Mrs. Wilson ran when the man began to shoot, and he followed her from one room to another as he continued to fire and no doubt thought he had her when he went into the kitchen and put an end to his own life.

He put the muzzle of his pistol to his right temple and the ball went through his brain killing him instantly. The weapon used was a 38-calibre six shooter.—News

Cotton prospects are said to be fine in northern Texas.

A red hot prohibition campaign is now on in Miami county.

Yellow fever has developed among the American soldiers stationed in Cuba.

Several arrests have already been made under the law forbidding drinking liquor on trains in Texas.

The American Tobacco company has withdrawn its salesmen from Texas, on account of the anti-trust law of this state.

Contract of the building of an interurban between Fort Worth and Mineral Wells has been signed and work is to begin at once.

A negro was taken from the jail at Pittsburg, Texas, and severely whipped by a mob. He was charged with assaulting a white man with a deadly weapon.

Judge Geo. Noonan died at his home in San Antonio Sunday. He served as district judge 25 years and was then elected by the Republicans to represent the San Antonio district in Congress. He was defeated for re-election by Hon. Jas. L. Slayden.

The law placing a 50 per cent tax on the sale of pistols became effective in this state last Saturday. Hereafter those wishing to purchase revolvers of any kind can order them from outside the state.

President Harvie Jordan of the Southern Cotton association announces that the meeting of the executive committee of the association will be held at Jackson, Miss., on Sept. 15, instead of Sept. 6, as previously announced. The meeting of the Sea Island Cotton association will be held at White Springs, Fla., Sept. 12. The object of both meetings is to fix the minimum price of cotton.

If young people only divined, nothing renders them so charming as a beautiful deference to their elders. The pert, flippant young woman in her teens or her twenties who fancies that she is sufficient in her self and scorns the advice of her mother is a jarring social note.—Exchange.

Commissioners Court.

Court met Monday in regular session with all officers present. Quarterly reports of officers were received and after examination were found to be correct. J. C. Donowho and twelve others of the Pickens Springs school district petitioned the court for an election to determine whether or not a special tax of 10 cents on the \$100 valuation should be levied for school purposes in that district. The election was ordered held at the school house in that district on Sept. 14 and J.E. Isenhour was appointed presiding officers.

Petition of Clyde Faulkner et al. for a change in the Goldthwaite and Payne road was rejected.

Petition of W. W. Taylor and others for a change in the Mullin and Center City road was granted, the change to be made and the road put in good condition without expense to Mills county.

Report of jury of view on a road from Trigger Mountain to Mullin was received. Damages to land owners was assessed as follows: L. L. Hays \$10; E. Reynolds, for stock gap, \$50; J. H. King, \$10; Mrs. I. T. Guthrie, three wire fence complets and 2 gates, and \$25; H. Timm, \$15; J. H. Wilson, wire for three wire fence through land; J. W. Nichols, wire for three wire fence through land. The road was ordered established.

The court went over to the Center City community Thursday to inspect a proposed change in the road and yesterday a trip was made to Big Valley for the same purpose. No action had been taken on either proposition when the Eagle was put to press, but it is "dollars to doughnuts" that both petitions are rejected.

A petition was filed with the court asking that a prohibition

be ordered in this county. The court declined to order the election for the good and sufficient reason that only a few months have elapsed since the publication and entering of the court's last order declaring prohibition in effect in this county, whereas the law requires that two full years elapse before another election on the same subject can be ordered. It is talked that the matter will probably be appealed to a higher court, but the Eagle knows nothing of the intention of those interested in bringing on the election. However, it is not thought likely that any such contest will be made and we hazard the prediction that it will not be successful if it is made.

The election was ordered to be held Aug. 28 in the mayor's office and J.B. Brinson appointed presiding officer. Mr. Brinson was also made presiding officer for all elections for the current year.

Editor Eagle:

As I've been asked so often by my friends, the readers of your paper, to write some more letters when I'm traveling, I feel that I must send you at least one letter out of this grand summer I've enjoyed so much in the East.

I left El Paso June 1, and traveled continuously for two months, stopping from one day to one week at various cities and points of interest. It is no doubt useless for me to mention many of the places, but will just drop a hint about a few. I reached Richmond, Va., just after the Confederate reunion, found many of the decorations up. I reveled in the historic associations of the Old South, visited the Confederate museum and looked with love and tenderness on the great collection of articles so closely connected with our section of the country prior to 1865 and so closely connected with our hearts and memories now. I stood on the veranda of the museum, the White House of the Confederacy, and tried to imagine the conditions during President Davis' occupancy. I felt my eyes fill with tears as I looked at the silk quilt made by the Southern women for Jefferson Davis, each piece embroidered by a different hand and all put together in one quilt. Hollywood cemetery in Richmond is a beautiful city of our illustrious dead. I visited the graves of Jefferson Davis, Winnie Davis and Mrs. Davis, also the Confederate monument built to the memory of our unknown heroes. The Virginia people feel much pride in their many historic connections. I would like to write several columns about this one place.

On leaving Richmond I visited the Jamestown Exposition, found it a very small but interesting exhibit. The managers made a great mistake by not postponing it for a year, as about June the 20th nothing was complete, yet many people had been there and gone away with unfavorable reports. I dare say that by now conditions are more favorable, yet no one need go expecting to find another world's fair like Chicago or St. Louis, for it is not there.

My visit to Washington, D. C., was most delightful. That is the prettiest city that I've ever seen on the American continent, and there are plans to make it much more beautiful. Certainly any American must feel great pride in our magnificent capital. The most artistic building it was ever my pleasure to visit, is the Congressional Library, with its grand marble stairway and superb hall decorations. I spent several evenings there just to enjoy the beauty.

The trip from Washington out to Mt. Vernon, Washington's home, also to Arlington, Lee's home, is highly enjoyable. Mt. Vernon overlooks the beautiful Potomac river, and every time a boat comes up the river they toll the bells while passing the tomb of the Father of our Country.

Philadelphia is a quaint old city, with its Quaker population, its historic interest and its pride in the pedigree of many of its citizens. I visited the home of "Old Glory" Independence hall, where the famous Independence bell is kept, and Carpenter's hall where convened the first Continental Congress in America, also much else of interest.

New York has no sentiment, the few places of historic or romantic connections must be looked up by the tourist, for the New Yorkers are too busy making money, yet there is much to learn and enjoy in that great throbbing commercial center, where there are more multi-millionaires than there are inhabitants in Goldthwaite. It seemed to me that they usually count money by the millions of dollars. I can't see how children born from poor parentage in that great city can ever have enough ambition to try to do anything, for the promise to ever be known is less than one in a million. I had no trouble in deciding whether I would rather live in Texas or New York City. In the language of a friend of mine who was in New York I said, "Give me Texas where there's more room and less money."

I enjoyed Boston next to Richmond and Washington. The people have so much sentiment for their illustrious dead such as, Emerson, Longfellow, Lowell, Holmes, Alcott, Hawthorne, etc., etc. Everybody is ready to tell you something about these people, they glory in their colleges and universities, and it is almost a disgrace for a New Englander not to be college bred. I felt more sympathy than ever before for the Boston woman who went to heaven, they showed her around, and she said, "It's all very nice, but it's not Boston." How I would enjoy taking a degree at Radcliffe or spending a few years at Wellesley! Nature has done much for that country, and man has assisted her nobly.

I found some pleasure in visiting Albany, N. Y., and telling the guard at the capitol that it ranked second to ours. I'm wondering if he's caught his breath yet, he was so amazed when I said it ranked second. You know a New Yorker never thinks of anything in New York being surpassed.

I had the usual experience at Niagara Falls—stood in awe before that great power of nature. In all my travels I've never seen anything so sublime as Horse Shoe Falls viewed from the Canadian side.

I haven't time to revise and connect these thoughts, but I'll send them along with my best wishes for all readers of the Eagle. I'll try to find time to write you some facts about the Chautauqua assembly, where it's been my pleasure to live for three weeks and more. Very sincerely,
