have as a presidential candidate on the Democratic ticket.

A couple from Paoli, Iowa, prepared to sail for Europe from New York a few days ago and after they had boarded the vessel and just before the gangplank was drawn in they remembered that they had left their baby asleep at the hotel. The commander of the vessel delayed the departure until they could make a hurried trip to the hotel and return with the child.

This is a sort of topsy turvy world. No one seems to be satisfied. One man is struggling to get justice and another is flying from it. One man is saving up to buy a house and another is trying to sell his dwelling for less than it cost, to get rid of it. One man is spending all the money he earns in taking a girl to the theatres and shows and sending her valuable presents in hope that he may eventually make her his wife, and his neighbor is spending all the gold he has saved trying to get a divorce. One man keeps a pistol to protect himself against burglars, and his neighbor don't keep one for fear of shooting himself or some member of the family. One man pays for his paper in advance because he can read it with great relish, while another takes it for four or five years without paying one cent for it and enjoys it hugely all the while. Surely a queer old world this is.—Ex.
